> About 183,000 Texas farmers and ranchers conduct a relatively large busniess through their participation in a private, self-owned business institution. These people, the economist adds, have progressed through acting together in order to satisy their economic needs.

According to preliminary U.S. Department of Agricultural statistics, Texas farmers and ranchers operate about 735 agricultural cooperatives.
These include 513 processing, marketing and supply associations that grossed more than \$1 billion in sales and netted \$771 million in 1969. "Cooperatives in Texas are getting larger in size which reflects the trend in organizations and the ever growing needs of producers," points out Fea-"A prime example of how producer organizations adjust to meet these needs is

the dairy industry." Associated Milk Producers, Inc., (AMPI) began in 1964 by merging nine Texas dairy farmer organizations into a single bargaining orgainzation. AMPI has achieved tremendous growth since that time, and is presently operating in 22 states since that time, and is presently operating in 22 states (from Texas to the Canadian border and Colorado to Pennsylvania). It has more than 43, 000 dairy farmer members who marketed more than 1.4 billion pounds of milk with a farm value of \$857 million during the

past year. In the beginning, the main emphasis of bargaining activities was on raising the level of milk prices to the member milk producers, points out the economist. This was achieved largely through controlling the supply of milk moving into several markets and directing any surplus milk into manufactured

dairy products. By controlling the supply of milk, AMPI has also been able to adjust prices between markets so that price differences



The control room at Southwestern Public Service Company's Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock, is the terminal center for data recording equipment which takes nearly 500 readings every minute, records them and calculates their meaning insofar as plant efficiency is concerned. The plant's turbine control system is the first of its kind in the world. It utilizes a digital computer and data recording devices to bring the turbine on the line and control it during operation. Jones Station, named for Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech, will be didicated on November 6. The plant will be open to visitors from 11 until 7 Saturday and from 1 until 7 on Sunday, November 7.
