Bailey County Farmers are making a valiant effort to harvest the feed and food grains growing in abundance on irrigated land, reports County Agent J.K. Adams; but rainy, cloudy weather has been a thorn in their side much of the time in recent days.

Mid-week saw a resumption of corn and grain sorghum harvest, but the front that moved in Friday promised a further delay in this important operation.

A check with farmers and others indicate only about 30 per cent completion of grain sorghum harvest, while corn is nearing 75 per cent where in ensilage corn is considered, said the county agent.

City Schools Show Increase

Muleshoe Independent School District's enrollment figures after the first nine weeks period were released this week by Neal Dillman, Superintendent of schools.

The total enrollment of all schools in Muleshoe was 1,991 students which shows an increase of 78 students from the past year at this same time, which was 1,913 students.

A breakdown of these figures show that Muleshoe High School now has an enrollment of 577 over last year's figure of 553, which was 24 less than the present enrollment; Muleshoe Junior High School's present enrollment of 464 students is eight less than last year's 472; now has 487 students enrolled which is 20 more than the 467 students reported last year; Richland Hills Elementary Schools shows an increase of 65 students with a total of 424 students this year and 359 reported last year.

Also included in the grand total of school students are 28 enrolled in special education, an increase of three over the 25 last year; and Migrant Kindergarten has declined to 11 students this year from a total last year of 37 at this same time.

3-Way Coach Stabbed At School Party

Charges of assault with the intent to kill were filed against Cloyd Meyers, his wife, and his son, Kenneth Meyers, all of Stegall, after a stabbing incident that reportedly took place at a Halloween party being held at the Three Way School Thursday night, October 28. He was also beaten severely on the head with a cokebottle, reported Sheriff Clements. He was later released from the hospital, local police authorities stated.

It was reported that the fight stemmed from an incident about two weeks ago when the Meyers family had filed charges against the coach. The charges were dismissed for lack of evidence.

Deputy Sheriff Bud Street investigated the incident Friday morning in Three Way. He arrested the three suspects who were charged Friday morning and then released on \$2,000 bond each.







Mardis, Gramling Attend Meeting





The control room at Southwestern Public Service Company's Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock, is the terminal center for data recording equipment which takes nearly 500 readings every minute, records them and calculates their meaning insofar as plant efficiency is concerned. The plant's turbine control system is the first of its kind in the world. It utilizes a digital computer and data recording devices to bring the turbine on the line and control it during operation. Jones Station, named for Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech, will be dedicated on November 6. The plant will be open to visitors from 11 until 7 Saturday and from 1 until 7 on Sunday, November 7.
