About 1250 steers were shipped from this place yesterday, and about the same number are being loaded today. These go to Oklahoma and are the property of the company owning a ranch adjoining this town. The manager and one of the stockholders reside in Taylor, Texas.

Business here is fairly good, considering the hard year we have just passed through. One of the needs of our little town is an increase of population. There are good openings here for certain kinds of business, and it is very much desired that parties will come here with a little capital this fall.

I sold out my business here the beginning of winter. I regretted very much to do so, but my health got so bad I could not give it proper attention. I am still no better, but if my health gets no worse I hope to attend the reunion at Goldthwaite this summer. I am "getting hungry" to be with the "boys" again.

The announcement of the death of Mrs. J. D. Faith, which occurred in the hospital in Temple Tuesday morning, was received with much sorrow in this city. She had only been in the hospital a few days and some of her friends did not even know that she was absent from the city, when they were shocked and grieved by the announcement that she was dead. Her remains were brought home on Tuesday night's train and the large attendance at the funeral services in the Baptist church and the burial in the Odd Fellows' cemetery Wednesday morning was a testimony of the sympathy of the people of the community for the husband, parents and other sorrowing relatives. Both of the banks and many of the business houses were closed during the time of the services.

Grinnan Speaks.

State Senator Arch Grinnan addressed a fair sized audience in the district court room Wednesday night. His theme was opposition to Baileyism and his audience was clearly on his side of the question, and he was frequently applauded and several times some of his hearers gave voice to their sentiments. He read from letters, telegrams and sworn testimony to prove that Mr. Bailey and the Waters Pierce Oil company had close confidential business and his illustration of the means used by Pierce to "convince" Bailey that the oil company was not a trust and needed his influence to get back into Texas was one of the strong points in his speech. The facts in the case, as outlined by Mr. Grinnan, are well understood and his speech only helped to make Senator Bailey's connection with the oil trust more thoroughly understood by the people who heard him.

Mrs. M. A. Faith.

It seems not inappropriate that we who know most about her, should give this expression concerning the above subject. The only daughter in a family of six children, among whom there had never been a death before, she was naturally the favorite in that family. But this is a matter of personal relationship and hence is of private interest. There was that in her life and character, however, that easily made this family favorite a family idol, that gave her life a significance above and beyond private interest and blood kinship. She lived in this world forty years, and in all that time she never, in a single instance, willingly wounded the feelings of any person. A devout Christian, her every day life was as beautiful and consistent a following in the footsteps of the lowly Nazarine as is within the possibility of any poor mortal to attain. Though sorely afflicted for years and suffering much she was always cheerful, always gentle, always kind and with a Christlikeness that was rare, she was happiest when serving others, even at the expense of her own comfort and her own interests. When the seriousness of her condition made an operation necessary she with characteristic fortitude put aside a natural timidity and unshrinkingly walked to the operating chair for that dread ordeal. For days before, realizing that the results were doubtful, she calmly discussed the affairs that concerned her in relation to others, and, forgetful of self, she was planning how their interests and pleasures might not suffer loss by her going away. She submitted to the operation in the Temple Sanitarium, Monday, April the sixth. During the twenty hours following, she was rully conscious, and talked with the writer much of loved ones at home, and of the goodness and kindness of others toward her, even in that condition thinking less of herself, than of others. But in spite of the most able surgical skill and perfect nursing at, 11 o'clock Tuesday morning, April 7th the fifth anniversary of her marriage to J. D. Faith, she, amid weeping physicians and nurses, ceased from earthly sorrows, labors and suffering and entered into the joys of her Lord, going with full hands to the Father who gave her the power to be his. Is this fancy? No, a thousand times no! In full consciousness, she was praying the prayer of a Christian, when death laid his icy fingers on her and the struggle that followed showed that her sweet gentle body was too weak for the combat, but the calm, placid, confident smile that rested on her face, marked the limits of death's powers, and showed the writer now a Christian dies. The world is poorer today. Father and mother never lost a truer, more thoughtful daughter, brothers never lost a more loving and lovable sister, husband never lost a purer and more faithful wife, friends never lost a more loyal friend, the needy never lost a more cheerful giver, the blessed Savior never had a more humbly, devout follower. Her little home, so happy to her and her loved and loving husband, is broken up. Associations so sweet to many, are waiting now to be resumed on the blissful shores of eternity. When the heart is bruised and bleeding because of such a loss, it is keenly sensitive to every mark of honor and respect shown toward the loved ones lost. Those who know this, know too, how futile the effort to express our appreciation of the many, many tributes of love to her and thoughtful considerations of her bereaved loved ones in this day's experiences. When we remember that bankers closed their banks, that business men closed their business houses, that mechanics left their shops, that laborers of all callings left their labors, that teachers left their schools, that professional men left their offices, and the hundreds left their homes, and rich and poor united in one last expression of love for her and of sorrow at her going, the language has not words to express our hearty appreciation of what you have done. It was said of a benefactor once after his death, "if every one who loved him and for whom he did some deed of kindness had bestowed upon his grave a flower, he would today sleep beneath a mountain of roses." Then what must we feel knowing that our loved one now sleeps in a house of flowers, beneath a mound of flowers placed by thoughtful friends because they loved her. We can but say we appreciate it, and we thank you, expressions too weak for our feelings. Let no one who remembered her in word or deed fail to remember that we treasure full such words and acts as sacred things.

City Ordinances.

Chapter 26, Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, levying a tax on dogs, and prohibiting the owning or keeping of dogs within the city limits without paying such tax, and making it an offense so to do, and providing for a dog pound, and for the holding of dogs a certain number of days, and providing for the redemption of dogs so held, and empowering the marshal or like officer to kill all dogs in the city on which tax is not legally paid.

1.—Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that there is hereby and herewith levied on all dogs owned or kept in the city limits, an annual tax of one dollar per head, which shall be due and payable yearly, so long as this ordinance remains in force, and until it is repealed, which shall be due and payable on or before the first day of May in each year, and shall be paid to the marshal of the city, or such other officer as may be the like officer, and with like powers, at the time same becomes due; and it is hereby made the duty of such officer to collect same, and place all amounts so collected in the General Fund of the city.

2.—There shall be at once procured and hereafter maintained, a suitable place, to be called the dog pound, where all dogs subject to be taken under the provisions of this ordinance shall be kept in accordance herewith, and the same shall be procured by the street committee, and the expense thereof paid out of the general fund of the city, after the account therefor shall have been allowed by the council.

3.—Upon the payment of the tax for any dog, as herein provided for, the marshal or other officer acting in that regard, shall furnish to the person paying same, a tag of metal bearing the words, GOLDTHWAITE DOG TAX, and also the figures showing the current year, beginning with the figures for the year 1908, and such tags shall also have upon them figures on the reverse side from the figures of the current year, showing their numerical order, and they shall be sold in such order; and the same having been procured shall be at once fastened securely about the neck of the animal for which it is procured, and shall there remain for the period of one year, in which event it shall entitle such animal to immunity from further taxation by the city for that period of time; and in case the same shall be lost, upon affidavit of that fact, another, in the numerical order after the last one sold, shall be issued in its place, and for the same animal and no other, and attached about the neck of such animal, upon the payment to the officer of twenty five cents; and if the same is not done, then the mere fact that the tax has been paid on such animal shall not secure it from destruction under the provisions of this ordinance, it being necessary that each animal shall bear a tag to escape destruction; and if taken without such tag after same shall have become detached, shall be dealt with as an animal not having had such tag, except that another may be procured as aforesaid.

4.—If any person shall wilfully or wantonly or mischievously or with the purpose of evading the tax herein provided, remove from the neck of any animal a tag so attached, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar or more than five dollars, and such fine may be collected by execution, or on default thereof such offender may be imprisoned as allowed by law, for not more than ten days.

5.—If any person shall attach to the neck of any animal other than the one for which the tag is procured, with the purpose of evading the tax herein, any tag so procured, either in the first instance or upon affidavit of lost tag, he shall be guilty and punished in like manner as an offender under the next proceeding article.

6.—Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that it shall be and is herewith declared to be unlawful for any person whomsoever to own or keep, or allow to be kept at his place of residence within the city limits of the city of Goldthwaite, any dog without having paid the tax thereon as herein provided for the current year, from May first, to May first. And the keeping or allowing a dog to be kept as herein provided against, shall be a separate offense for each day so kept or allowed to be kept; and any person offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished in like manner as one offending under article 4 of this ordinance.

7.—Be it further ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that after the first day of May of each year it shall be the duty of the marshal or other officer having like power, or the police marshal heretofore provided for by ordinance, if he be acting, to secure or have secured all dogs within the city limits, being those owned or kept, which are not furnished with a tag for the current year as herein provided for, and to safely confine same in the city dog pound, and there keep same, watered and fed in a humane manner for three days, including the day on which same are secured, during which time the owner claiming same may take same away upon the payment to the officer of tax and of twenty five cents per head per day for each day or part of a day that same have been in his charge; and if any dog is not so redeemed by the owner, being the owner, then the

same shall be further held until noon of the fourth day, in the same manner, during which fourth day any interested or humane person may redeem same upon payment of the sum of one dollar and the tax due; and provided that when any dog is claimed and taken by the owner as provided in this section, such owner shall in addition to the twenty five cents per day, pay the tax due on such animal. And provided further that the actual owner of any dog so redeemed by a stranger may at any time within ten days after such redemption obtain and be entitled to any animal so owned by him, from the stranger so redeeming upon payment in cash of double the sum paid by such person in taking such animal out of pound; that is to say \$4.00. And provided that the sum of twenty five cents per day so collected by the officer shall be in full for his service in the matter, and provided further that if at noon of the fourth day after any animal has been taken and so secured and held, it be not taken out as herein provided, then the officer in charge shall, as painlessly as may be, kill the same; and provided further that such officer shall be in no wise held liable in any civil action to damage for destruction of any dog in accordance herewith. And provided it becomes the duty of the police marshal heretofore provided for, to destroy such animals, and he habitually fails to do so strictly as herein provided, such failure shall be held to forfeit his bond as provided in the ordinance creating his office, and suit shall be brought thereon. Provided further that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed so as to authorize any officer to go within the residence yard of another and there secure any dog belonging to such resident or without the consent of such resident or some member of his family. And provided further, that in case of any dog is so kept for four days, the officer shall be entitled to pay from the General Fund of the city of ten cents per day, which shall be in full for his service where the dog is not redeemed, and is killed strictly in accordance herewith.

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and taxes shall be received hereunder as soon as the tags provided for can be furnished.

Passed, approved and adopted, this April 1: 1908, at a special meeting of the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, by unanimous vote of the council, the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the Mayor is to be signed by him and there kept as chapter 26 of the ordinances of Goldthwaite.

Which ordinance passed and approved and adopted as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved and signed, and ordered there kept, This April 2: 1908.

Chapter 27, Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, prescribing, fixing, creating and defining the limits of the built-up portions of such city, wherein it shall be unlawful for any automobile or other motor vehicle to be driven or operated at a greater rate of speed than eight miles per hour, as provided by enactment of the Legislature of Texas, passed by the 30th Legislature, and contained on page 193 of the Acts of such Legislature, which is here adopted.

1.—Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that hereafter the portions of the city of Goldthwaite which are to be known as, and are fixed as the built-up portions thereof, wherein it shall be unlawful to drive or operate an automobile or other motor vehicle at a greater rate of speed than eight miles per hour, as provided by Acts of the 30th Legislature, page 193, which act is here adopted for the city, are and shall be as follows: on the public square and on all streets and alleys within the limits of the city of Goldthwaite as incorporated.

The aforescribed limits being the built-up portion of said city, wherein it shall be unlawful to operate a motor vehicle at more than eight miles per hour, as prohibited in said act.

And this ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and publication as required by law.

Passed, approved and adopted, this 1st. day of April, 1908, at a special session of the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, by unanimous vote, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times, being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if proved by the Mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as Chapter 27 of the Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

Which ordinance, passed and approved as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved and signed, and ordered there kept.

Murdered in Seattle.

She separated from Lackey a few years ago and she and her little daughter emigrated to Seattle, where she secured employment in a restaurant and later was married to Al. Asbury, a mine owner, who was reputed to be quite wealthy. After living together a short time he left her and she commenced a suit for divorce. His whereabouts could not be learned and a citation had been published, when he returned and following his wife and a party of friends into a building where they had gone to attend a spiritualist meeting he rushed up and fired a shot through the woman's head and turning the revolver sent a bullet through his own brain. Both died instantly. The tragedy was enacted in the presence of her little daughter and the child ran screaming from the building to the room that had been occupied by herself and her mother.

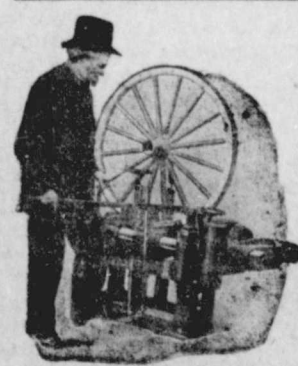
