SABASA.

Mrs. M. A. Dickerson, who has been visiting her son, Ed Dickerson, returned to her home in Goldthwaite Wednesday.

Tuesday night the safe in the Postoffice was blown open and robbed. Several parties in town heard the report about 1:30 o'clock. About \$210 in cash is missing.

Tuesday evening about 5 o'clock George Baker died suddenly at his home on the San Saba river 15 miles above town. —News.

HAMILTON.
The memorial service in honor of the late Judge J. A. Eidson, held at the court house last Monday evening, was largely attended.

At the family home, near Pottsville, on Friday, March 27, 1908, W. H. Goggin "Uncle Peter," as he was familiarly known, passed over the river to the Great Beyond.

That Hamilton will have a cotton seed oil mill completed and in operation in time to handle next season's crop, is not only hoped for, but is now highly probable.

Judge N. R. Lindsey, of the 52nd District Court, arrived Sunday from his home in Comanche, and reconvened District Court Monday morning after a two weeks rest. Among the more important cases pending in Judge Lindsey's court was the one styled on the docket as F. M. Graves, relator, vs. John L. Spurlin, et al, suit to dissolve the Hamilton City Corporation, which was tried before Judge Lindsey some two weeks ago.

The Judge taking the matter under advisement until yesterday, April 7th, when he decided the case in favor of the relator, thus dissolving the Hamilton City Corporation, and turning the town out on the prairie. The opinion of Judge Lindsey was that the election incorporating Hamilton was illegal on account of the fact that the county authorities failed to properly investigate the required number of inhabitants included in the territory incorporated, and having same duly certified to.—Rustler.

LAMPASAS.
The largest vote polled in years was cast at the city election Tuesday.

Lee L. Gloss died Thursday evening, April 2, at his home at 10:10 o'clock, after a brief illness. Jim Reynolds who died after

an illness of about ten days was buried Friday at 3 o'clock.

At their regular meeting Tuesday night the fire department decided to postpone their annual picnic from the 21st, a day which they have claimed for many years, to the 28th.

Charles O. Wither, son of C. N. Wither, drank some carbolic acid about 11:30 o'clock today (Thursday) and died in less than half an hour. There is no known cause for his action.

The local Catholic parish has purchased the building formerly used as a Baptist church, and more recently used as an office by Wm. Cameron & Co. lumber dealers, and will move the same in a short time to the lot near the Catholic church in the western part of the city and establish a parochial school in it.—Leader.

A sensation was sprung in the court room at the opening of county court Tuesday morning. The case of State vs. J. M. Dupree, charged with selling whisky, was called and the principal witness that the state was depending on was an elderly

man named Robertson. When this witness was placed on the stand and questioned he declared that he did not remember that he ever paid Dupree for any whisky. The judge instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty. He then ordered the sheriff to take possession of the witness Robertson and hold him pending an examining trial for perjury.—Bulletin.

Needed Changes.

Editor Eagle:

I notice that several of the so-called leaders of farmers and other organizations are constantly advocating the reduction of the acreage of cotton. The advocates of this scheme would have us believe that it is the proper solution for the existing ills in the cotton industry. It does seem to me that every fair minded man who will give the production and consumption of cotton the careful consideration that it deserves will be compelled to see at once that it is a matter of impossibility for the reduction of the acreage of cotton to remedy the unjust burdens that are being heaped upon the producers of cotton. If the contention of the reduction advocates was correct (which I deny) it would be impossible or very improbable for it to be effected under our present landlord and monopoly system. It is a well known fact that more than 50 per cent of the farms in the cotton states are farmed by tenants, and it is an undeniable fact that the tenant farmers are forced to plant just what the landlord requires of them. It would therefore be impossible for 50 per cent of the farms to be reduced in the acreage of cotton without the consent of the landlords. This I claim, the landlords will not do, for the reason that they know that it pays them best to have the majority of their land cultivated in cotton even at 10 cents per pound. But, as stated above, I deny the reduction of the acreage of cotton being the proper solution. I insist that this reduction theory has been gotten up by schemers and wire pullers for their own benefit. I am not going to contend that all men who are reduction advocates are schemers. It is nothing strange nor uncommon for good men to be misled by schemers who never spin nor toll. Now, if we were to consider the cotton question for no other purpose than to benefit the producers of cotton alone and solely for the purpose of being handsomely remunerated for that product alone, I would agree that the reduction of the cotton acreage would accomplish that end. But we, as American citizens should not lose sight of the fact that we (the cotton producers) are by great odds the minority class and we should not lose sight of the further fact that any measure that would be beneficial solely to the minority class would be a class measure pure and simple. The farmers are, as a rule, opposed to class laws and rules, and we should be very careful and not allow ourselves to become advocates of methods that we, as a class oppose. Any method that will prove beneficial to a minority class alone will prove detrimental to the majority class. I desire to state that every fair minded man who has given the production and consumption of cotton due consideration will readily admit that there has never been such a thing as an over production of cotton. The over-production theory is an old wornout theory. The leading advocates of the over-production theory do not believe it. For the proof of this fact I refer the readers to Mr. Britton, who was at the time of the organization of the Southern Cotton Association president of New Orleans Cotton Exchange. Mr. Britton was an over-production advocate, and during his speech on that occasion stated that 13,000,000 bales of cotton was an over-production, but he must have got lost while making his speech. Later on in his speech he stated that there was no telling where the consumption of cotton would end. Mr. Britton stated that of the world's population of 1,600,000,000, about 500,000,000 regularly wore clothes, about 750,000,000 who are partially clothed and 250,000,000 habitually go almost naked. In the very next breath Mr. Britton declares that it would require 42,000,000 bales of 500 pounds each to clothe the entire population of the world. Now, I insist that there cannot be any such thing as an over-production of cotton so long as millions of the human family are only partially clad. The troubles that we are subjected to in the cotton markets and many other troubles that the American people are having to undergo are caused solely on account of an improper system of distribution and this improper system of distribution has been brought about by an improper system of ownership of transportation. The improper system that producers and consumers are subjected to in marketing and purchasing have been brought about

through an improper system of finance.

Among many needed changes, as I now view it, the most important are finance, transportation and land. The issuing of the money should be restored to the nation, and should be a legal tender for all debts, and a sufficient amount should be issued to transact the business of the nation. The issuance of bonds should be abolished. The government should own and operate all transportation lines, and congress should enact such laws as would abolish land monopoly. With the above remedies put into perfect order, panics, over-production hobbles and the tenant system will be things of the past. And we would soon become a nation of home owners, and every honorable man could occupy an honorable position. In conclusion, I will state that we should produce all the hog and hominy, etc., that we need at home. I am not an advocate of 15 cents for cotton. I am 55 years old and have spent all of my life farming, forty years in Texas. Twelve and a half cents is all that it is worth to produce cotton. When it is higher the laborer, who is a non-producer of cotton will suffer. In other words, it will become burdensome to him to be a consumer of cotton goods.

We should not lose sight of the fact that others than farmers are following honorable occupations and have to eat and wear, and they have souls as well as we.

Democratic Call.

By authority vested in me as chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Mills county, I hereby call for a precinct convention to be held in each of the voting precincts of Mills county at 2 o'clock p. m. on Saturday, May 2, 1908, for the selection of delegates to a county convention which is hereby called to convene in Goldthwaite on Tuesday, May 5, at 12 o'clock noon, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the state convention at Fort Worth, which is to select delegates to the national convention. Each precinct shall be entitled to one vote in the county convention for every 25 votes or major fraction thereof cast at such box for the Democratic candidate for governor in the general election of 1906, provided that each precinct shall be entitled to one vote. The Democratic precinct chairmen are hereby designated as chairmen of the conventions in their respective precincts. Should any precinct chairman fail or refuse to serve, a majority of the voters present, who are entitled to participate in such convention, are authorized to select a chairman to hold the convention. A list of delegates selected at each precinct convention must be furnished the county chairman on or before Tuesday, May 4, at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time the Democratic Executive committee is called to meet in the court house in Goldthwaite.

PRIMARY ELECTION.

By authority vested in me, I hereby call for a primary election to be held at the various polling places in Mills county on Saturday, May 2, for the selection of delegates at large to the Democratic national convention, to be held in Denver in July. The Democratic precinct chairmen are hereby designated as presiding officers of election at their respective boxes. Should a precinct chairman fail or refuse to serve as such presiding judge, then the Democratic voters present at the time designated for the opening of the polls may select a qualified voter to serve as presiding judge. The presiding judge shall open the polls at the usual voting place in his precinct at 8 o'clock on the morning of May 2, and shall not close the polls until 7 o'clock p. m. of the same day. He shall select two judges and two clerks to assist in holding said election, one judge and one clerk being appointed by him from the adherents of each combination of candidates for delegates at large. The representatives of each combination of candidates may also designate in writing to the presiding judge two supervisors, who may remain in sight of the polls and report to the county chairman any fraud or irregularities in holdin said election.

All qualified voters in Mills county who agree to be governed by the test printed on the top of the official ballot shall be entitled to vote in this primary and said election shall conform to the requirements of the Territorial election law, as near as practicable.

No responsibility for the expense of this election is assumed by the committee or its officers. The expense must be borne by those interested and the committee is not responsible for any of it.

The necessary ballots and blanks will be supplied upon application to the secretary, R. M. Thompson, free of cost.

A negro burglarized a store at Buffalo Saturday night and was caught with the goods and jailed Sunday. After being placed in the city prison he hanged himself with a hay wire and when found his knees were touching the floor.

Prof. Corner of the Fort Worth public schools, in an address concerning the cigarette habit among boys, said that this is perhaps the greatest evil among boys and that a boy who smokes cigarettes can only do 25 per cent of the work in the school that he could do were he free from the habit.

Nichols is Defendant, and said suit being for divorce, and the care and custody of child of plaintiff and defendant.

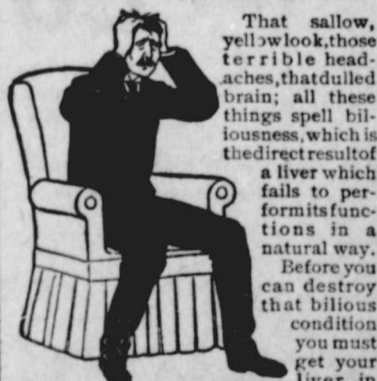

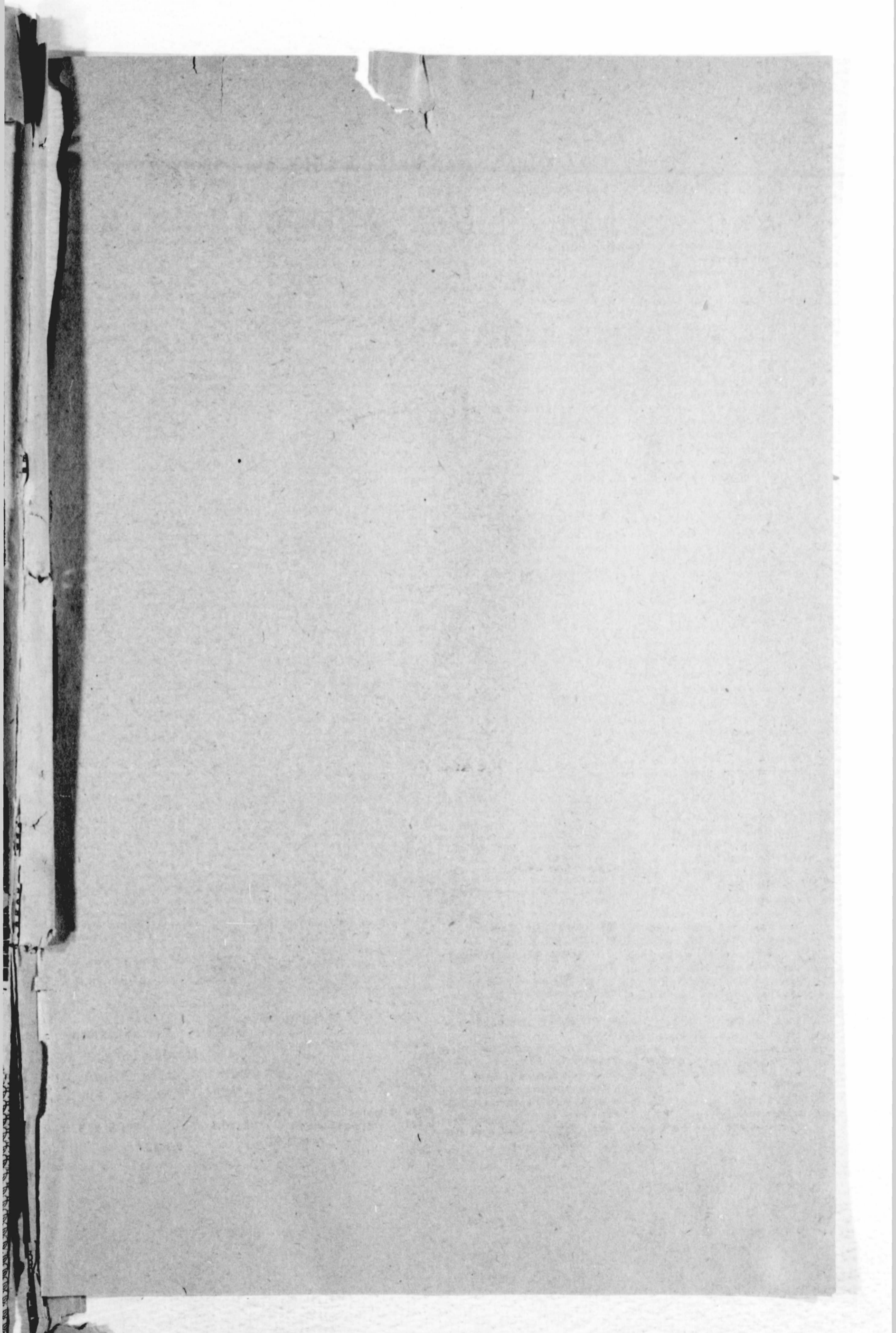

Anti-Bailey Meeting.

A number of those who are opposed to the methods and practices of Senator Bailey met in the court house last Saturday afternoon and perfected an organization by electing Hon. P. H. Clements chairman and C. P. Jones secretary.

A committee composed of F. M. Long, Jesse Lowe and Dr. M. L. Brown was appointed to draft resolutions and report to a meeting to be held in the court house Monday night.

The chairman was instructed to appoint representative men in each precinct to solicit membership for the organization.

The meeting was adjourned to be re-convened Monday night, at which time the following resolutions were reported by the committee and adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

To the Anti-Bailey Club, Goldthwaite Texas

We, Your committee beg leave to submit the following resolutions:

Whereas, Senator J. W. Bailey has admitted employment at the hands of H. Clay Pierce, the representative of the Waters Pierce Oil Company, Tennessee Railroad and other interests, John H. Kirby, representing the Lumber Trusts, and further that he has admitted having borrowed money from Pierce, John W. Gates and others who were almost constantly seeking favors at legislative hands, and

Whereas, in connection with most all, if not in every instance with the desire on the part of the lender of money to J. W. Bailey, they were seeking legislative influence, and

Whereas, it is not consistent with good governmental policy as taught since the days of Jefferson by Democratic principles and is still being expounded by such men as W. J. Bryan and others, that it is against the interest of the commonwealth of Texas and the United States as well for our representative lawmakers to accept employment at the hands of men representing public service corporations

Therefore, Be it resolved: That we are unalterably opposed to the election of J. W. Bailey and associates as delegates at large to the National Convention of Democrats to be held at Denver, July 7, 1908, for the following reasons:

First: Because the amount of money received from the various trusts or their representatives by J. W. Bailey is so large in contrast with the amount paid him by the people that he represents at Washington would require too much of his time from his official duties, even if his heart is not where their treasure is.

Second: We do not endorse the example he gives to the world and especially to the young men of our state, in the way he answers intelligent argument concerning his official and political and private record by calling those who oppose him such names as liars, dogs, hyenas, and appealing to his friends to teach the doctrine of pure hate, as designated in his Austin and Gainesville speeches.

Third: We do not endorse his attack upon our present Attorney-General because we believe it is unwarranted. On the contrary we endorse the course of Attorney-General E. V. Davidson in his effort to put the trusts so closely connected with Mr. Bailey's private affairs completely out of Texas at the hands of the Texas anti-trust laws.

Fourth: We heartily endorse the action of the Waco Convention in nominating a ticket to be submitted to the people of Texas as delegates at large to the National Democratic Convention to be held July 7, 1908, upon a platform that cannot be construed to be in favor of double em-

ployment at the hands of the people and the trusts at the same time.

Fifth: We recommend to J. W. Bailey while serving the people of Texas as United States senator to so conduct himself as it will not be a reflection upon him for a Texas Legislature to pass laws against Oil Trusts, for we believe if Mr. Bailey will consider that he is only a part of Texas, and that his troubles are merely an incident in the Democratic party affecting only one member of said party, again that the party will probably continue to exist should he depart or retire from it. He may regret some of his wrong deeds and retract some of his doctrine of pure hate, and yet become a good and useful citizen.
