NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local
Papers.

BROWNWOOD.
The Hoiness meeting in pro-
gress at the tent on the Weakley
block continues with unusual in-
terest despite the rainy bad
weather of the last two weeks.

The Singing Convention which
was to have been held at Bangs
on the first Sunday in this
month, but was postponed, will
be held at Bangs on the fourth
Sunday of this month.

Work on the Christian taber-
nacle has been hindered some-
what this week by the excessive
rains, but Pastor Smith says that
just as soon as the weather
clears up the work will be rushed
to completion.

Dr. McFarland returned Sat-
urday morning from Estella, of
Oaxaca, Mexico, where he has
been for several weeks. He is
delighted with the country, and
thinks there are great possibili-
ties there for the man who en-
gages in the rubber business.
He brought back samples of the
rubber as it comes from the tree,
also samples of tobacco that
grows there equally as well as
the famous Cuba tobacco, Es-
tella is four hundred miles south
of the City of Mexico.—Bulletin.

LAMPASAS.
The postoffice department is
advertising for bids to carry the
mail six times a week each way
between Lampasas and Adams-
ville, this being a new route.

At a meeting of the board of
directors of the Peoples National
Bank held Tuesday afternoon,
W. H. Browning, Jr., was
elected cashier to take the place
of the late J. M. Brown.

The grand jury adjourned
Friday afternoon, having been
in session only five days—short-
est session in the history of the
county. They found three in-
dictments for felony and five for
misdemeanors.

The Judge expects to sail this
week for New York and will be
joined Wednesday by Dr. Tom
Dorbandt and wife, who are to
accompany him on his trip.

Court adjourned Wednesday
afternoon, having been in ses-
sion only nine days and during
the time not a jury was called to
the box. The entire expense of
the term was only \$304 00 which
includes grand jury service, jury
service, bailiffs and sheriff.

F. F. Yett, one of the leading
merchants of Lometa, was here
a day or two this week. He re-
ports that the Methodists are
preparing to build a new church,
and that the local people are
contributing liberally. He and
Mr. Henry, who was with him,
were soliciting some help from
the people here.—Leader.

SAN SABA.
A. Arhelger, father of G. A.
Arhelger of this place died last
week at San Angelo, where he
had been for treatment.

Judge Martin was compelled
to return home Saturday last on
account of sickness in the fam-
ily. The bar of San Saba met
and elected Judge E. L. Reotor
to preside on the bench, which he
did during the remainder of the
court.

If Lampasas people have any
desire to keep the mail service
between this place and Lometa
they had better attend to their
side of the bridge at Red Bluff.
It has been unsafe for some time
and when the river is up it
throws our mail from two to four
hours late. There is some talk
of changing the service to Gold-
thwaite and if the people at Lo-
meta don't get after that sleepy
court at Lampasas this will be
done.—Star.

COMANCHE
F. N. Heslin of this place, who
has the contract for the wood
work on the new stone school
building at Blanket, fell from a
ladder there the last of the week
and sustained injuries that dis-
abled him for a week or more.

Uncle Peter Goggin, one of
the best known citizens of Ham-

ilton county and one who was
well known in Comanche, died
at his home at Pottsville, March
27. He was 77 years of age and
had lived in the vicinity of
Pottsville 43 years.

Mrs. Lyman Russell left for
Therp Springs Tuesday in re-
sponse to a message notifying
her that her mother, Mrs. Ran-
dolph Clark, had died and would
be buried at that place. Mrs.
Clark died in California whither
she had gone in hope of benefi-
ting her health.

A miniature cyclone hit Com-
anche in spots Wednesday at
6:15 p. m. * * * C. F. Jacobs,
who happened to be in the
kitchen, was struck with the
lightning that always goes with
these electric whirligigs, and
was rendered semi-conscious
and paralyzed. When his family
found him a few minutes after-
ward he could not speak nor
raise himself. His condition was
thought to be serious for a while
but he has almost recovered and
is at his place of business.

An aggravating problem was
finally solved by the city council
Thursday when they bought
from W. G. Herring a tract of
12 acres of land east of the old
Gage place in the eastern part of
town and adjoining the Holmeley
place on the west. It has a
house on it and is in cultivation,
containing a good garden and
alfalfa patch and other feed
stuff. This tract is to be used
for the location of the "septic
tank" for the deposit of the sew-
erage of the city. The land con-
tains all the gravel necessary for
the erection of this tank, and
will produce enough feed stuff
for the city's teams.—Chief.

They are citizens of our town, identified with us, and liberal tax payers. Under the full rendition tax law it is necessary to reduce our special school tax. The bonds against our school building can run on forty years and we believe it to be to our interest to let the coming generation bear a part of the burden. At present we are paying 40c on \$100 special school tax. This can be cut in two. Five cents will pay off the bonds by the time they become due and fifteen cents will be a sufficient amount to supplement our school fund and run as a long term school.

Will York, who was run over and badly hurt by a hand car last week, was able to return to Goldthwaite from the hospital this week.

J. M. Skaggs received the sad information Monday that his grandmother, Mrs. Killa Skaggs, had died at her home in Burnet county. She was 91 years of age and had lived at the same place since before the civil war.

Mrs. Henry Martin and her sister, Mrs. Brockman of Junction, went to Temple the first of the week, where Mrs. Brockman underwent an operation for appendicitis. She is reported to be getting along well.

J. D. D. Berry was summoned to Lampasas Wednesday night by a message announcing the serious illness of his sister, Mrs. Long. When he reached her home, which was five miles in the country from Lampasas, he found that she had been dead several hours. He returned yesterday morning. His friends here deeply sympathize with him in his sorrow.

Considerable excitement was caused here Tuesday afternoon by the circulation of a report that a dead man had been found beside the railroad track a few miles north of the city. The passengers on the delayed train from the west reported the find and immediately the sheriff, county attorney, coroner and others hurried to the scene and found that the man was not dead but sleeping. He was one of the railroad men who had been employed in clearing the wreck and was taking a nap while awaiting orders.

Heavy Hail.

Considerable damage was done in this city and in some of the surrounding country Monday night by a hail storm that continued for about thirty minutes. The storm came from the north west and passed directly through the city, destroying gardens and fruit and beating the leaves from the trees. It was accompanied by a perfect torrent of rain and the ground was covered in a few seconds and the water was several inches deep on the level. The destruction of gardens was complete and the fruit crop was damaged. However, the area of the damaged section is not large. Some of the heaviest damage so far reported is from the farms of A. J. and J. V. Cockrum, where 75 acres of oats and 40 acres of wheat was believed to have been ruined. A number of farmers report damage to corn and other crops. Quite a few roofs were damaged and much window glass was broken.

The hail stones were not large, but were so thick that great heaps were formed in many places.

Snake in the Picture.

A few days ago Miss Bessie Moorland and a party of friends in Pleasant Grove community were amusing themselves with her kodak taking pictures and lined up to have their own likenesses made. When the operator of the kodak looked into the glass to get the proper focus on the group she was horrified to see a large snake reflected. Upon investigation the reptile was found to be a rattle snake with twelve rattles and his likeness is clearly shown in the picture which they made before they knew of his presence. It is indeed fortunate that the snake was seen before it had an opportunity to strike. The ladies were badly frightened, but the reptile was killed.

Public Speaking.

Hon. Lee Young, one of the candidates for delegate on the anti-Bailey ticket, is to speak in the court house here next Wednesday evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock. It is hoped that he will reach this place Wednesday afternoon from Hamilton in time to make an address on the street before night, but this is uncertain. He will interest those who want to know about the conduct of the Texas junior senator.

Tank Emptied by Hail.

J. D. Fallon of Miller Grove was here Tuesday and reported that the hail was heavy in his community and that crops were badly damaged. The hailstones drifted into E. P. Shelton's tank to a depth of 7 feet and crowded the water out. Tuesday morning the pile of hail in the tank was considerable higher than the dam and the water had all been carried over the embankment. This was a large tank and was full of water when the hail fell.

Mr. Graham Dead.

Mr. D. M. Graham died at Terrell Wednesday morning and his remains were shipped here and interred Thursday in the cemetery at Rock Springs. He was an old citizen of this county and the announcement of his death brought sadness to the hearts of many friends in this section. His widow and daughter and other relatives live in the Rock Springs community and they have the sympathy of all who know of the bereavement.

Democratic Call.

By authority vested in me as chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Mills county, I hereby call for a precinct convention to be held in each of the voting precincts of Mills county at 2 o'clock p. m. on Saturday, May 2, 1908, for the selection of delegates to a county convention which is hereby called to convene in Goldthwaite on Tuesday, May 5, at 12 o'clock noon, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the state convention at Fort Worth, which is to select delegates to the national convention. Each precinct shall be entitled to one vote in the county convention for every 25 votes or major fraction thereof cast at such box for the Democratic candidate for governor in the general election of 1906, provided that each precinct shall be entitled to one vote. The Democratic precinct chairmen are hereby designated as chairmen of the conventions in their respective precincts. Should any precinct chairman fail or refuse to serve, a majority of the voters present, who are entitled to participate in such convention, are authorized to select a chairman to hold the convention. A list of delegates selected at each precinct convention must be furnished the county chairman on or before Tuesday, May 4, at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time the Democratic Executive committee is called to meet in the court house in Goldthwaite.

PRIMARY ELECTION.

By authority vested in me, I hereby call for a primary election to be held at the various polling places in Mills county on Saturday, May 2, for the selection of delegates at large to the Democratic national convention, to be held in Denver in July. The Democratic precinct chairmen are hereby designated as presiding officers of election at their respective boxes. Should a precinct chairman fail or refuse to serve as such presiding judge, then the Democratic voters present at the time designated for the opening of the polls may select a qualified voter to serve as presiding judge. The presiding judge shall open the polls at the usual voting place in his precinct at 8 o'clock on the morning of May 2, and shall not close the polls until 7 o'clock p. m. of the same day. He shall select two judges and two clerks to assist in holding said election, one judge and one clerk being appointed by him from the adherents of each combination of candidates for delegates at large. The representatives of each combination of candidates may also designate in writing to the presiding judge two supervisors, who may remain in sight of the polls and report to the county chairman any fraud or irregularities in holding said election.

All qualified voters in Mills county who agree to be governed by the test printed on the top of the official ballot shall be entitled to vote in this primary and said election shall conform to the requirements of the Terrell election law, as near as practicable.

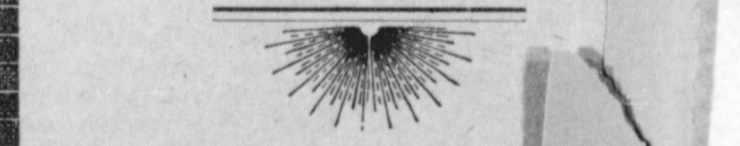

DISASTROUS FLOODS.

Crops Damaged and Bridges Wrecked Overflows at Other Places.

The floods have been destructive along the water courses this week and especially in the valleys of the Colorado and Pecan bayou has the damage been great. The water was not so high as in 1900, but most of the land that was overflowed that year was inundated this time. Corn that was covered by the water was ruined, but as there is plenty of time for a crop planted now to mature the loss will not be great. In fact, the loss to farmers from the overflow will be largely offset by the benefits derived by their lands from the water standing on it. Of course there is a heavy loss of fences along the streams, and at some places the water reached the residences and did damage to the furniture that had not been moved out.

The county lost heavily by the damage to the bridges. The Colorado river bridge at Lunsford's crossing was damaged considerably and is badly sagged, while the reports are that the bridges on the bayou were wrecked. Nothing has been learned here of the bridge across the river at Regency, but it is hoped that there was not much damage there, on account of the eighth of the bridge. Telephone wires to Hanna Valley have been down and the only information obtainable has been from people coming in from that direction. The waters have now receded and the telephone line was being repaired yesterday and when it is completed full information will be had.

FLOOD ELSEWHERE.

It was reported here yesterday at the Red Bluff bridge, between Lombeta and San Saba had been badly damaged, but a report has not been verified the Eagle. Trains were delayed from the station from Friday night till Tuesday afternoon on account of the overflow of the bayou and damage to the railroad near Brownwood, and Thursday the Leon overflow between Belton and Temple damaged the bridge track so badly that up to time it has been impossible to get train service between Brownwood and Temple. The overflow was a consequence.

There was also a washout at Creek Thursday afternoon. It was soon repaired, and trains loaded with cattle from the west were transferred from the Santa Fe to the at Lampasas Thursday morning around by Austin to Temple over the M. & N. Both overflow between Brownwood and Temple and there has been service over those roads all day.

A BAD WRECK.

An Engine Turned Over and Coaches Derailed.

There was a wreck of the passenger train going west Monday night a short distance north of the city, about 10:30 o'clock. Two engines were pulling the train and the engineer on the first engine saw the crooked, damaged place before his engine ran onto it, but he could not stop the train in time to prevent the accident. The first engine passed over in safety, but the second was derailed and carried with it the balance of the train. When the wreck occurred the front engine was broken loose from the train, the second engine turned over on the side and the train was jammed against the embankment, which prevented the cars turning over. The engine men of the wrecked engine were not injured, but their escape was next to miraculous. The track was blocked by the wreck until 5 o'clock a. m. Wednesday, at which time a portion of the track was rebuilt and track was built around the wreckage and the trains were allowed to pass. It is presumed that the heavy rain caused the damage to the track.

All day Tuesday there were crowds of Goldthwaite people inspecting the wreck and interviewing the trainmen. Many walked to the scene of the accident, which was just opposite the Rutland place, about a mile above town.

Did Not Escape.

Thursday afternoon it was thought by the sheriff's department that Dock Hasty, who was confined in the county jail awaiting transportation to the insane asylum, had escaped, and a search was made for him, but later it was discovered that he was hiding in the ceiling of the jail, having climbed there from the run-around. He carried his quilts to the ceiling and tearing them into strips plaited them together and securing one end in the ceiling he let the other end dangle through the scuttle above the stairway, which led the officers to believe he had escaped, but they discovered that this was only a plan of his to mislead them so that he might be allowed to remain in the jail until the night, when he could make good his escape.

Dock was sent to the Terrell asylum a few months ago, but he escaped there and returned home and remained until last week when he was placed in the asylum and Deputy Sheriff arranging to for Terrell that he tempted escape.

Rodeo, N. M.

Editor Eagle: Am now at Rodeo, N. M., in the southwest corner of the state. Am within a mile of the line of Arizona and about twenty-five miles from the line of Old Mexico. This is as pretty a country as you ever saw. Am in San Simon Valley. It is from ten to fifteen miles wide and the mountains are from 6000 to 10,000 feet on the sides of the valley. A few nights ago we had a fine snow on the mountains. It looked strange to see the mountains all covered with snow, while it was pleasant in the valley. The snow stayed on the mountains two or three days. The air is fresh and I think very pure, coming off the mountains covered with snow. Think this will be a healthy place for Mrs. Smith.

Have not permanently located yet, but think I shall locate here. People tell me they can raise most any thing here a little later. Things are very backward as the rainy season does not begin until the last of May or the first of June. We have the finest water one almost ever drank, and worlds of it from 100 to 150 feet. They are going to try for artesian water here at Rodeo soon. Some twenty-five miles above here in this some valley they have plenty of artesian water very shallow. Should we get plenty of artesian water here this will be the garden spot of the world.

Up in the mountains on the Arizona side they have very fine timber and saw mills. There are several mines near of different kinds—gold, silver, copper and lead and probably others.

Growing on the mountains are all kinds of fruits, vegetable, bees, bear and deer.

Went on the mountain the other day and like to have frozen standing around the camp fire. We started up the mountain with a pack horse, but his pack was so heavy that he could not climb. Twice he fell and the last time he rolled down into the canyon, and we had to make our way down into the canyon and unpack him and let him make his way out the best way he could. They have the best range on the mountains one most ever saw. The grass staying green all the year.

They have a good little Sunday school at Rodeo. Was with them there last Sunday and agreed to preach for them next Sunday. I never was at a place where so large a per cent of the heads of families were unsaved, they certainly need Christian workers and preachers out here.

Well this may be getting old to you so will bring my remarks to a close. Hoping the dear old Eagle and Mills county people long and prosperous lives.

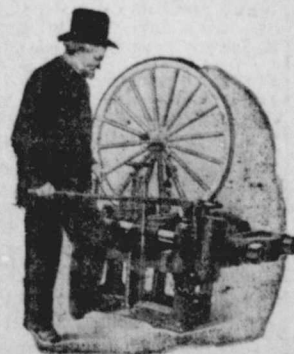

There were snow storms in parts of Missouri, Iowa and Illinois last Sunday.

A meeting of city and county health officers is to be held in Corpus Christi May 15.

Floods and the breaking of levees along the Brazos river caused great loss to farmers this week.

A Frisco passenger train was wrecked at Stanley, Okla., Monday morning and twenty people were injured.

The Brownwood Democrat has commenced the publication of a daily issue, which is a very creditable paper.

The Santa Fe shops have been closed at Cleburne this week and 500 men have been out of employment for this time. The shops were to be re-opened yesterday.

The grand jury of Gaudalope county severely criticizes the legislature of Texas for failure to provide sufficient asylum room for the insane. An insane man has been in the Seguin jail for two years.

Masked robbers secured about \$10,000 from a club house in Hot Springs, Ark., and escaped, after locking the occupants of the house in one of the rooms. The money was all taken from the gambling tables.

A cyclone swept over parts of Louisiana, Mississippi, Georgia, Tennessee and Alabama late Friday afternoon of last week and several hundred people were killed and many were injured. At Berry, Ala., cars were derailed from the railroad track. Amite, La., was almost totally destroyed. Many of the small towns in the states named were badly damaged.

Today is the time for the election of delegates by Democrats to the national convention at Denver. It has been arranged that the delegates at large are to be selected by a primary election and every Democrat should be sure to vote. Well could her parents in pride say, "She is our perfect ideal!" but alas, was she only too fair for a life in this sad world of sin and tears, a bud far too fair to blossom here. God has claimed that tender beauty to unfold in its loveliness for his own glory in that bright and holy land beyond.

An Explanation.

With reference to the article in the

position on the school board. I sup-
posed this ended the matter, but as

I feel that in justice to myself and to

fact that that article is misleading,
that I should explain my position on
the tax question.

I, and all the members of the old
board, have for some time been in
favor of reducing the rate of taxation
on the bond issue, so as to have just
enough money to pay the current in-
terest, and create the sinking fund
required by law; but as to reducing
the rate of taxation to supplement
the public school funds, I will state
that I am unalterably opposed to
that. We need all the money we can
get to employ more teachers and
build up a better school, and if re-
elected, I will oppose any reduction
of the special tax levied for that
purpose.

Now with this explanation, I will
state that while I would much prefer
retiring from the board, still, if the
people wish me to serve another
term I will do all I can to advance the
school interests in this town.

precinct convention, and imme-
diately after the convention has
been called to order a secretary
shall be elected and then a list
shall be made of the qualified
Democratic voters assembled
and no person shall be allowed
to participate in the precinct
convention or act as delegate to
the county convention who is
not a qualified Democratic
voter.
