NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Cited From the Leading Local Papers.

LAMPASAS
D. R. Mayo and Miss Lola Coleman were married at the residence of Rev. A. J. McNett Sunday night, June 21.

The people of the Straley neighborhood are making arrangements for a barbecue and picnic on the 15th of July.

The total scholastic population of Lampasas county as reported from the different districts, both regular and independent, is 2264, as compared with 2238 last year, showing an increase in the entire county of 26. The independent district of Lometa has a total scholastic population of 273, while that at Lampasas has a like population of 485.

The total footings of the tax rolls for Lampasas county have been made as far as the first trial balance is concerned, and these show an increase of over one million dollars in values as compared with last year. The figures this year are \$5,940,762, while last year the total was \$4,857,390.—Leader.

This is a falling off of about 240 from last year.—News.

Mrs. Louisa Trestrup, aged 78, died Monday, June 22, 1908, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. August Wied, ten miles east of town.

The state commissioner of agriculture of Arkansas reports a large decrease in acreage of cotton in that state. The decrease is due to overflows in some sections and dry weather in other places.

Rev. T. H. Feagin was killed by lightning last Friday night at Chins, a small place near Beaumont. He was a missionary for the Baptist association and had just completed a sermon and was calling on the sinners to come to the altar when he was struck. A man who was holding him by the hand was stunned by the lightning, but was not seriously hurt.

Among recent wonderful surgical operations is one of a most daring and unusual nature. An idiot, 6 years old, the daughter of a resident of Berlin, has been converted into an intelligent being by the process of grafting part of the mother's thyroid gland upon the child's pancreas. In more popular language, this means that part of the mother's throat has been transferred by the grafting process to a gland, or tissue lying directly at the back of the stomach. The operation was carried out by a German surgeon, whose success in the transplanting of organs from one animal to another and even from the lower animals to human beings has attracted wide attention.—Detroit News.

A Frenchman has discovered a means by which such individuals may turn their misfortunes into profitable account. This genius, a Parisian (his name is not recorded in the cablegrams) has turned the bald portion of his cranium into a bill board. Advertising space thereon may be had upon application—rates likewise. The advantage claimed for the scheme is that the information it is desired to disseminate can be taken at will where it will do the most good and can be removed expeditiously when it has served its purpose, and without necessity of acquiring special permissions. The originator's method of procedure, according to the dispatches, is to enter one of the cafe terraces of an afternoon when the attendance is at its best, order a block, place his hat on a chair, unconcernedly mopping his brow meanwhile. Having given those present an opportunity to learn of the wares he is exploiting, he quietly replaces his hat and makes his way to another cafe to repeat the trick. The idea appears to be a new one and as yet comparatively untried, but presents vast possibilities of utilization. Without having the statistics at hand, we will venture to assume that an average of one man in ten above the age of forty is afflicted with bald-headedness. On this basis of computation there would appear to be in this country several millions of men in the prime of life whose hair has departed from them. This condition, as a little investigation will prove, is a point upon which the afflicted are exceedingly sensitive and not infrequently filled with shame. In fact, the idea is susceptible of a hundred applications, but it is worthy of note for its uniqueness alone and for the fact that its discoverer is not a native of Connecticut.

During the demonstration in honor of Mr. Bryan in the Democratic national convention at Denver Wednesday, Mrs. Alice Longworth, daughter of President Roosevelt, assisted in carrying the Texas flag and doing honor to one of the nation's greatest men. When she saw the Texas flag she requested Secretary McNeel to allow her to hold it for a time.

An Association Press dispatch from San Antonio says: "Americans returning from Mexico say that the situation along the border is not by any means tranquil and that the revolutionists are well organized. They look for an uprising any moment and believe that the worst is yet to come. The revolutionists, they say, are working quietly, and while there are many who ridicule the idea of a revolution starting in the republic, there is an undercurrent of uneasiness which is suggestive of trouble brewing."

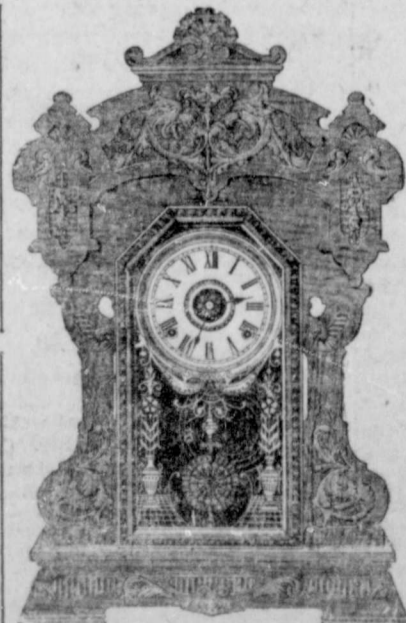
