Only a little more than a week remains until the people will assemble at Goldthwaite to do honor to the Confederate veterans. The annual reunion will begin Monday, August 10, and continue three days. A negro boy aged about 17 years was burned at the stake on the public square in Greenville Tuesday for an assault upon a young lady near that city. He was positively identified by his victim.

Mary had a little lamb, like-wise and oyster stew, and ere the sunlit morning dawned she had a nightmare, too. The boy stood on the burning deck because he was afraid. He couldn't swim to save his neck, and that is why he stayed.—Exchange.

J. L. Mitchell, a jeweler of Houston, shot and killed a hackman at Laporte Sunday morning. It is claimed that the hackman drove his vehicle against a carriage occupied by Mitchell's wife a few days ago and overturned the carriage and that he did not so much as stop to give assistance to the injured lady.

J. W. Reese, who was shot last week at Comanche, died Sunday morning. E. C. Gaines, member of the legislature from Comanche county, did the shooting, which is said to have been in self defense. The killing was the result of the distribution of circulars attacking the character of Gaines. It is claimed that Reese, who was a rival candidate for representative, was responsible for the circulars.

A. D. Duncan was shot and killed by his wife at Elgin Saturday. It is claimed that he had avowed a determination to separate from his wife and taking their little daughter to town with him he became intoxicated and after making the child drunk returned to the family home and commenced fighting his wife, when she secured a pistol and shot him as he was dragging her through the house by her hair. The weapon used was the same Mrs. Duncan's father used in taking his own life. She offered to surrender to the officers, but was not arrested.

An exchange gets off the following, which we do not believe: "Fishermen are frequently accused of stretching the truth, but accusations of this kind are usually not well founded. A fisherman can tell the truth as well as any other person, many of them with both hands tied behind them. For example: Elijah Cosgrove of Quincy, Ill., a fisherman of repute, relates that ten years ago he was fishing in one of the famous resorts of Indians, when he dropped a \$10 gold piece into the water and saw a pickerel swallow it. Since then he has fished assiduously for the pickerel, and a week ago last Saturday caught it. Opening the fish he found the original \$10 and \$8.59 in small change—being the interest that had accrued while the money was on deposit in the fish.

Taxation—Submitting Amendment to Constitution.

Joint resolution amending Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted on school districts and providing for a majority vote of the property tax paying voters of such district to vote such tax.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the \$100 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this state for a period of not less than six months in each year, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all of the counties of this State by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein, provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Section 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election, or at a special election called by the Governor and the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of such proclamation. At such election the qualified electors voting and favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools," and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment of Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools." W. R. DAVIE, Secretary of State. [A true copy.]

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Compensation of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per annum.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars and with the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, said Section 5 as amended, to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and no more and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

That Section 17 be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 17. If during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, re-

sign, refuse to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per year, and no more. During the time he administers the government as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been employed in the duties of his office.

Section 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be voted upon on the day of the next general election of the State of Texas, which will be held on the day fixed by law therefor. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) per annum." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) per annum." And the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication, proclamation and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Commissioners' Precincts.

Joint resolution to amend Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for subsequent redistricting of a county into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Each organized county in the State, now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each biennial election, one justice of the peace and one constable, each of whom shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided, that in any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance, be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.

Section 2. That the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State, at the next general or special election in the manner required by law, by the Governor of the State. W. R. DAVIS, Secretary of State.

Election Returns

Full Report Not Obtainable Until Boxes Are Opened
By the Executive Committee.

SEVERAL VERY CLOSE RACES.

A List of the Candidates Believed to Have Been
Nominated Last Saturday—No Figures
Received From Antelope Gap.

The results of the primary election held in Texas last Saturday are known in a general way, but the full returns have not been secured and a reliable report will not be obtained for several days.

It is known that Governor Campbell was re-nominated by a large majority and Attorney General Davidson was re-nominated by a small majority, but the exact figures can not yet be given. It is thought that Mr. Davidson's majority will be about 25,000, or perhaps less. The other nominees are: Davidson, lieutenant governor; Stephens, controller; Colquit, railroad commissioner; Robinson, land commissioner; Cousins, superintendent of public instruction; Davidson, court of appeals for the third district. It is believed the submission proposition was defeated. Hon. Arch Grinnan was re-nominated for the state senate by a large majority and A. J. Porter was nominated for the legislature in this district.

The county returns have not been compiled in a manner that will justify the Eagle in giving them as authentic. The following table is compiled from telephone reports and "hear-say" returns and the readers can take them for what they are worth, but they are not vouched for by the Eagle. They are in the main correct, but the returns

made to the executive committee will be opened today and the result will then be made known. However, it is believed that the following county and precinct officers have been nominated:
