BROWNWOOD.
A cotton stalk bearing 115 grown bolls was brought to town this morning by C. H. Boren of Grosvenor.

Sunday afternoon, at Bangs, Rev. G. W. Harris officiating, E. V. Bowles of Brownwood and Miss Flora Mayes, daughter of Dr. R. C. Mayes, were united in marriage.

The many Brownwood friends of Mrs. Lyd a Bishop, sister of W. R. Roberts of this city, will be surprised to learn she was married Saturday to Mr. Lynn Walker of Galveston.

James Nunnely of Brooksmith, was brought to this city yesterday afternoon on the Brady train, suffering with a broken shoulder sustained in a runaway accident.

Ed Selvidge, formerly a laundryman of this city, but more recently of Vernon, has moved back to Brownwood and today purchased a lot on which to erect a laundry building and re-enter that business here.

This morning City Secretary C. A. Tunnell received a letter from W. S. Walker, promoter of the proposed street railway system, which says that on account of numerous details and changes in the franchise he cannot accept, and that the building of the proposed street railway system in Brownwood is for the present abandoned. —Bulletin.

SAN SABA.
Dr. Lindly, the dentist, came in the first of the week from a tour of the west.

R. O. Armentrout is carrying his arm in a sling as the result of an accident Wednesday morning at the Dunbar gin above town a few miles. His fingers were caught in some of the press machinery and badly mashed.

Our Commissioners Court Wednesday appropriated the sum of \$300 to aid in repairing the bridge across the Colorado between San Saba and Goldthwaite. Mills county has already raised \$1100'00 for this purpose, one-half of which was raised by local subscription by the citizens of Goldthwaite.

B. F. Frymier of Waco was in San Saba Thursday. He is the owner of the Chadwick mill and

the famous rock quarry and he is making a determined effort to get some Pennsylvania capitalists interested in an electric railway from Antelope Gap or Gateville to San Saba. He thinks the electric power could easily be furnished from the Chadwick mill to operate the road.

Walter Fry, a former resident of San Saba and nephew of Thomas Fry who lives near town, was struck by lightning Wednesday evening at his farm near Burnet and instantly killed. His father-in-law, Jim Jones of Regency, was notified of the sad occurrence by wire and left immediately for that place. Walter lived in our town for some time a few years ago and is known to many of our people who will be sorry to learn of this sad occurrence. —Star.

HAMILTON.
The Hamilton public school opened last Monday morning with an enrollment of 358 pupils. Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Fowler are now occupying the old U. S. Bolding place, in west Hamilton. Nothing has been done in district court this week. Judge Arnold has spent the week at his home in Gateville.

Tom Niblack died at his home near Gentry's Mill last Saturday morning.

Up to and including today (Thursday, September 24) the three gins at Hamilton have turned out 1,354 bales of cotton this season.

Col. L. J. Polk, for about six months, vice president and general manager, of the S. N. & S. T., has just resigned that position and left tonight for his home in Sherman. —Rustler.

The man was overpowered by the three men and taken to jail. There, after his fright had passed he talked freely, stating that he had come from the old states and wanted to see his brothers who live in this county but that he believed that he was being imposed upon by ticket agents and the train conductor and had gotten off at Granbury after a dispute with the conductor. —Chief.

The State of Texas. To the Sheriff or any Constable of Mills County, Greeting: Oath having been made as required by law you are hereby commanded to summon E. W. Morris, whose place of residence is unknown, by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 35th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 35th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the district court of Mills county, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Goldthwaite, on the second Monday in November, A. D. 1908, the same being the 16th day of November, A. D. 1908, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 19th day of September, A. D. 1908, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said court No. 1049 wherein Mrs. E. G. Morris, is plaintiff, and E. W. Morris, is defendant, and said petition alleging that plaintiff is a bona fide inhabitant of the county of Mills, in the State of Texas, and that the defendant E. W. Morris' place of residence is unknown to her; That on or about the day of August, 1898 she, the plaintiff and E. W. Morris the defendant were lawfully married in the county of Mills, in the State of Texas, and lived together as husband and wife until about September 1st, 1907; That while they lived together three children were born to them, viz: Bartie Morris, aged 9 years, Verole Morris, aged 5 years, and Myrtle Morris, aged 3 years, who now live with the plaintiff; that on or about the 1st day of September, 1907, the said defendant without any cause known to plaintiff, abandoned her and has not since lived with her, nor contributed anything for the support of her, or her minor children; they being left without any means of support. Plaintiff further alleges that while she and the defendant lived together, the defendant would not work, nor provide for her or their children, but that he was cross and contrary with her and the children. Plaintiff further alleges that she believes that the defendant is not the proper person to have the care and custody of their three minor children, but that she believes that she is the proper person to have such care and custody; and further that she has reason to believe and does believe that the said defendant will nevermore return to live with her nor will he contribute anything for her or her children's support. Premises considered, plaintiff prays that upon a hearing hereof, that she have judgment setting aside the marriage between her and the defendant E. W. Morris, and that she be granted the care and custody of the said three minor children; and that she have judgment against the said defendant for all costs of this suit. Herein fail not, but have before said court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same. Witness, E. G. Mayor J. D. Ford, editor of Timpson Times and mayor of the city of Timpson, died Saturday afternoon from an operation for appendicitis.

City Ordinance

CHAPTER XXVIII.

An ordinance of the incorporated city of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, granting to W. A. Moore, J. M. Traylor, B. F. Mahan, John W. Roberts and their associates, heirs and assigns, the right to erect poles, studs, guys, cross-arms and such other fixtures may be needed for constructing and maintaining a telephone system in the city of Goldthwaite, Texas, and to string wires, cables, insulators and such other material and equipments as may be needed to insure good telephone service, along and across the streets, alleys, lanes and public grounds within said city as incorporated, subject to the limitations and conditions hereinafter named.

Be it ordained by the city council of Goldthwaite, Texas, that W. A. Moore, J. M. Traylor, B. F. Mahan, John W. Roberts, their associates, heirs and assigns are hereby granted the right to enter upon the streets, alleys, lanes and public grounds in and of Goldthwaite, as incorporated and to erect, maintain and operate in, along and across said streets, alleys, lanes and public grounds, all poles, guys, studs, wires, cables and other fixtures and appliances necessary for furnishing good and faithful telephone service to all persons within or outside of said city who may become members or subscribers of said telephone system. And this right and franchise to W. A. Moore, J. M. Traylor, B. F. Mahan, John W. Roberts, their associates, heirs and assigns shall continue to exist for a term of twenty years.

2. In consideration of the granting of this franchise and privilege the said grantees by their acceptance hereof agree as follows:

To begin in good faith the construction of the said telephone system within six months from the date of their acceptance hereof and that they will continue to enlarge and improve said system from time to time as its emergencies may require and its volume of business will justify.

3. The franchise and privileges herein are granted to said W. A. Moore, J. M. Traylor, B. F. Mahan, John W. Roberts, their associates, heirs and assigns for the term of twenty years from their acceptance hereof and this ordinance may be accepted by either of said parties within thirty days from the date hereof by filing with the mayor of said city their acceptance hereof, in writing which shall be entered of record in the minutes of the council along with this ordinance.

4. All construction shall be under the supervision of the street commissioner of said town and shall be executed in accordance with its orders and in such a way and manner as not to be, or become, a nuisance, or to in any way interfere with traffic or travel on any of the streets, alleys, lanes or public grounds in and of said city the city shall have the right to order any necessary change of construction, when and where it is deemed advisable and is for the public welfare and convenience, but in no way to interfere with the value of said telephone system or lessen its adaptability or capability to perform good and faithful service.

All construction and such necessary changes as may be made after beginning to construct said telephone system shall be at the expense of the grantees herein and with no expense to the city.

Passed, approved and adopted the September 7, 1908, at a regular meeting of the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times was unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the Mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept as chapter 28 of the ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite.

Which ordinance, passed, approved and adopted as aforesaid, was filed in the office of the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and ordered to be there kept.
