Among the real estate deals consummated this week were the sale of Judge Dabney's home by himself and wife to S. J. Thomas, consideration \$3500.

Cards are out announcing the marriage of Miss Eunice Slack and Dr. J. H. Marshall, at the Presbyterian church Wednesday evening, 8:30 o'clock, Nov. 4.

S. C. Findley, county superintendent, has had a postal card issued and distributed containing several reasons why the proposed constitutional amendment in reference to allowing common school districts to issue bonds and levy a tax of any amount up to 50c on the \$100

valuation, to be voted on in the coming election, should be adopted.—Chief.

The night rider notices posted on two signs at Brownwood was found to be pranks of school boys.

A Mexican, sentenced to death for murder hanged himself in jail at San Marcus, the night the verdict was brought in.

Ben Davis, aged 28, of Muskogee, Okla., was killed by a Santa Fe train in Fort Worth Saturday night.

Delirious with typhoid fever Thomas Holman, a convict guard at the Clemente state farm, stabbed himself Wednesday.

The Central school building was burned at Denton Friday. The building and contents were valued at from \$30,000. to \$50,000.

Eunice Martin, the 9-year-old grand-daughter of Mrs. Sarah Berry, living near Lampasas, who was lost in the woods one night and half a day, was found Thursday morning.

The female ward of No. 1 of the North Texas asylum for the insane at Terrell was destroyed by fire Saturday night. The loss is \$20,000. The inmates were removed without injury.

James McGee of Caldwell died Thursday morning, as a result of falling from the train and having his left arm mashed off Saturday night, near Buckholts, where he was found next morning at 8 o'clock.

Rev. P. M. Bently, a Baptist minister of Beaumont aged 62 years, committed suicide at a hotel in Center by taking poison, Friday night. The only cause assigned for the act, is a dread and fear of old age.

Reports say the curfew bell will ring in Austin at an early date. It is said that Mayor Maddox is going to have the curfew bell rung at 8:30 in the evening and immediately all children under 12 years old must go to their homes.

Mrs. Bonnie Matlook, a bride of 17, formerly of Lone Star, Cherokee county, Texas, blew out her brains at Sorevport, La., Sunday because of a disagreement with her husband regarding which church they should attend.

Lee O'Brien and Tanham Higginbotham, who have been attending the Virginia Military institute at Lexington, Va., arrived at their homes in Dublin Texas, Friday morning, having run away from school on account of the hazing being more than they could endure.

J. B. Craig, a traveling man of 25 years standing in Texas and Louisiana, who represents the Chattanooga Medicine Company, awoke last Tuesday morning from sleep totally blind, but the doctors found by closing one eye he could see out of the other but with both open he is entirely blind.

Fire at Amarillo last Sunday evening destroyed the roundhouse and shops of the Santa Fe road together with twelve engines, several coal cars, the coal water tank, pumping station tanks and sundry supplies. The loss is considered near \$100,000. The building was partially covered by

Based on a 12 1/2 cent rate the local school tax for the San Saba independent district will be \$26 less than the amount collected last year. The increase in the state apportionment will enable the board to run an eight month school.

Ed Hall and wife of Brownwood arrived with the Drs. Sanderson's automobiles Tuesday morning and are now giving instructions as to running them.

Last Saturday night some dastardly thief opened the big red 6000 gallon tank of oil at the cotton oil mill and when it was discovered about day light something over 2000 gallons of oil had run out. —News.

LAMPASAS

The Baptist ladies offered over \$22 00 on their candy and cake sale Saturday, and \$25 00 last week.

The commissioners' court carefully counted the votes cast in the recent local option election making the number in favor of prohibition 85.

M. J. Scott will leave in a day or two for his new home at Victoria, Tamaulipas, Mexico, where he will have a regular run as engineer on one of the leading railroads of the republic of Mexico. He has spent a good part of the summer here with his father, Lee R. Scott.

The grand jury has adjourned for the term, having turned in 16 bills of indictment, 9 of which were for felonies and 7 for misdemeanors. Of the 9 felony cases four are against one person for burglary, two for aiding prisoners to escape from jail, one for forgery, one for murder, and one for an attempt to commit a criminal assault.

Antony Coertz, whose home is some miles south of Lampasas on the Galbraith ranch, was found dead sitting in his buggy in the rear of the Lone Star Laundry Friday morning Oct. 9th between four and five o'clock. It is stated that he had some trouble with his heart some years ago, and his death is attributed to heart failure.

Mrs. R. S. Mills met with an accident Saturday which might have been serious, but she is up again and will soon be all right. Some boys were throwing rocks at some dogs, and as Mrs. Mills was passing, then a rock accidentally struck her horse, which tuaned suddenly and she was thrown from the vehicle striking her head, cutting a small gash in the back of her head and bruising other parts of her body. —Leader.

D. 1908, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 8th day of September, A. D. 1908, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said court No. 1045, wherein, Mrs. Callie B. Power is plaintiff and R. O. Williams, B. Lamb and H. B. Ward, jr., and the unknown heirs, legal representatives, legatees and devisees of R. O. Williams and B. Lamb, both deceased, are defendants, and plaintiffs petition alleging an action in trespass to try title as well as for damages; that on or about the first day of September, A. Warehouse and Cotton Yard.

Mills County Farmers Union Warehouse Company have a cotton yard in connection with the warehouse, for the accommodation of their patrons who do not wish to store their cotton in the warehouse, and will weigh and class cotton for 10c per bale, issuing a negotiable yard receipt for each bale giving weight and class. No charge for storage on yard.

Charges for cotton stored in the warehouse are: 65 cents for first month and 35 cents for each succeeding month, which includes insurance.

Insurance on the yard can be had for 2½ per cent annual rate. The yard and warehouse are open to the patronage of all.

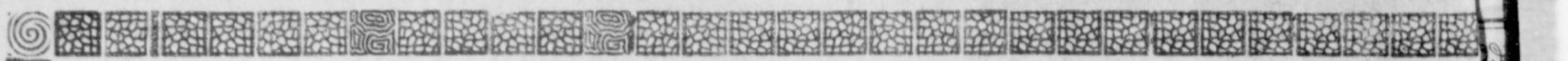

He arose in the morning as usual, dressed went out and did his feeding, returned to the house, stepped upon the gallery, was struck with paralysis, fell backwards on the ground and was a corpse in less than an hour.—Zephyr Mirror.

Will Yarborough returned from Shuttuck, Oklahoma, Monday night and said that when he left Shuttuck Thursday night, October 8, Walter Lindsey was improving. That his fever was about broke and he was out of danger, and unless he had a relapse would be able to come home in three weeks or a month.—Richland Springs Eye-Witness.

The cause of dead cotton on the rich lands of Texas has been found and the discovery is not credited to any government experts, but to a local farmer, Mr. A. C. Roberts, who lives just a few miles east of Lookhart. He says that dead and dying cotton is not due to alkali, weather influences, nor to lightning, but to a worm not much bigger than a common horse hair and about an inch or a little over in length. He says the worm burrow its way into a stalk at the surface of the ground, enters the pith and destroys it. As a proof of his discovery he says that any farmer with a good eye and cares to investigate can pull up all the dead cotton he cares to and he will find this obnoxious little parasite in the pith of every stalk.
