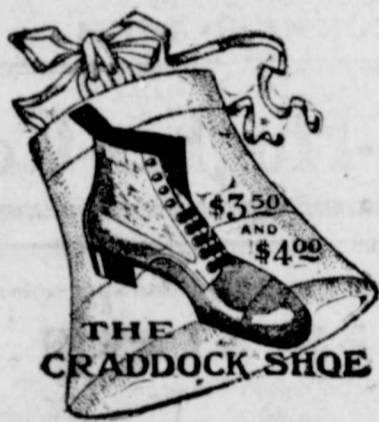

ELECTION RETURNS.

Democrats Badly Defeated in the National Election.

The election Tuesday resulted in a sweeping victory for the Republican party in the United States. Mr. Taft was elected by an overwhelming majority, the estimate being that he will have 327 electoral votes out of 483. Every doubtful state went to the Republican column, with the exception of probably Nebraska.

In the national house of representatives the Republicans will have 208 members and the Democrats will have 172. The senate will continue to be largely Republican.

Lodge Resolutions.

B. F. Geeslin was born in Mississippi, March 15, 1822. In 1851 he was married to Miss Mary F. Levens. In 1861, when the war between the states broke out, like a true southern man, he went to the front to defend his Southern home. After the close of the war, in 1866, he moved from Mississippi to Arkansas. Hear he remained until 1869, when he moved from Arkansas to Texas and settled in Johnson county, near Alvarado. Some time about the year of 1871 or 1872 he was made a Mason by the Alvarado Lodge No. 314. In the year 1873 he moved from Johnson county to what is now Mills county, then Hamilton county, and settled near Center City. He became a charter member of the Center City Lodge No. 558, in which lodge he remained until his Lord and Master called him from labor to his reward. As a Mason, Brother Geeslin was true, putting to practice, as far as was in his power, the great principles of the order. When his lodge stood in need Brother Geeslin was ever ready to help with his presence, his prayers and his money. Brother B. F. Geeslin's death occurred at the home of his son B. F. Geeslin, jr., in Goldthwaite, Oct. 22, 1906. He leaves a wife, three sons, one daughter and twenty-seven grand children.
