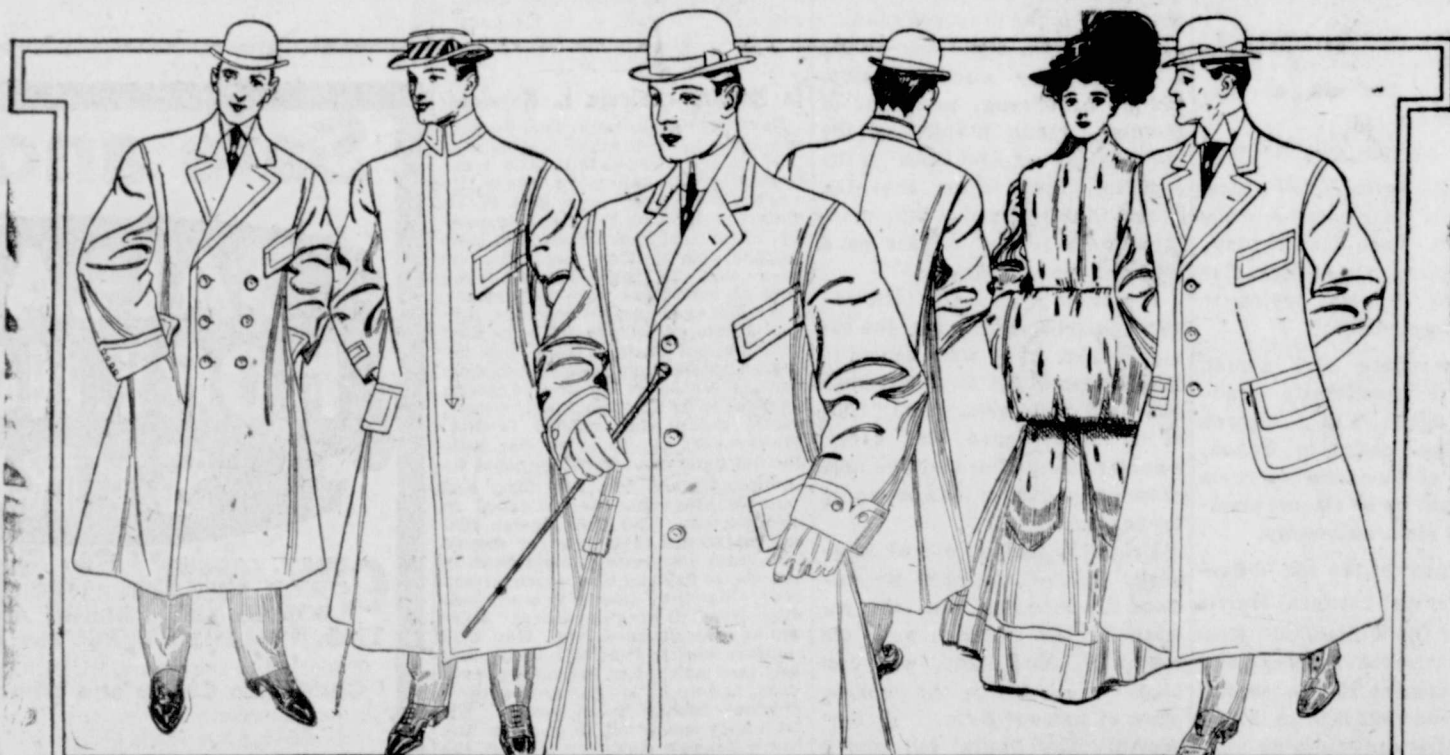

The Baptist of Texas will erect a \$40,000 college building at Palacios, in the near future.

Judge John L. Nolen, grand- sire of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of the world, died at Nashville, Tenn., Monday night.

Rev. Joseph Legarduer of St. Mary's Cathedral church, died of heart failure Friday morning, at St. Dominic Villa at Lampsas.

An immense meteor was seen passing over some of the north Texas cities Monday night, it claimed to have fallen near Wichita Falls.

The 5-year-old son of Jeff Beasley, near Cleburne, was seriously if not fatally injured from a kick on the head by a mule Monday morning.

A meeting was held in San Antonio this week to organize workingmen into opponents of state-wide prohibiting. The son of former Senator Mills was one of the main speakers.

The remains of Mrs. A. A. Gates mother of John W. Gates, who died at Port Arthur Monday morning, were taken by special train, to St. Charles, Ill., for interment.

S. Weber was shot and painfully wounded at Houston Monday night while trying to evade arrest. The officers were endeavoring to arrest he Lloyd Davidson for the alleged theft of lumber.

The two children of T. J. Renfro of Hewitt, aged 5 and 7 years, got lost from their parents while shopping in Waco last Friday, and were found late at night five miles in the country, trying to find their way home.

Notwithstanding his denial, the rumor is persistently circulated the Hon. Wm. J. Bryan contemplates locating in Texas. One of his enthusiastic admirers suggests that he be elected president of the state university.

A settlement of the tax differences existing between Harris county and the William M. Rice estate was reached last week and by the agreement Harris county has received \$22,200 in taxes, which amount accumulated during the last eleven years on the Rice hotel property.

Governor Campbell is evidently is earnest about having the Sunday law enforced in San Antonio, for it is stated that rangers will be sent to that city to see that the law is observed and to close the gambling houses. Galveston is also receiving attention from the governor along the same line.

The Eagle was among the fortunate ones who received invitations to the dinner by the 'Possum and Tater Club at McKinney next Tuesday night. The invitation states that 71 'possums, 25 bushels of persimmons and 100 bushels of potatoes have been provided for the occasion, which is the annual state meeting of the 'Possum and Tater Club of Texas. Tom Perkins is to be the toastmaster and there will be much oratory and a good time.

BROWNWOOD.

Much interest is being manifested just now in the probable location of the Federal building site. Announcements have been made of the selections in nearly all the Texas towns except Brownwood and the announcement for this place is expected any day.

There were seven clubs represented at the meeting held Thursday afternoon at Carnegie library for the purpose of organizing a city federation of Women's Clubs, and all the ladies in attendance were heartily in accord with the proposed plan.

At a meeting of the Floral Club held yesterday afternoon Mrs. W. D. Armstrong, president of the club, made a report of the receipts and expenditures of the carnival, and show that the Floral Club realized a little more than one thousand dollars as a result of their efforts.

A petition from North Brownwood citizens, asking for the establishment of a ward school in that section of the city, has been delivered to Secretary I. J. Rice of the school board, and a call meeting of the board will be held at an early date to take action on the matter.

Dr. A. F. McKnight, of Mercury, passed through Brownwood this morning with the remains of his eighteen year old son, J. B. McKnight, who lost his life yesterday in the packing plant of Armour & Co., at Fort Worth. The youth fell into a huge sausage mill and was crushed into a pulp before the machinists could be stopped.

But for the magnificent work of the Brownwood Volunteer Fire Department at midnight last night, a fire which did small damage, might have spread to other buildings and created havoc. At midnight an alarm was turned in for the Brownwood Hotel, near the Santa Fe depot. The building was in flames before the alarm was given and it was thought by nearly every person who saw the fire that the Brownwood Mill & Elevator was in flames.—Bulletin.

Mrs. G. W. Jackson this week ordered the Eagle sent to her son Frank at Marble Falls, where he is employed in the telephone business. He recently fell from a tree and broke one of his legs, but he is getting along nicely and it is thought he will soon be fully recovered.

Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXX.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, prohibition any persons under the age of sixteen years being on the streets or alleys or other public places of the city after the hour of nine o'clock p. m., and thereafter before the hour of five o'clock a. m., without the consent and authority of the parent or guardian of such person, and prescribing a penalty therefore.

I. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person under the age of sixteen years to be on the streets or alleys of Goldthwaite or any public place therein after the hour of nine o'clock p. m., and thereafter until the hour of five o'clock a. m., without the consent and authority of the parent or guardian of such persons, and any such persons so being shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

II. Any person guilty as set forth in the foregoing article, shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar, nor more than ten dollars.

III. Any fine imposed hereunder shall be collected as other fines and such persons so convicted shall be imprisoned in the county jail for not longer than ten days in case such fine and all costs are not paid.

IV. This ordinance shall be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, the official organ of the city, and immediately thereafter shall be enforced as allowed by law.

Passed, adopted and approved this December 7, 1908, at a regular meeting of the council; and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times, being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be spread upon the minutes of the council, and preserved in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the mayor pro tem, presiding at this meeting, in the absence of the mayor, shall be there kept as chapter XXX of the ordinances of the city.

Which ordinance so passed, approved and adopted, was filed with the secretary and by me this day examined and approved and signed and ordered attested. This December 8, 1908.
