#### Postal Law.

Editor Eagle:

For the information of the public I would respectfully request that you publish the following extract from the Postal Rules and Regulations.

Section 484. "Matter of the second, third or fourth class containing any writing or printing in addition to the original matter other than as authorized in preceding section shall not be admitted to the mails nor delivered, except upon payment of postage for matter of the 1st class. And any person who shall knowingly conceal or even close any matter of a higher class in that of a lower class and deposit or cause the same to be deposited for conveyance by mail at less rate than would be charged for both, such higher and lower class matter shall for every such offense be liable to a penalty of \$10.

This section of the Postal Law is sometimes violated through ignorance, sometimes knowingly through the desire to save a few cents in postage.

It is both dangerous and expensive to evade it, as will be seen from the above penalty and it is published for the express purpose of informing those who are ignorant of the existence of such a law. Those who willfully violate this law by enclosing letters with their photos, packages of merchandise or newspapers only paying that rate of postage required for the photos, merchandise or newspapers are not entitled to any leniency. Please bear in mind that it is the postmaster's duty to inspect all such packages before admitting them to the mail. Also remember that if such packages are closed against inspection they require the letter rate of postage and further, enclosing a written communication in an unsealed envelope or package will not make your postage any less than when you seal the letter or package. To make it more plainly. "Written communications require the same postage whether sealed or unsealed."

In every city the effort at cleaning up should be so active that extra carts will be needed on the next day to carry away the offending rubbish.

Let's all work together and make the city of Goldthwaite rival the famous spotless towns for purity.
