To Serve Dinner

The Ladies of the Home Mission society will serve dinner in the court house on Trades Day, one week from next Monday. This will be glad news to the public, for when the ladies serve dinner it is always a good one.

It is claimed by J. W. Rogers of Lacey, Okla., that he has invented and patented a machine that will pick cotton cleaner than it can be picked by hand, and will do the work of twelve men in the same period of time. Mr. Rogers says that he can go into a field of cotton that has been picked by cotton pickers and with his machine get 100 pounds of cotton to the acre that has been left by the pickers. The machine can be manufactured and sold for about \$150 to \$175. It represents in a great way the self-binder for small grain, the operator driving between the rows, and it picks the cotton clean as it goes.

A family took refuge in their storm house near Haskell last Friday during a storm and their residence was blown down on the storm cellar, which caused it to cave in killing two women and four children.

A farmer near Bonham was struck by lightning and the same bolt killed a span of mules he was driving. He may recover.

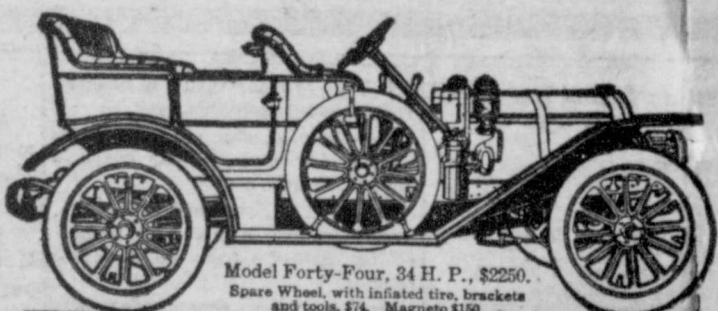

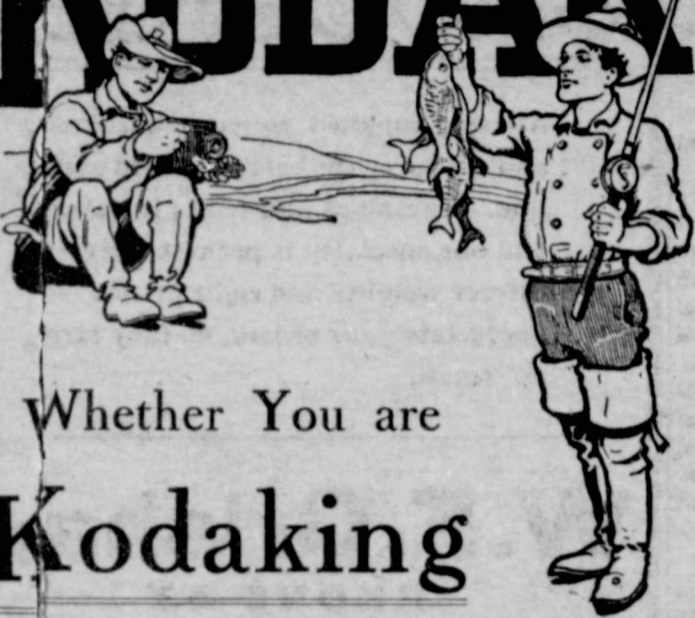

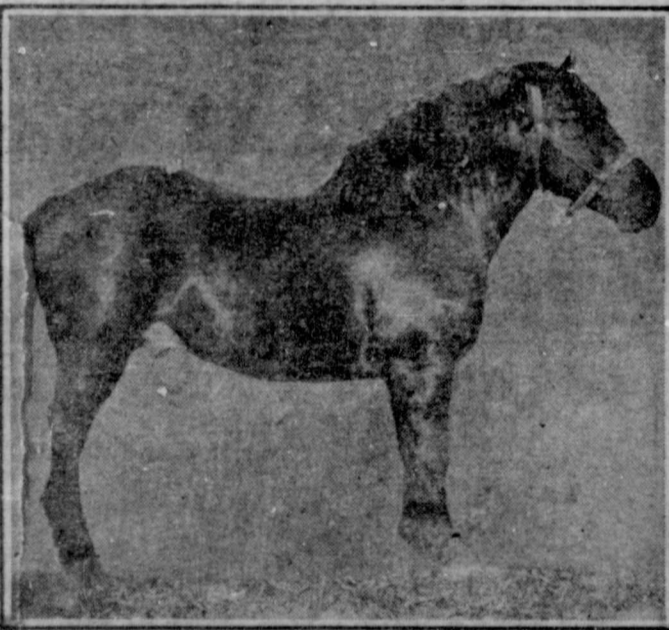

A New Telephone System.

The co-operative telephone system is being installed in Goldthwaite and those in charge inform the Eagle that they expect to have the business in operation in thirty days or less time. The work of digging holes and placing the poles has been in progress since Tuesday and the poles and switchboard have been shipped. The exchange will be located in the Brown building, over Mr. Murray's drug store, and the wires will be placed under ground in the business part of town, in order that they may be out of the way of all other wires and of the traffic.

The new company has for officers: Dr. M. L. Brown, president; J. C. Street, vice president; R. E. Grant, secretary and treasurer. These with Messrs. W. H. Fletcher and J. W. Roberts constitute the board of directors of the company.

Messrs. Fletcher and Roberts have charge of the work of installing the system and they have a large force of men at work and Mr. J. O. Harrell, who is experienced in that line, is superintending the construction.

Good Roads.

The subject that should be of vital interest to all the people everywhere is good roads. It is important to everybody to a greater or less degree and to the merchant and farmer it is of paramount importance, for obvious reasons. This being true, every interest should unite in securing the improvement of the public highways. Some of the heaviest taxpayers as well as other good citizens who do not pay a large tax believe that roads should be worked by taxation, while others equally as much interested and as patriotic are of the opinion that the work should be done by private subscription, but all agree that the public roads should be given more attention than they have had in the past. It might be best to have a road supervisor to give instructions and advice to road overseers and road workers, or the working of the road by contract for a stipulated sum per mile would be satisfactory, perhaps. At any rate, the roads in this county should be given attention before the time for moving the fall crops.

The Eagle's columns are open to short articles on road building and the methods by which it should be done.

Killed by Lightning.

Mrs. Abe Macklin was killed by lightning while at work in her husband's cotton field a short distance west of Mullin Thursday afternoon. A relative who was at work near her was stunned by the bolt, but was not seriously injured and revived in a few minutes. The bolt struck Mrs. Macklin on the right side of the head and ran down the right side of her body. She sank to the ground, having been killed instantly. The west bound local freight train was passing at the time and the train crew saw the lady fall when the lightning flashed.

Mr. Macklin is employed as section foreman for the Santa Fe at Mullin and was employed in the same capacity here a few years ago and the family is kindly remembered by many friends here. The remains of Mrs. Macklin were carried to Copperas Cove on yesterday morning's train for burial in the cemetery at that place.

Free mail delivery in Brownwood was begun Monday with four carriers.

Rain fell over a large portion of north and central Texas Saturday night and Sunday.

President Mora Peda of Brazil died Monday from grip. The vice president has taken charge of the government.

The town of Haskell was badly damaged by a storm and cyclone last Friday and four people were killed. Considerable damage was also done in the country.

The organization of a \$6700,000 corporation to manufacture chewing gum has been completed in New York. The company is to absorb six other gum factories.

A young lady near DeLeon was attacked by a large house cat Sunday and her hands were badly lacerated. The cat was supposed to have rabies and the lady was sent to the Pasteur institute at Austin for treatment.

The district attorney at Amarillo has asked for a change of venue in the case of a citizen charged with killing a state ranger at that place, alleging that the state can not get a fair trial where the killing took place and the parties were known.

The proceedings against Governor Haskell of Oklahoma for criminal libel, brought by W. D. Cardwell of Ardmore, have been dismissed, Governor Haskell having retracted the statements made in the alleged libelous article.

As the sheriff of Wilson county drew the black cap over the head of a Mexican to be hanged at Floresville last Friday the condemned man stabbed the officer with a sharpened spoon handle secreted. The officer was painfully but not seriously hurt and the execution was not delayed.

A number of Texas people were aboard the steamship Slavonica, which went on the rocks on one of the islands of the Azores group a few days ago. All of the 110 passengers on the ship were rescued by the steamship Princess Irene and carried to Gibraltar.

A heavy electric and wind storm visited Brownwood Saturday night. One residence was struck by lightning and destroyed. The telephone system was crippled and the electric lights were put out of commission for a time. The standpipe was struck by lightning and Monroe Ethridge, who was turning the water pressure into the mains from the standpipe was stunned and a wrench with which he was working was hurled farther than a person could have thrown it.

Packed in plane boxes and ready, evidently, for shipment, a quantity of rifles and ammunition, believed to be designated for Venezuelan revolutionists, was discovered at Franklin, Va., Tuesday. The rifles are said to be a part of a consignment of 15,000 Mauser weapons shipped from New York to St. Louis and back to Franklin, billed as pianos and packed to weather the trip to South America. Orders have been issued from Washington to seize the vessels on which the arms and ammunition are loaded if they should attempt to lift anchor.

John Wagner, who has been a resident of this county for twenty years, died at his home near Shive last Saturday, June 5. Hamilton's 26th annual picnic was attended by a large crowd from both the country and the surrounding towns.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wallace, and Miss Hudson, of Goldthwaite, came over to the picnic and to visit relatives.

The sad message was conveyed to Hamilton from Hico this morning that Wm. Conolly, Jr., of that place, had been accidentally shot while out hunting with a party on the Bosque.

Last Sunday the W. O. W. camp at Hamilton carried out the program as announced in the Herald and decorated the graves of their deceased brothers.

Geo. A. Shockley got his thumb-nail cut nearly off with a revolving brass fan Wednesday. He took hold of it to move it and it swung over and caught his thumb tearing the flesh about two inches from the end and almost taking off the nail.—Herald.

D. S. Hitt has sold his mercantile business to J. W. McCarty of San Saba and has purchased a store at Indian Gap, in Hamilton county.

The election last Saturday did not show any surprise to any one unless it was the size of the majority in favor of local option. There were few who did not anticipate an emphatic endorsement of the present status in reference to the question.

The school board accepted the resignation of Superintendent Parker of our public schools and at once upon its acceptance they elected Prof. M. K. Witt, who has been principal of the high school for several years, to succeed him.

A message was received by Dr. Hamilton last Saturday from his wife, stating that her father, J. A. Dickey had died at Gatesville after an illness during which she was at his bedside. Mr. Dickey formerly lived at Comanche and was one of our best and most respected citizens.—Chief.

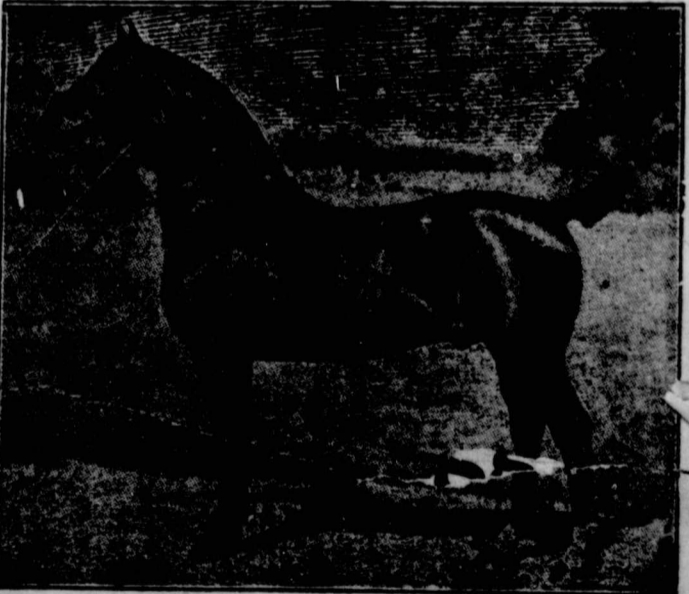
