**First Trades Day**

**A GRAND SUCCESS AND EVERYONE WELL PLEASED**

**A Fine List of Prizes**

**An Immense Crowd in Attendance and a Fine Exhibit of Live Stock and Farm Products**

Goldthwaite's first Trades Day was a great success and every body was apparently pleased with the outcome.

At an early hour on Monday morning the people commenced to arrive and by the time the parade started the town was thronged with people. It is confidently believed that there were more people here on that day than have been in this city on any one day in a good many years at any one time. They came from this and surrounding counties and the day was a pleasant one for everybody. The prizes were liberal and the number sufficiently large to get them pretty well distributed over the country and if there was any complaint about the manner in which the premiums were awarded the Eagle has not been advised of it.

The parade was far better than was anticipated, even by those who took part in it. A large number of the business houses were represented, some by decorated floats, others by buggies, ladies on horseback and boys carrying banners. Everything was appropriate and the people thronging the streets through which the parade passed complimented every representation in the parade and it would be almost impossible to say just which exhibition and decoration was the prettiest and most appropriate.

It was at first thought best to allow each prize giver to appoint his own judges, but later a meeting of the Commercial club was held and a committee composed of Messrs. J. W. Driskill, Jas. Rahl and A. J. Cookrum was named to judge the live stock, and those who had offered prizes for other things were left free to make the awards as they thought proper. A religious fanatic styling himself Adam God, who murdered a policeman in Kansas City last December, has been sentenced to serve 25 years in the penitentiary.

Dallas commercial club is planning to have extra electric lights in the business district during the fall fair. The additional cost of the lights for the occasion will be \$13,000.

Auto drivers in Tarrant county who over-run the speed limit have aroused the ire of citizens in the rural precincts. It is claimed by those who make the complaint that people and live stock are unsafe on the public highways because of these "soorchers."

Santa Fe officials have notified the Snyder commercial club to secure deeds to right-of-way for the Coleman-Texico line of that railroad through Snyder and several car loads of teams and tools have been unloaded at that place to begin work of grading.

A trunk containing \$3000 in money was taken from the home of a farmer in Gaudalupe county Sunday night by robbers. It was found in a thicket near the house, where the robbers had hidden it, evidently intending to return and complete the robbery after the search had been abandoned. The money will likely be placed in the bank hereafter.

Ten years from now, instead of kicking about automobiles using the public roads, people will pay fancy prices for farms lying along the public highways which have automobile lines, and the big cars will pass to and fro at regular intervals, picking up passengers wherever signaled and delivering them at their destination at a nominal fare. The automobile is destined to do even more toward removing the isolation of country life than have the interurban lines in the northern states, and before another decade is ended will be put down as one of greatest blessings to mankind of the Twentieth century. The things now complained of will no longer be worthy of consideration. Horses will become so familiar with them that they will shy no quicker than they would at a cultivator, wheel-barrow or buggy. They will be regulated by law that the speedomaniac and harum-scarum boys will not endanger the lives of people with their reckless driving. Instead of placing a number on the cars, which can do no earthly good after someone has been maimed or killed, every chauffeur will be required to stand an examination and take out a license before he is allowed to run on the roads. Nine-tenths of the complaints at the present time are caused by irresponsible boys, with neither judgment nor experience which any one should have before being entrusted with the management of one of these powerful machines.—Dublin Telephone.

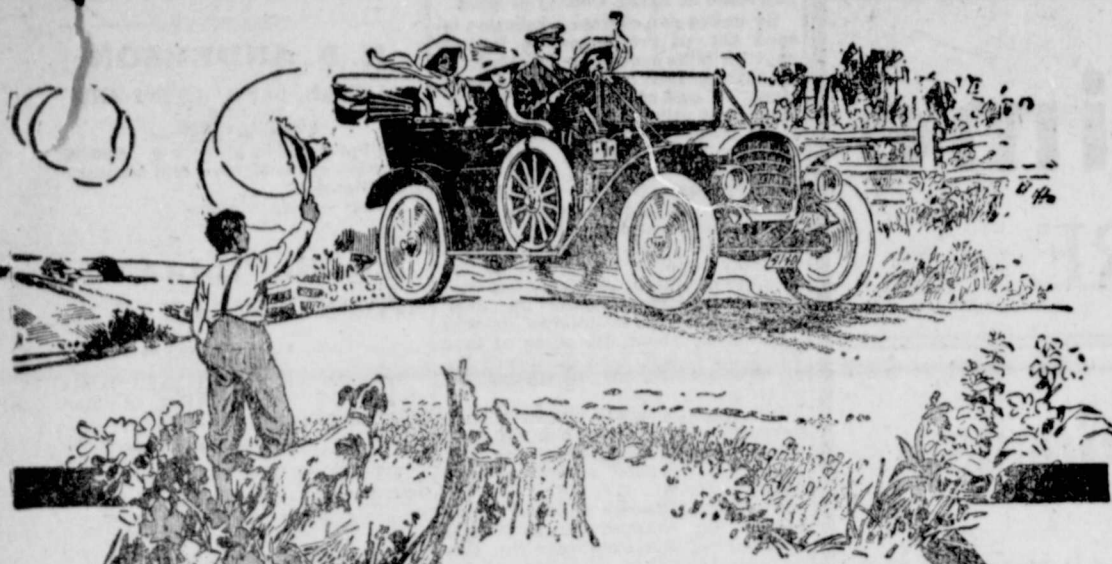
Daring Bank Robbery.

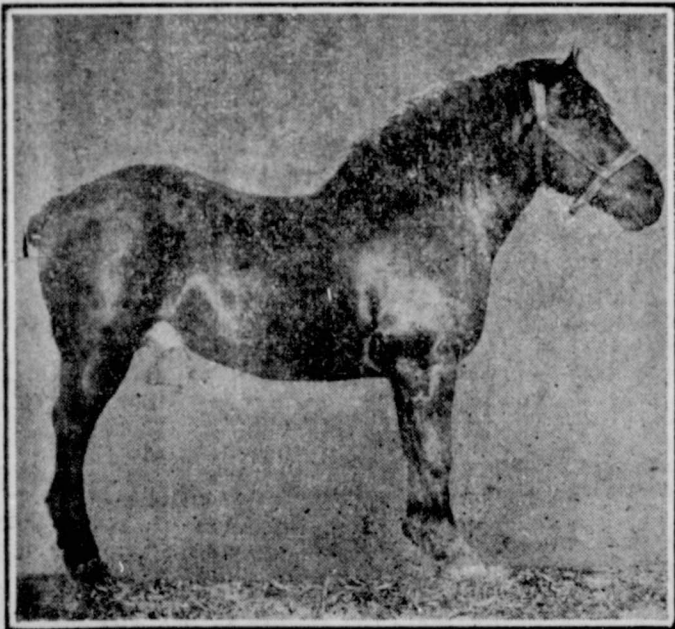

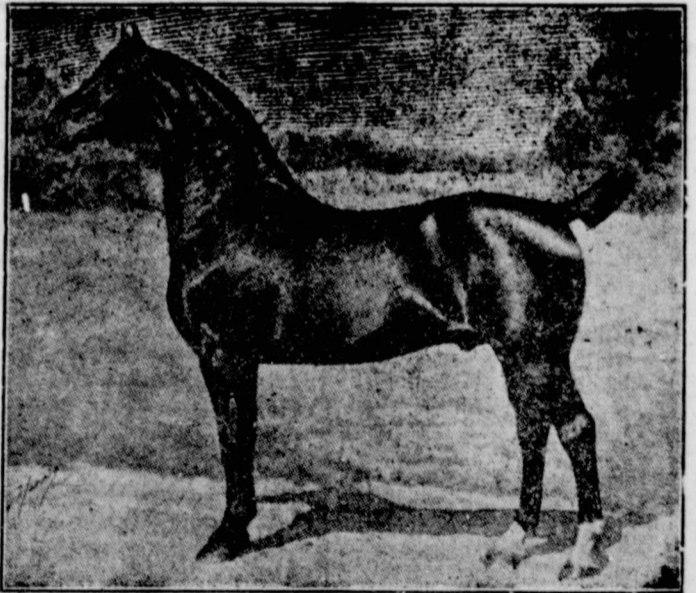
