City Council.

The city council met in regular monthly session Monday night. Mayor Randolph being absent, Jas. Rahl, mayor pro tem, presided over the meeting.

City attorney was instructed to prepare ordinance forbidding the doctoring or operating upon stock on the streets.

Proposition of J. T. Hines to out line streets in his addition to conform to the streets of the city was accepted.

An order was entered extending Parker street to the south line of the Hines addition.

Dr. J. M. Campbell was appointed city health officer.

Mrs. Mangrem was allowed \$5 for a strip of land on the extension of Driskill street.

Deed of D. Y. Fox to a 60 foot street across his land from Front street to Comanche road was accepted.

The Trent bank management was notified to remove the horse rack on the west side of Fisher street, next to the bank.

Notice was ordered given to P. H. Clements to remove his house out of Parker street within ten days.

Accounts for current expenses were allowed.

J. C. Bridges left Tuesday night for Austin to attend the encampment of the volunteer militia. He has been in the service a long time, with the rank of Captain, and has charge of the rifle range at this encampment. He expects to return home the latter part of next week. During his absence his place in the Eagle office is filled by Mr. Buis of Cleburne.

R. E. Clements and family left Saturday night for Mineral Wells to spend some time.

The burning out of a controller on a street car in Dallas Saturday night caused a panic among the passengers, resulting in eight persons being injured.

The suit of Eastland county against the Texas Central railroad for penalties aggregating about \$6,000,000 for failure to provide separate coaches for white people and negroes has been set for trial July 19.

Heavy rains and floods have done great damage in Mexico the last few weeks. The entire Laguna cotton district, south of El Paso, on the Mexican Central road, has been inundated and the loss to land owners is great.

Governor Campbell is doubtless sorry that he attempted to interfere with the route of the Coleman-Texico cut-off of the Santa Fe. By his correspondence with President Ripley he learned that it was none of his business whether the Santa Fe built through Abilene or missed that town a thousand miles. His excellency now probably feels that he was loaded.

The city council of Waco has adopted an ordinance requiring the street car company to sprinkle all streets traversed by its lines which are not sprinkled by the city.

The property loss in the United States, caused by fires and accidents from fourth of July celebrations is approximately half million dollars, while there were 344 people injured and 19 killed in celebrations.

The Southern congressmen have protested against the appointment of negro census enumerators in the southern states and will appeal to the president in the matter. It will really be a kindness to the negroes for the president to forbid their appointment.

The largest flag in the world was unfurled at Pittsburg, Pa., Monday, but it was too heavy to be suspended and pulled thousands of pounds of roofing from the building from which it was suspended. The flag was 80 feet wide, 160 feet long and weighed over 3000 pounds.

Cashier King, who claimed to have been robbed in the branch of the Waggoner Bank in Fort a few days ago, was placed under a \$5000 bond after having been indicted by the grand jury for embezzlement of the bank's funds. The shortage was made good to the bank by the brother of the man arrested.

The 9-year-old boy who shot and killed a young lady in Waco last week has been placed under a \$500 bond by Judge Surratt. At first the court refused to take notice of the case, saying the boy was too young for court proceedings to be held in connection with his case.

The heat of last week caused many prostrations and some deaths in the larger cities. Chicago perhaps suffered more severely than any of the cities, a total of 84 deaths due to the heat having been recorded in that city. A negro died from the excessive heat in Houston last Saturday and a white man died from the same cause in Sherman the same day.

The campaign for state and county offices has opened already and formal announcements of candidates are constantly being made. Cone Johnson, Judge Pointexter and Attorney General Davidson have all made their opening speeches in the gubernatorial campaign and the county candidates are giving their friends confidential talks all the time. It will certainly be a long campaign, for the nominating convention will not be held until next July.

Some party or parties dynamited a pool room in Killeen Saturday night and the pool tables were demolished, the glass front of the building shattered and other furniture in the room damaged. The proprietor of the place had been requested by a mass meeting of the citizens to remove his outfit, as they considered it detrimental to the morals of the city. He closed the place for a few days and then re-opened. A few years ago a similar place was demolished in that city.

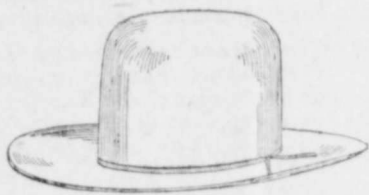

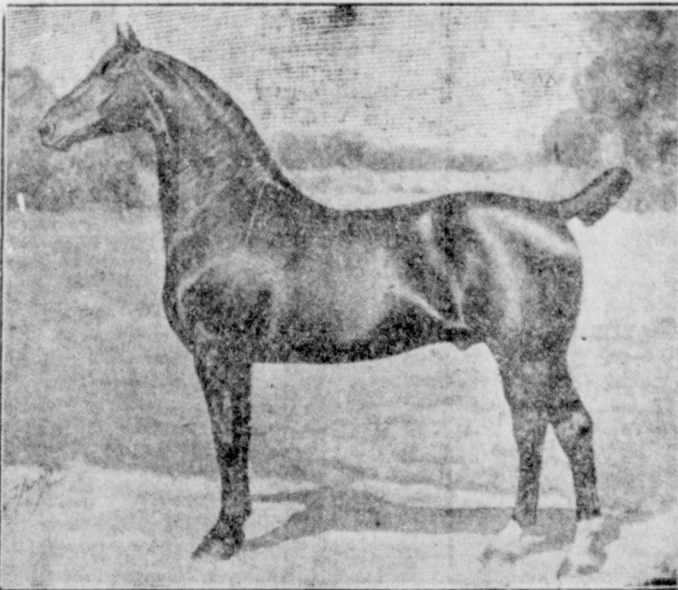

For that reason, if for no other, the bottler is obliged to observe the laws of cleanliness in order to produce salable goods. If bottled drinks are clear, it is positive evidence that they are made in a clean shop, and bottled in clean bottles.

2nd.—There is abundant medical testimony to prove the beneficial influence and refreshing effect of carbonic acid gas upon the appetite and digestion. Ask your own doctor about it. 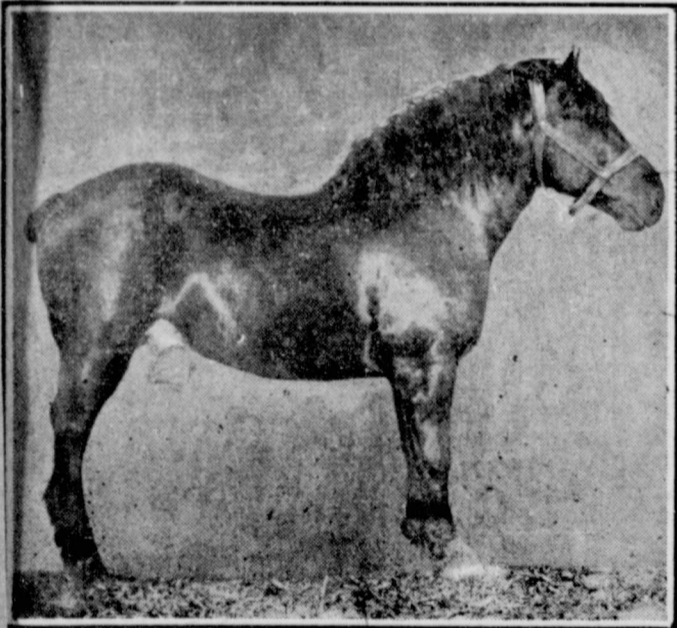

City Ordinance.

CHAPTER XXXII.

An ordinance of the city of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, providing for a penalty for any one doctoring sick horses, mules, jacks, cattle, sheep, goats, or any other stock on the streets of the city of Goldthwaite, or for any one to perform any kind of surgical operation, on any of the above named stock, or for any one to work on or pull teeth from the mouth of any of the above named stock, on any of the streets of the city Goldthwaite.

ARTICLE NO. I.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that it shall hereafter be unlawful for any one to doctor any sick horse, mule, jack, cattle, sheep, goat, or other stock upon any of the streets of the city of Goldthwaite, and that it shall be unlawful for any one to perform any kind of surgical operation on any of the above named stock, on the streets of the city of Goldthwaite, or for any one to work on or pull teeth from the mouth of any of the above named stock upon any street in the city of Goldthwaite, or for any one to do or perform any other kind of work on any of the streets of the city of Goldthwaite, that will scatter or cause to scatter any foul matter or puss upon any of the streets of the city of Goldthwaite, and this ordinance shall include any kind of work done, or any kind of treatment done or performed on any of the above named stock, when sick upon any street of the city of Goldthwaite.

Any one violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined in the sum of \$5.00, and all cost of prosecution and each day shall constitute a separate offense.

Passed, approved and adopted, this the fifth day of July, A. D. 1909, at a regular meeting of the city council, of the city of Goldthwaite, by unanimous vote of the council, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times having been unanimously suspended. And it was ordered that this original ordinance be filed in the office of the city secretary, and if approved by the Mayor is to be signed by him, and there be kept as charter No. 32, of the ordinances of Goldthwaite.

Which ordinance passed, approved and adopted as aforesaid, was filed with the city secretary, and by me examined and approved and signed, and ordered published, as required by law, and it was ordered that same be kept by the city secretary.
