These prices are for one issue only: "The rate is as follows: Ladies Home Journal, \$7 per line, \$5,000 per inside page; inside cover pages, \$5,500 and \$7,000 for the back cover. Saturday Evening Post, \$5 per line, \$3,000 per inside page. Inside cover pages \$3,300 and back covers \$3,600.

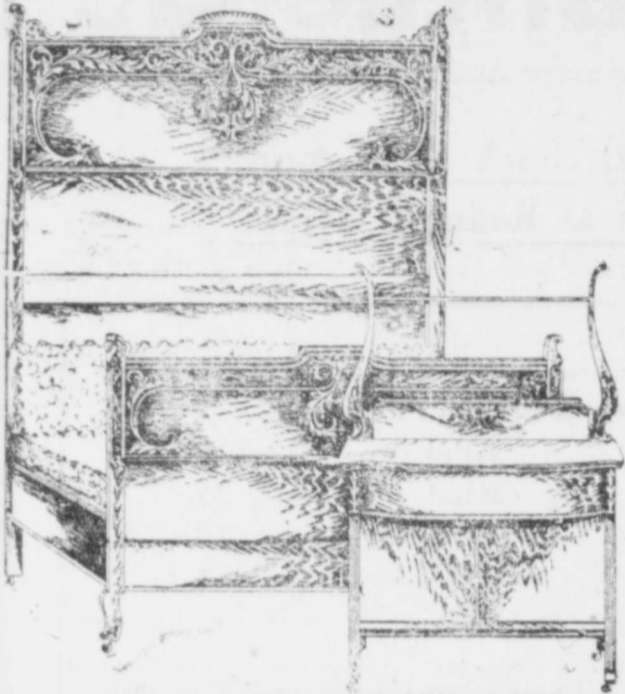

Scholastic Census.

The scholastic census of Mills county (exclusive of Goldthwaite and Mullin) shows 932 boys and 847 girls of American parentage; 64 boys and 49 girls of German parentage; 5 boys and 7 girls of Mexican parentage; making a grand total 1904 children in the county over the age of 7 and under the age of 17 years.

Last year there were 1963 in the county, 1003 boys and 960 girls. The figures this year show a decrease of 59, there being 2 boys less this year and 57 fewer girls.

In Goldthwaite there is a total of 374 scholastics. Of that number there are 186 boys and 195 girls of American parentage, 4 boys and 9 girls of Mexican parentage. Last year there were only 336 scholastics in the district and of that number there were 181 girls and 155 boys.

In Mullin district there are 106 boys and 99 girls, making a total of 205 scholastics, all of American parentage. Last year there were 97 girls and 98 boys in that district in the scholastic age.

Increase in Values.

The taxable values of the county have increased about \$250,000 since last year's rendition, and the board of equalization only raised the values about \$50,000 from the renditions made to the assessor. Last year the total renditions amounted to \$6,002,220, while this year they will aggregate something near \$6,260,000, which makes a fine showing for the county.

The state reunion of Confederate veterans is to be held in Mount Pleasant next Thursday and Friday.

A leather worker in Waco, James Parks, beat his wife into insensibility Sunday morning and then hung himself. He was dead when discovered, but the woman will probably recover.

A wealthy citizen of Omaha, Neb., has filed suit for divorce against his wife simply because she shies brick-bats at him, calls him "Jackass Bill" and wears male attire.

The state school board found that the apportionment of \$675 made last year was 75 cents per capita too much and a draft had to be made on the next scholastic year's apportionment to cover the deficit.

A young lady awaiting the arrival of a train at Elgin last Saturday night was criminally assaulted. A base ball player from Manor was arrested charged with the crime.

Wm. J. Bryan has written President Taft suggesting that a constitutional amendment be submitted to the people providing for the election of United States senators by a direct vote.

There was a jail delivery at Lufkin Saturday night when the jailer went to feed the prisoners. He was overpowered, bound, gagged and robbed and four men made a getaway. Several negroes confined in the jail refused to leave and gave the alarm.

The secretary of the American Bible society says the Bible is the best selling book in the world. That it has been translated into over 500 languages and dialects and that the total number sold each year will reach 12,000,000 copies.

Four train loads of tobacco from the fields of Tennessee and Kentucky were received at Pensacola, Fla., this week for export to Liverpool. The cars contained a total of about 1,725,000 pounds, which will form almost a complete cargo for a vessel.

A cyclone destroyed the home of M. D. Dowell near Hermleigh, Scurry county, last Friday. There was no damage by the cyclone except to the one house and when the neighbors hurried to the assistance of the family they found all dead in the ruins of their home except one small child. Another cyclone destroyed a dozen houses and killed and injured a number of people at Dunn, Scurry county, Saturday afternoon. In both cases the clouds came from the south.

NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Cited From the Leading Local Papers.

LAMPASAS.

Mrs. E. N. Talbott, who has been suffering for the past five months from paralysis, died at her home Wednesday evening.

Jim Reynolds and P. J. Blackburn have purchased the model market, which has been conducted for some time by Gus Hakemaack.

Dr. H. F. Dickason has purchased the new stone building, recently erected by Barnes & Little on the northeast corner of the square, the price being \$4000.

Mrs. C. T. Gooch of Shive, Hamilton county, returned to her home Wednesday morning, after having spent several days here with her sister, Mrs. W. F. Read.

W. F. Reed who was stricken with paralysis Wednesday night, June 30th, died Sunday, July 4th at 8:30 p. m., having never regained consciousness. The deceased has been in poor health for years and the stroke, while probably caused by a fall, was not altogether unexpected.

The first Monday brought the usual number of traders to Lampasas, but it appeared that the stock exhibited was of poor quality and less desirable than is usually offered. A few of the horses looked as if they should demand the attention of the society for the "prevention of cruelty to animals."—Leader.

COMANCHE

R. A. Slack recovered a judgment against the comrade for \$750 damage resulting to his minor son's eye.

An order was made on the docket transferring the E. C. Gaines murder case to Hood county for trial, the Judge changing the venue on his own motion.

The Mulkey meeting began last Saturday morning as announced, at the skating rink. Mr. Burdine, the choir leader, arrived Friday morning and Mr. Mulkey that night.

Prof. Byrd, who was elected principal of the Comanche schools, has definitely decided not to accept the place because of having already accepted the superintendency of the Blanket public school.

Todd Switzer, who was seriously injured by a fall from a horse last Friday, has never completely recovered consciousness, though at times he has partially lucid moments when he recognizes those around him. His condition is still critical.

Mrs. L. E. Granger died at the sanitarium at Temple Thursday night at 12 o'clock. The remains will be brought to Comanche for interment today. Mrs. Granger has been seriously sick for a long time and death came as a relief to her sufferings.

Temple Hale made an assignment of his business July 7th for the benefit of his creditors. It was one of the largest grocery businesses in town and was the property owned by J. C. Evans & Co. W. G. Botts is named as assignee under a \$8,000 bond. The assets are listed in the assignment papers at \$7,040, and the indebtedness at \$8,694—Chief.

BROWNWOOD.

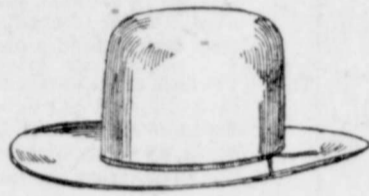

Every practical bottler knows that viscous fermentation, or what he technically calls "ropiness," is his worst enemy and its cause is dirt. For that reason, if for no other, the bottler is obliged to observe the laws of cleanliness in order to produce salable goods. If bottled drinks are clear, it is positive evidence that they are made in a clean shop, and bottled in clean bottles.
- 2nd.—There is abundant medical testimony to prove the beneficial influence and refreshing effect of carbonic acid gas upon the appetite and digestion. Ask your own doctor about it. It is carbonic acid gas in Kumiss and in Champagne that makes them so refreshing and so easily borne by weak stomachs. The bottler does not now make the gas, but buys it, purified and liquefied, from the large manufacturers, thus insuring the use of none but the purest and best gas.
- 3rd.—Ordinary drinking water, from whatever source it may be derived, from spring, well, lake or running stream, is at certain time of the year contaminated with organic matter of living germs held in solution. Trip From Mullin to Colorado.
Colorado Springs, June 8,
Editor Eagle:

I am here six miles from the base of the Rockies that only look to be a few hundred yards away, with pencil and tablet to give a brief outline of the trip from Mullin to Colorado Springs, Col.

Leaving Mullin on the night of the 4th, I took the train for Dallas and as the grey dawn of morning reached out to kiss away the shades of night our train pulled into Cleburne and from there on to Dallas my eyes scanned the barren fields and was led to exclaim, how grateful we of Mills county should be for the prospect we have for a crop, for this part of the moral vineyard looked the very picture of starvation.

Monday evening I went to Fort Worth, where I spent the night and next morning at an early hour I was at the Santa Fe depot, where I watched for the incoming train from Mullin, which was about three hours late on account of a broken down engine. When it arrived I found Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Fairman, Miss Kate and Earl on their way to Washington by way of Colorado Springs, so I had good company all the way.

As to crop prospects, we did not see anything at all promising in the Lone Star State, but after we crossed the Red River the waving corn, wheat and oat shocks and cotton fields gave promise of an abundant harvest. This state of affairs extended through Oklahoma, Kansas and far out into Colorado. In Colorado and Kansas we saw thousands of acres of alfalfa and the shocks and large ricks were evidences of an abundant hay crop. The scarcity of fruit of all kinds was very noticeable notwithstanding the many orchards with their healthy looking trees.

The towns and cities all along the line will compare favorably with any part of the country. Space forbids further description.

Here I am looking out upon the Rockies as they lift their peaks skyward, but above all, Pikes Peak snow capped summit looks down upon the rest and seems to laugh at the floating clouds as they dash along its sides far beneath. Her great rugged spires of flood washed rocks, one of which is the balanced rock that seems to have been hurled from some height and fell with a mighty crash and poised on end in the quiet dell below. The garden of the gods, the seven falls of water leaping from crag to crag, the gateway to the garden of the gods, the beautiful mountain scenery impresses us with the power and wisdom of a loving heavenly Father who condescended to make such a beautiful world for us to enjoy. The old signal station on the very summit of Pikes Peak might be used as a faint illustration of the city not made with hands, the destination and home of the redeemed, where we can look out over the battlements back on a storm tossed and sin cursed earth and rejoice that we are safe forever.

We close with Wright's poem of the cog road to Pikes Peak.

Its path of steel winds wondrously around,
The jutting crags and ledges that abound;
On this grim mountain peak, nor stops until
It gains the summit of this mighty hill.

It leads in safety where the Red man bold
Ne'er dared to trust his snowy foot to hold.
It ends in cloudland, which he never thought
To reach and line, and therefore never sought.

Where once the eagle nested on the ledge
Where once the wild sheep leaped from craggy edge,
Your ralls removed rude barbarian's ban,
And left these wilds a heritage to man.
