COMMERCIAL CLUB.
Matters of Importance Proposed and Discussed by Members.
Goldthwaite Commercial Club met in regular weekly session Monday night.
The committee to secure premiums for next Trades Day and arrange entertainment reported some progress in securing the premium list and suggested that a display of sewing and needle work be provided for Trades day. Mr. Gatlin having agreed to allow the use of one of his buildings for the purpose and a number of the ladies of the embroidery club having agreed to assist with the exhibit, the committee on premiums was instructed to include needle work in the list of contests for premiums.
The Club's by-laws were so amended as to make monthly dues 50 cents for those who do not attend as many as two meetings in a month and 25 cents for those who attend two meetings. The object of this amendment is not to raise the dues, but to secure a better attendance at the meetings.
Committee on securing grounds for a county fair reported having inspected several desirable tracts of land near the city and the price on some of it being reasonable. The committee was continued with instruction to ascertain the amount of capital necessary to purchase land and make improvements and to solicit subscriptions for stock in the enterprise.
The committee on entertainment for Trades day was advised to arrange for an automobile

parade, there being about twenty machines in the county. R. E. Clements announced that he would give a premium of \$5 for the best decorated automobile in the parade. The owners of the automobiles will be requested to use no advertising on their cars in the parade.
Notice was given that an amendment to the by-laws would be offered at the next meeting allowing the secretary compensation for his services and making it his duty to collect the monthly dues from members.
School Board Meeting.
The Goldthwaite school board held a meeting last Saturday and elected L. H. Little to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. M. Skaggs and re-elected J. W. Butz to membership on the board.
The resignation of Miss Billingsley as teacher in the school was accepted and Miss Guyer of Brownwood was elected to the position.
The bond of W. C. Dew as custodian of the funds of the school was approved.

A County Fair.
The Commercial Club has decided to give support to the organization of a county fair and has a committee soliciting subscriptions for the capital stock. This is the best and most beneficial work yet undertaken by the club and will be of lasting benefit to the entire county. A county fair encourages improvement in stock and farm products and provides an opportunity for displaying the products to the best advantage. Properly managed, it would pay a reasonable return on the money invested and would have an influence in increasing the property values of the county. The Eagle believes the committee will have no trouble in placing the capital stock and that the enterprise will receive the liberal support of the citizens of the entire county.

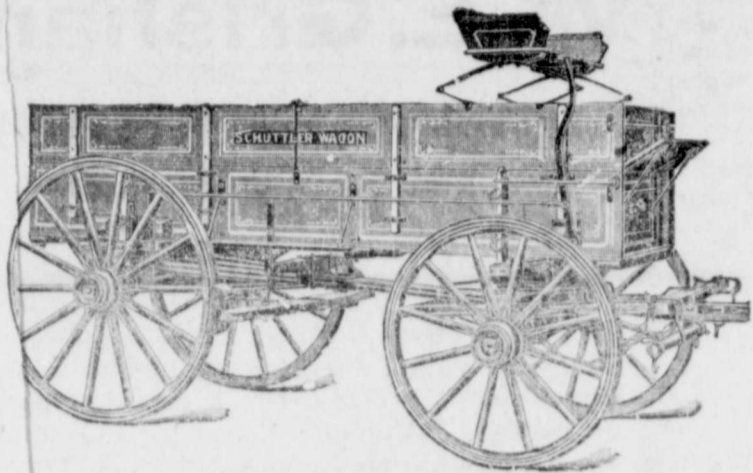

At Canton, Van Zandt county, Justice of the Peace Hatcherson shot his wife and then shot and killed himself. The woman will probably die.

A man at Roxbury, Mass., who was afflicted with paralysis allowed a swarm of bees to sting him and is now nearly recovered from the paralysis.

President Ripley of the Santa Fe railroad says his company will build a line from San Angelo through Sterling City to a connection with the Coleman cut-off.

It is said that the supporters of Gen. Reyes, candidate for vice president of Mexico, are soliciting funds and personal aid from the Mexicans in Texas.

A number of counterfeiters of Mexican money were arrested in Kentucky a few days ago. They had \$1,000,000 in counterfeit notes in their possession when arrested.

Robt. Burdette, the journalist, humorist and minister, has resigned the pastorate of a Baptist church in Los Angeles, Cal., on account of ill health and it is said he will never recover from the injuries to his back, which he suffered in a fall last winter.

A big auto crashed through the railing of a bridge over the river at Seattle Friday night and the driver of the machine and three women were plunged into the water and drowned. Recklessness in running the machine was the cause of the accident.

A few days ago a bent and headless pin worked out of the arm of a young lady in Patterson, N. J., and an investigation revealed 16 other pins in the same arm. It is thought she swallowed the pins when a child and they have just now worked out.

A man at Denison has three acres of cotton from which he expects to gather seven bales and he is hopeful of getting as many as ten. He claims the cotton to be a development from the Georgia Wonder and says under ordinary conditions he believes it will make five bales to the acre. Many of the stalks have 200 bolls on them, although the plant was injured by the drouth.

Employment agents in St. Louis have been endeavoring to secure men to work in the steel mills, offering as high as \$6 per day for labor, but out of 300 idle men only a score could be employed, the others preferring to go fishing or idle their time away in the city. It is the man who refuses to work when an opportunity offers that has to depend on charity when he or his family have a few days sickness or some slight misfortune. This class of people is not confined to St. Louis.

School will open in Brownwood on September 6th.

Mrs. J. R. Ray died very suddenly last Saturday night. Her husband had died only a few weeks ago. She had been in fairly good health and was up going about her work until the death stroke came. After supper she complained of not feeling well and told her son that she expected he would have to get the doctor and immediately collapsed, dying before he could get her on bed and summon a physician.

The Santa Fe proposes to build a road from the San Angelo branch, between Lampasas and Goldthwaite, through San Saba county, through or near San Saba town, and through or near Richland Springs, to the western line of the county; provided, the people of San Saba county secure the right of way from the Santa Fe to the western boundary of the county and depot grounds, and a bonus of \$75,000. They added to that

proposition a condition, that if they had absolute assurance that irrigation would be secured they would not require the payment of the bonus.

RAILROAD TO SAN SABA

Goldthwaite Business Men Send a Delegation to Meet Officials.

H. Clements, E. M. Moon and W. C. Dew appointed to confer with the officials and secure, if possible, a proposition for building a branch road from this place to San Saba.

The committee talked by phone with one of the officials, who stated that no definite plans had then been formed and that the company was open for a proposition from Goldthwaite.

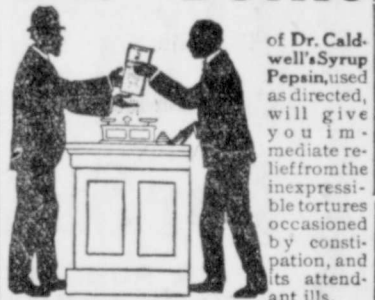

Miller went to San Saba in automobiles to confer with the railroad officials concerning the proposed branch road, but they still were unable to secure a definite proposition, further than the statement that the company would expect a donation if a branch road was built from this place.

As the officials were positive in their declaration that no selection of a starting point had been made, it is safe to say that Goldthwaite will hear more from the officials before the building of the road is commenced, if it is to be built.

Bridge Across Bennett.

The county commissioners met here Tuesday and contracted with C. Q. Horton of Austin, the contractor who built the bridge across the bayou at Slack crossing, to build a bridge across Bennett creek at Center City, on the Goldthwaite and Center City road. The bridge is to be steel and 70 feet long, with steel piers. It will be located just north of the present crossing and is to be completed in forty days from the date of contract. The price paid is \$1095, one half at the completion of the bridge and the other half in February.
