Good Hay.

It has been proven that the cotton leaf makes fine hay.

When the stock is small and foliage heavy, as at this time, great quantities of forage can be put up for winter feed and at trifling cost. The mowers used for cutting other hay crops will cut the small cotton stocks like magic. When leaf is well wilted the stock should be raked into rows. By this method the hay will cure without much bleaching.

Petition Filed.
The petition that was circulated by some of the opponents of the incorporation of Goldthwaite asking for an election to abolish the city incorporation, was filed with the county judge last Saturday, but the election will not be ordered on that petition, as it contained 103 names and about one-fourth of the signers were not qualified voters in the city. The law requires that 100 qualified voters sign a petition before such election can be ordered. 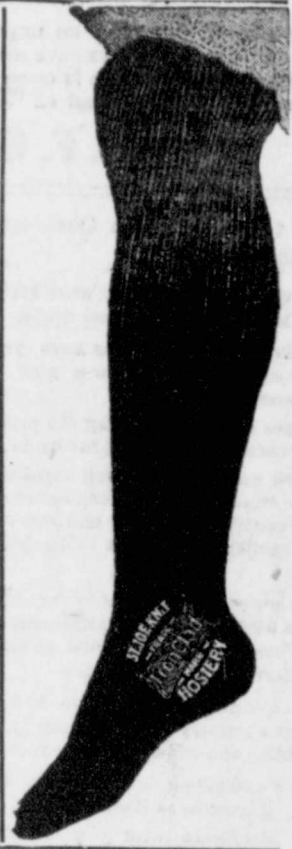
