Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

BROWNWOOD.

Dr. W. B. Anderson and wife are at home from a month's pleasant and profitable stay in Chicago.

Dr. F. M. Lankford, of Rockwood spent Friday night in the city and while here gave the Bulletin a call and showed samples of coal that he is now mining at Rockwood.

There was considerable excitement occasioned in the Live Oak community on Friday afternoon when a very strong flow of gas was struck in a well on J. C. Grantham's place.

On Monday evening at the Methodist parsonage Rev. C. R. Wright performed the marriage ceremony that united W. E. Carlton and Miss Ollie Brewer as man and wife.

J. A. Austin is here to day from Galveston looking after business affairs. Mr. Austin says he has been delayed some

in getting his export business going on at Galveston on account of delay in arrival of machinery for taking the lint off the cotton seed. He expects to be running the machinery in a few days.

The announcement of his death was not a surprise to the people here, for it was known that he had been in a critical condition for several weeks and had suffered a second attack of paralysis a few days before his death.

Capt. Street was a pioneer in this section and was engaged in the mercantile business at Star for a long time and owned a large amount of land in that section until recently. He moved to the west a few years ago and at the time of his death his home was at Roscoe. He owned considerable amount of land in the western counties and was a man of large interests. He had the friendship and confidence of all who knew him and the announcement of his death was received with much sorrow in this county, where he had so many friends.

His son, Mr. J. C. Street, was with him when his death occurred and Mrs. Street and children, Walter Henry and wife, Autrey Mills and Elder Bradley left Thursday morning for Roscoe to attend the funeral.

W. R. Hearst is running for mayor of New York in opposition to the Democratic candidate for the office.

Two men charged with robbing the bank at Carlton some time ago made their escape from the Hamilton jail Sunday night.

It is said the high price of seed wheat will cause many farmers in Texas to sow oats where they have prepared their ground for wheat.

Rev. Frank Norris, editor of the Baptist Standard, has been called to the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Fort Worth.

Great damage was done in Key West, Fla., by a hurricane from the gulf Monday. More than \$2,000,000 in property loss is reported. There was also considerable damage at interior points.

A small lumber laden vessel was found floating in the gulf a few days ago and towed into Port Arthur by another boat. There were five seamen aboard, who have been without food and water for sixteen days. The crew originally consisted of seven men when the vessel left Mobile bound for a Cuban port, but in the storm of Sept. 12 one was washed overboard and another died since from starvation. The vessel was demasted by the hurricane and virtually ruined, but was kept afloat by the cargo of lumber.

The Eagle has received from the Dallas fair management a beautiful exhibit job, which is attractive in itself, but upon the reverse side it is even more attractive, being a season ticket of admission to the fair and grand stands. The fair begins today and the Eagle hopes to be represented there sometime before the close and will most probably have a representative there next Saturday, which will be Press day. President Taft is to be there and will speak before the grand stand at 6 o'clock that afternoon.

Officers in Houston discovered a large number of hogs in cold storage in that city that had died from cholera.

Receipts at the state treasure for the last month were considerable in excess of the receipts for the corresponding period last year.

There was a head-on collision between a freight and passenger train on the M. K. & T. railroad near Temple Sunday night. Some of the passengers were bruised, but only two mail clerks were seriously injured. The cause of the collision was the misreading or the disregard of orders by some of the train men.

Saloons in Stockton, Cal., will be opened on Sunday hereafter, as a result of an election in that city a few days ago. A year ago an ordinance requiring the closing of saloons on Sunday was approved by a small majority, but the citizens there are evidently tired of being "dry" on Sunday.

Rev. Carrick, pastor of a Presbyterian church at Lawrence, Kan., who resigned and went to work as a street car conductor, giving as his reason for the change that a minister could not be honest and live up to his profession, returned to his ministerial vocation after a week. He announces he will become an evangelist.

A brother of the man who assassinated President McKinley applied to the police judge in Los Angeles, Cal., to be locked up during President Taft's stay in that city. He said he did not want to be shadowed or suspected of having a desire to imitate his brother's example.

The publisher of a farm paper in Chicago was sentenced to six months in jail in that city a few days ago for making false affidavits as to the circulation of his paper. He admitted that he had claimed ten times as many subscribers as he actually had and that the claim had been made in order to get advertising.

President Taft will reach El Paso today and will meet President Diaz of Mexico there and will go into Mexico this afternoon to attend a banquet prepared in honor of the two presidents. He will spend nine days in the state and will be in Dallas next Saturday, which date has been made "Taft Day" at the fair. Many thousands of Texans will be there in order to see a real live president.

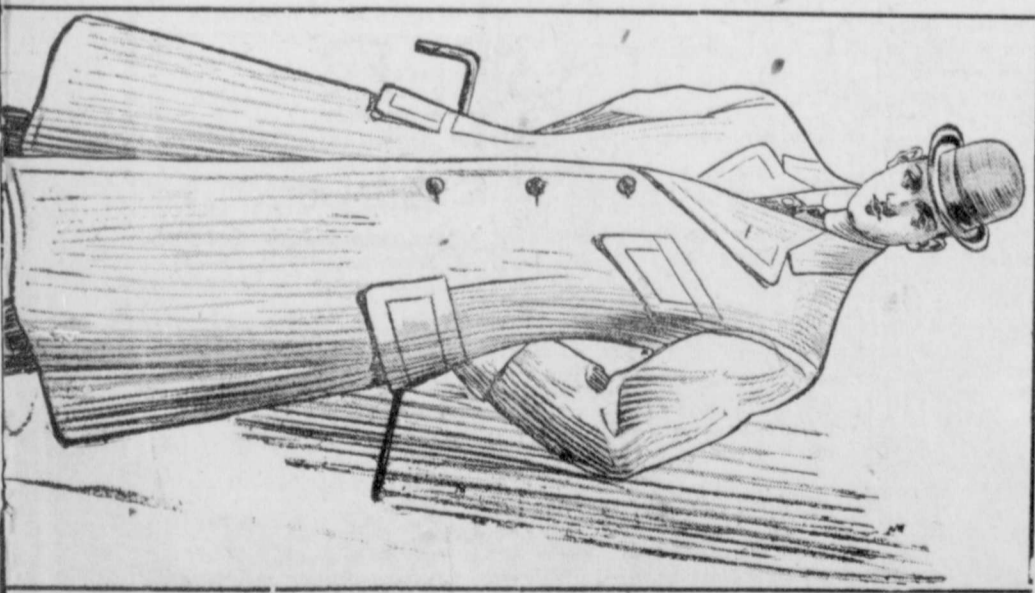
