LOMETA.

Floyd Kirby left Sunday for Stanley Chappel, where he will teach the school this term.

The Methodist revival closed Sunday night; 21 additions to the church as a result of the meeting.

Floyd Walsler was brought here by his brother, Ben, Monday morning from North Dakota almost entirely paralyzed.

Tuesday morning about 9:30 fire was discovered in F. W. Dent's barn, and before men and water could be had it had gained such a headway that it was soon burned to the ground.

The Santa Fe Employees Magazine is authority for the statement that \$5,200,00 has been appropriated for the erection of a new depot in Lometa and to install a pump house and machinery and better the water facilities here.—Reporter.

SAN SABA.

Ed Means and Miss Della Stevenson were married in the parlor of the San Saba House last Sunday afternoon.

R. O. Harris and his associates who are opening up a new townsite south of town are plating their land and otherwise improving it.

W. L. Yarborough, of Palestine, and Walter Ford of Goldthwaite, were here Tuesday. They had been up in the Richland country looking after their real estate in that part of the county.

Lee Kirkpatrick, a former San Sabaiter but has been living and prospering in Martin county for several years, bought last Saturday from Leigh Burleson the 24 foot front on the west side of the public square, being the lot on which stands the old rock building, for a consideration of \$3000.

Forest the 9 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Mayo, who lives in Shaw Bend, was dangerously hurt last Friday evening. He and another brother were riding a mule, with harness on from the field to the house; for some cause the mule began pitching and threw them off and this one's foot caught in the harness and he was dragged for some distance. Public Weigher Thomas reports that he has weighed up to this date 2319 bales of cotton, and there are 155 bales stored in the farmers union warehouse and yard making a total of 2474 bales as receipts up to this date.—Leader.

Last Saturday night robbers entered the dry goods store of Sellman Brothers at Rochell, and made way with a watch and several suits of clothes but did not secure any money.

At three thirty this afternoon the residence of R. A. Lavelly, a farmer who lived near Indian Creek was burned. The fire originated in the cook stove, the family, with the exception of an aged blind woman, being out in the field picking cotton. The old lady smelled the fire and felt the heat and made her way to the front porch where she was standing when the neighbors saw the fire.—Bulletin.

The Collier House, a wooden

building located one block south of the public square, was destroyed by fire just before midnight Tuesday night. There were sixteen people in the building, and all was asleep when the fire broke out, and all escaped, though some were quite seriously burned.

The remains of Joe Harris, whose tragic death on his ranch in Utah was noted in the Herald last week, arrived in Hamilton on the morning train Saturday, and was laid to rest in the Hamilton cemetery at 2:30 p. m. that day, a large concourse of relatives and old friends of the deceased being gathered around the tomb. Dr. W. W. Fowler conducted the funeral services.—Herald.

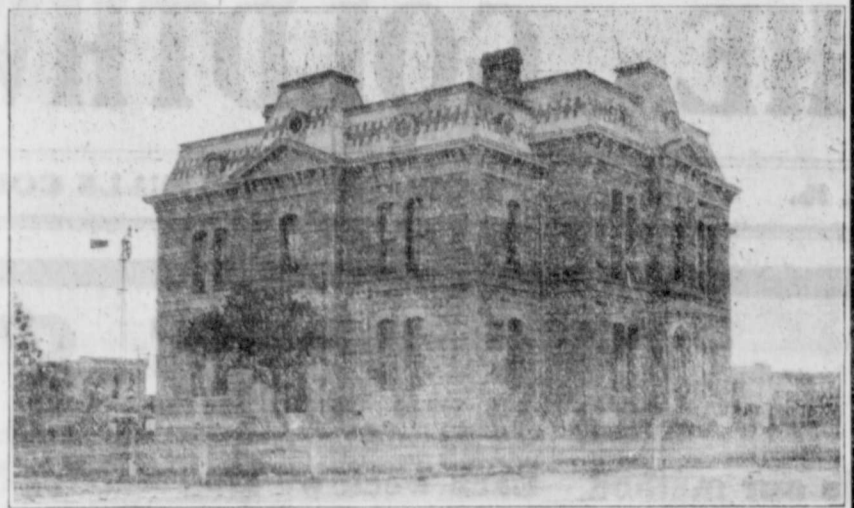

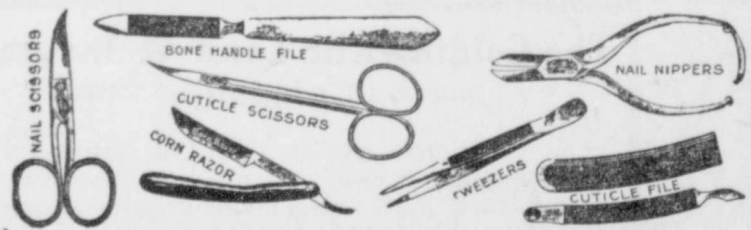
