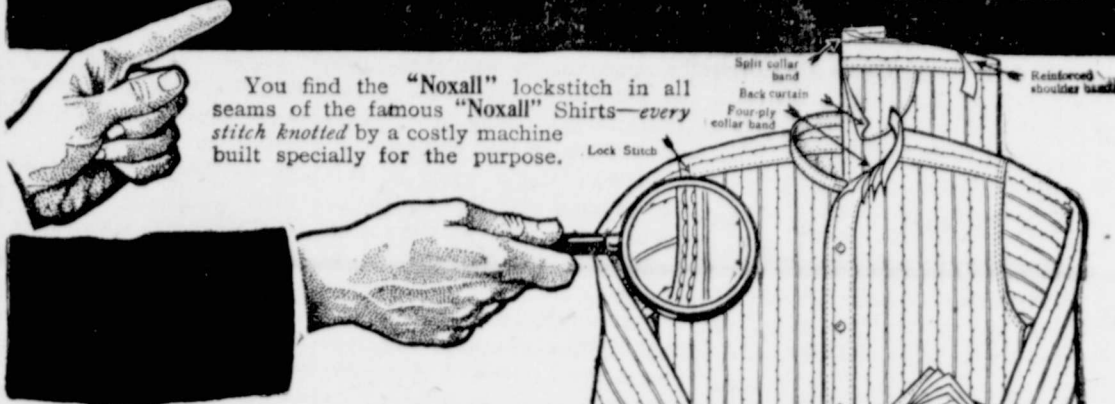

New Pumping Plant.

From the Brownwood Bulletin, we learn that the city of Brownwood has recently completed the test and accepted the new pumping plant installed by Hall Machinery Co. of that city.

This installation consists of a three cylinder vertical gas engine rated at 100 H. P., and gas producer using Texas lignite for fuel, and a compound centrifugal fire pump guaranteed to deliver 850 gallons of water per minute against fire pressure of 125 pounds per square inch. The plant was tested in every way by the city of Brownwood before acceptance, but on every test it did more than the manufacturers guaranteed.

In the matter of fuel, this 100 H. P. engine operates ten hours on one ton of Texas lignite costing \$2 per ton, delivered at Brownwood. It shows such a saving compared with the steam plant heretofore used by the city that they expect to reduce their fuel bill from over \$4200, per annum to approximately \$700. A portion of this saving is by having the pump station nearer the city, thereby reducing pipe friction. The gas producer and engine are guaranteed to operate on one-third the fuel cost of the best steam plants.

While pumping for fire service in the recent test, four lines of fire hose were laid from the hydrants. Three of these carried one inch nozzles, while the fourth had one and one-half inch nozzles. With these four fire streams running the pump and engine were able to maintain a pressure of 75 pounds per square inch at fire hydrant. Pumping against domestic pressure, this plant is able to pump 1500 to 1800 gallons a minute.

The installation is complete in every little detail, being so designed that one man can operate the entire plant. Everything has been arranged for the convenience of the operator, and for quick service when needed. Without any fire whatever in the producer the engine, under test, has been able to kindle a fire, generate the gas, start all the machinery and begin to pumping water in eight minutes from the time the match was applied to the kindling in the producer. Brownwood expects this new pumping plant to show such an economy in fuel, as compared with a steam plant, that it will pay for itself in about three years.

We can go to our loved ones, but they can never return to us. God forbid that we should wish them back to a world of trouble, sorrow and care.
