### SAN SABA

The school tax assessed for San Saba independent district amounted to \$6,454.94.

Rev. L. C. Sharp has tendered his resignation as pastor of the Presbyterian (Cumberland) church and the resignation has been accepted.

The state board has agreed to purchase \$10,000 of San Saba independent district bonds and will probably take the remainder as soon as the money is available. Our board has accepted the proposition.—Star.

The pulpit committee of the Baptist church this week decided to recommend to the congrega-

tion at a conference Sunday that the Rev. George W. Shaefer be called to the pastorate.

There were 385 poll tax receipts issued by city collector, T. O. Moore and assistant, Sam Switzer, up to Monday night, out of a total of 483 assessed. Total of all taxes collected \$19,000.

The county singing convention is to be held at the Presbyterian church in this city today and tomorrow. A large attendance is expected and considerable preparation has been made for the meeting by the singing people here and the classes at other places.

**COMMERCIAL CLUB.**

**Important Subjects Discussed and Committees Appointed.**

The Goldthwaite Commercial club held a meeting in the court house Monday night, when the oil mill committee reported having heard nothing from Mr. Benigni concerning his intentions, and asked for further time. The committee reported having solicited subscriptions for stock in an oil mill to be built and owned by local parties and met with great success, the universal opinion appearing to be that the enterprise should be owned by Mills county people. The subscription list showed about \$80,000, which is believed to be far in excess of the amount necessary. The committee was continued with instruction to communicate with Mr. Benigni and ascertain if his company would sell their holdings here. It was also decided to send a representative to Holland or Ballinger to ascertain the merits of a new system in operation in the oil mills at those places.

A committee composed of Jas. Rahl, B. F. Geeslin and R. M. Thompson was appointed to confer with the commissioners court relative to the erection of a band stand on the public square.

Z. D. Kemp, A. E. Evans and R. E. Clements were appointed to collect the monthly membership dues and solicit new members for the club.

There was a good attendance at the meeting and a lively interest was taken in the subjects under consideration.

**Obituary.**

Mr. J. L. Spinks was born in the State of Mississippi September the 12, 1838. He came to Texas at the age of seventeen, locating in Tyler county and was married to Miss Eliza A. Cheek July 4, 1861.

To them were given seven children, three boys and four girls. Only three of the children lived to see the end of their faithful father's life. J. W. and J. M. Spinks and Mrs. E. J. Ferguson, all of whom live in Mills county, Texas.

At the outbreak of the civil war he entered the Confederate service, where he remained during the four years of national strife. After the war he settled in Brazos county, after which time he lived in Somervell and Mills counties respectively moving to Mills county in 1891.

He was made a Master Mason by the order of Free Masons at Johnsonville in 1879. About the age of thirty-five he was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, and remained a consistent and faithful member of the church until his death. After protracted sickness which was borne with much patience he died March 10, 1909. His body was interred in Mullin cemetery with due form and ceremony by the Mullin order of Free Masons.

Truly he was a man of prayer, his earnest words to the waiting congregation and the voice of his earnest prayers still live to aid many of us who knew him in his last years "Yea, sayeth the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them."

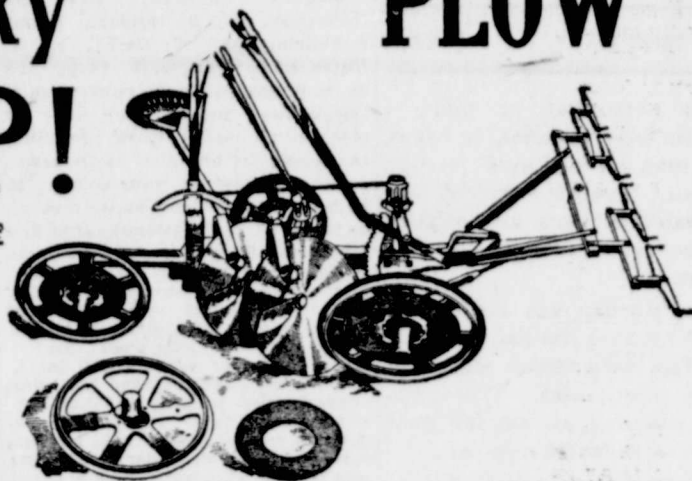

The proposition to build a railroad from Coleman to Brady has been abandoned for the present, because some of the interested sections did not raise the bonus required by the promoters.

Last Monday was the coldest day New York has had this winter. The thermometer registered but 2 above zero. There was great suffering among the poor and several deaths resulted.

A farmer near Temple, B. B. Dunlap, found a dynamite cap and not knowing what it was he gave it to his children to play with, after carrying it in his pocket several days. His wife took a hair pin and scraped away some composition on the cap and it exploded and badly lacerated her hand and tore away three fingers.

The new mayor of Salem, Mass., announced that he would donate his salary of \$125 per month to the city to buy a play ground for children, but when he called for his first month's warrant he found his landlady had attached it for a board bill due and his philanthropy met with serious interference.

A young woman, thought to be Miss Beatrice Snyder of Buffalo, N. Y., committed suicide Monday, by wading into the river just above Niagra Fall, and as her body was swept over the brink she turned her face toward would-be rescuers and smiled a farewell to them. She had been despondent since the death of her fiance.

Dr. Edward Richards, who was for 30 years a missionary in Africa, announced to the laymen's conference in St. Louis this week that his belief is that the commonly accepted statement that negroes are descendants of Ham is all wrong. He says that Adam probably had four brothers and that the colored people are descendants from one of these brothers.

A resolution was adopted in the United States senate Monday to loan government tents for use at the Confederate reunion at Mobile, Ala., in April. The only opponent to the proposition was Senator Heyburn of Idaho, who took occasion to make a venomous speech against the South. The contempt shown for him by all of the senators was as complete as it was deserved.

The San Angelo Press-News has suspended publication, after a long and hard fight for existence and the expenditure of many hundreds of dollars by the owners. The manager of the business, in announcing the suspension, says the patronage is not sufficient in the town to sustain two first class newspapers and that where two are attempted the publishers have to depend upon resourcefulness rather than resources. What is true of San Angelo is true of many other places in Texas where two or more local papers are struggling for an existence and the business men are really oppressed by the heavy expense of patronizing all of them to reach the same clientage, when one good local paper would be beneficial to the town and to the business community.

## Hermleigh, Texas.

Editor Eagle:

As it has been four years since I left old Mills and located in Scurry county, I will give you some of the happenings and developments of our county.

First, the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific railroad entered our county on the southeast and angled through to the northwest. Next the Santa Fe cut off entered the southeast and runs parallel with the R. S. & P. crossing the county from southeast to northwest. On these roads sprung up the little town, Hermleigh, which has a scholastic population of 300, this is our home town.

In our county site, Snyder, there is being completed an \$80,000.00 court house, which is an ornament to the town. The northside square was completely burned out a few days ago, in which Clyde Wilsford, one of the Goldthwaite boys, had his store burned.

While we thought crops would be light this last year, there was more made than was expected and some are not yet through gathering the fleecy staple.

Mr. Editor, if any of the Mills county tillers of the soil want to pitch their tents in Scurry county there's plenty of room. Add, Mr. Editor, if you ever come this way don't forget to pull on the latch string of our door.
