The census reports are to be based on conditions as they exist on April 15

Hon Wm J. Bryan left Buenos Ayres the first of the week en route for the United States.

Prohibition leaders at Waco met last Saturday and planned to petition for a local option election for McLennan county.

Three men lost their lives in a hotel fire in Forney last Friday morning and \$25,000 worth of property was lost when the city hotel was burned.

In the state campaign all the candidates seem to have been lost sight of except those who want to be governor, while prohibition and Baileyism are the issues.

In several counties of the state ladies have announced as candidates for office. In most of the offices the duties can be performed by ladies and the law allows them the privilege.

Fire destroyed one of the principal business blocks at Cisco last Sunday morning. The buildings burned were two-story structures recently erected. The loss was about \$50,000.

Twenty-five families were buried beneath an avalanche near Wallace, Idaho, Sunday night. Some were rescued alive, but it is estimated that 75 people lost their lives, either by being frozen or smothered beneath the snow.

Mrs. Kemper and daughter-in-law were mistaken for burglars at Lane City last Monday night and fired on by the two Kemper boys. The younger Mrs. Kemper was mortally wounded and lived but a short time. While the elder lady is dangerously wounded, there is some hope of her recovery.

The body of an unknown man was found at Beaumont Sunday morning, lying in a ditch in which there was about six inches of running water, and death is believed to have been caused by drowning, as considerable water was found in the lungs and there were no indications of violence.

Charles Phillips, who owned a quarter section of land near Guymon, Okla., has a new idea as to loosening the ground to make the soil productive. Last week he measured off an acre of land and dug 100 holes about twenty feet apart. In each hole he put one half-pound of dynamite and connected the whole field with an electric current, and discharged the whole works at once. The charge tore up the earth to the depth of four feet and pulverized the soil.

The members of the senate committee on printing have been commanded to appear in court in Washington and show cause why they did not consider the bid of a certain paper company in awarding contracts. The supreme court for the district of Columbia in a decision on the subject says the committee men can not evade the service of the court on the plea that they are members of the senate and therefore immune from the service. The court says no man in this government is above the law and the government itself is beneath the law.

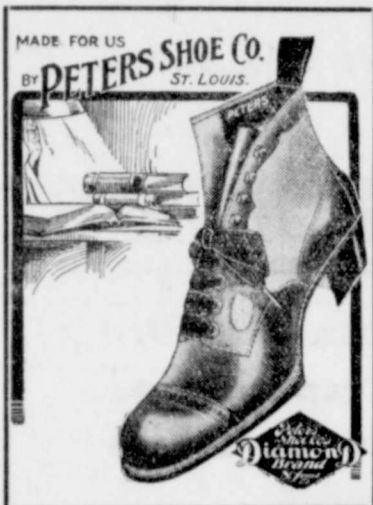

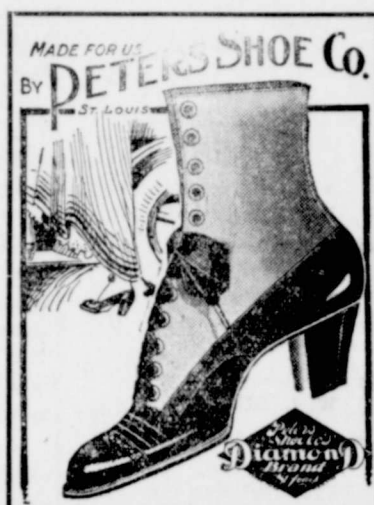

From Gen. Martin.

Austin, Tex., Mar. 1, 1910.

Dear Eagle:

When I last wrote the Eagle, shortly after the death of Capt. Sexton, I little dreamed that so soon the death angel would call for another member of our Camp—and that one, Capt. D. S. Kelly.

Capt. Kelly's death was a painful surprise to me. He was several years younger than I, always healthier and stronger, and the jolliest man amongst us. It never entered my mind that I would outlive him. But the "grim monster" is no respecter of persons. He takes the strong as well as the weak; and generally our loveliest and brightest ones are his victims.

There is, perhaps, not a man in Mills county whom I have known longer or better than Dan Kelly. In 1880, I think it was, he settled near the San Saba Peak where I then had a sheep ranch. He moved to that place from Bosque county. There being but few neighbors there we were often together. When I was married to my present wife in 1882, Capt. Kelly accompanied me on the trip and was my "best man." We were both stockmen and hence were drawn together by our business, and for more than fifteen years we were close neighbors. But it was as an Ex-Confederate soldier that Capt. Kelly shone the brightest. His heart was always aglow with patriotic fire when the "Lost Cause" was under discussion. He lived that Cause with an undying devotion.

He was a charter member of our Camp, and it was never too hot or too cold for him to attend the meetings. No man stood before him in loving obedience to the duties that devolved upon him, and during our annual reunions his heart was always overflowing with patriotism and joy. He was raised in North Carolina and attended a school presided over by Gen. D. H. Hill. As a cadet, perhaps, he went into the service under Gen. Hill and was attached to the cavalry corps of Gen. J. E. B. Stuart. I knew nothing personally of Capt. Kelly's service, but, knowing him as I do, I feel warranted in saying he was a true, faithful soldier. But he is gone from us now to join his comrades in that blessed re-union above.

Farewell, dear friend! May the blessings of God abide with your loved ones left behind.
