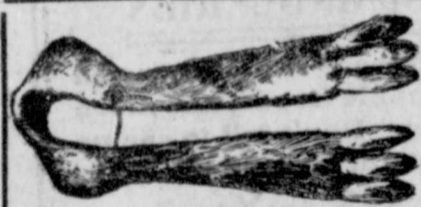

### Gleanings--Thanksgiving.

Editor Eagle:

This pleasant afternoon, Thursday, Nov. 24, 1910, finds this writer full, with food that's thankfully received. It's not all of life to be a book agent--

There is some sunbeams bright,  
If we only accept the "light"  
With heart's love for our friends'  
delight,  
As Thanksgiving--with appetite.

Luke 17:23--And He took the cup and gave thanks, and said; Take this and divide it among yourselves, (Eagle, please do this dividing) (Nehemiah 11; 17.--And Mattaniah, the son of ---, was the principle, to begin the thanksgiving Nehemiah 12; 8.--Moreover, over the thanksgiving, he and his brethren. Read the psalms of thanksgiving.

Having been asked (by a South Bennett schoolboy) today "Why is today called Thanksgiving?", in answer to his question I am pen-painting an answer for our

friend of friends, the Editor, so that the Eagle readers may share with us.

First, our feelings of gratitude; second, our words of gratefulness; third, our deeds of appreciation. "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love, one to another."

Some time in the autumn of 1621 an impulse stirred the colony in Massachusetts to give public thanks to God; for they had gathered their 20 acres of Indian corn which the hospitable native Indians had taught those Puritans to raise, etc.

So those few families with seven rudely constructed residences prepared a feast of oysters, clams, venison and wild turkey for their guests--a boat crew with captain and 20 soldiers--who gave a parade drill to entertain some 80 Indian bucks, squaws and papposes, guests of those noble men and women "palefaces." Thanksgiving thus "divided among yourselves" with these kind redfaces in 1621 so protected these holy women (Titus 2: 2-4) of the Massachusetts coast, according to history gleaned, as did the scarlet thread in Jericho when Joshua took it (Joshua 6: 25), when the war paint was put on by the natives in revenge of maltreatment.

Thanksgiving was made national in 1863 in the U. S. A. Surely there are some of our dearly beloved fathers in the "Blue and Gray" that can reflect with trembling heart beats, almost fluttering with sensational thanksgiving now in memory of 1863. Thanksgiving! May we

The God of harvest praise;  
In loud thanksgiving raise  
Hand, heart and voice.  
The valleys smile and sing,  
The forests and mountains ring,  
The plains their tribute bring--  
Thanksgiving--rejoice!

"Again I say, rejoice and be glad."--Psalm 118:3, and 114:8, 118: 1.
