## MORE ENTERPRISE

Improvement in Public Works Suggested.

Since I have been invited to take the initiative in suggesting public enterprises for the town, I will give my opinion as to some of the conditions and improvements necessary.

To begin with, I think Goldthwaite is the best town of its size on the map, both as a business location and in a social and moral way. There have been fewer business failures in Goldthwaite than in any town of this size I have ever known, and the people here all—or nearly all—appear to be prosperous and contented. In fact, the trouble appears to me to be that they are too well contented—to well satisfied with the conditions as they now exist, and do not care to change. But it is necessary to make some changes, for we must either be going forward or backward all the time.

The first thing I would suggest would be a revival of the Commercial club or some similar organization of business men, and let all those who are so fond of talking "enterprise" meet with the organization and take part in planning for the betterment and upbuilding of the town and county. Let the membership dues of this organization be \$5 at least and \$10 if thought advisable and make the monthly dues not less than \$1, while I would favor \$5 as the minimum for monthly dues. I learned a long time ago that you must get a man financially interested in anything where you wanted his attention and influence. If he puts money into the organization he is mighty likely to use his utmost endeavors to make it a success and a source of profit to the town.

We need good roads. That question has been thoroughly discussed and well understood, but we can never accomplish much as a town until we do build good roads into the surrounding communities. Other counties are interesting themselves in road-building and we must awake to our own interests in this matter.

There are a great many enterprises I could suggest, such as brick factories, broom factories, etc., but with a well organized and enthusiastic organization of business men and good roads leading to the town all these things would seek a location at Goldthwaite.

I hope others who are interested in the upbuilding of town and country surrounding will give us the benefit of their views through the Eagle.

**Facts About the Comet.**

It is traveling through space with a velocity of forty miles a second. Its head is over 200,000 miles in diameter and its tail, which is at its greatest length, is approximately 30,000,000 miles long.

It will be brightest, so far as the earth is concerned, on May 25, when it may be seen in the western heavens just after sunset.

From a scientific standpoint, the appearance May 18 will be the most interesting. In the evening of that day the earth will be whisked through the comet's tail, the earth's atmosphere warding off the deadly cyanogen gas. At that time the head will be nearest the earth, a trifle of 14,000,000 miles away. Attendant phenomena will be best observed from the islands of the Pacific Ocean.

The best time to observe the comet in the morning will be from May 10 to May 16, when it will rise in the east, tall first, about an hour before sunrise.

After May 16 it draws toward the sun, and after May 18 will be seen in the western evening sky, setting after the sun.

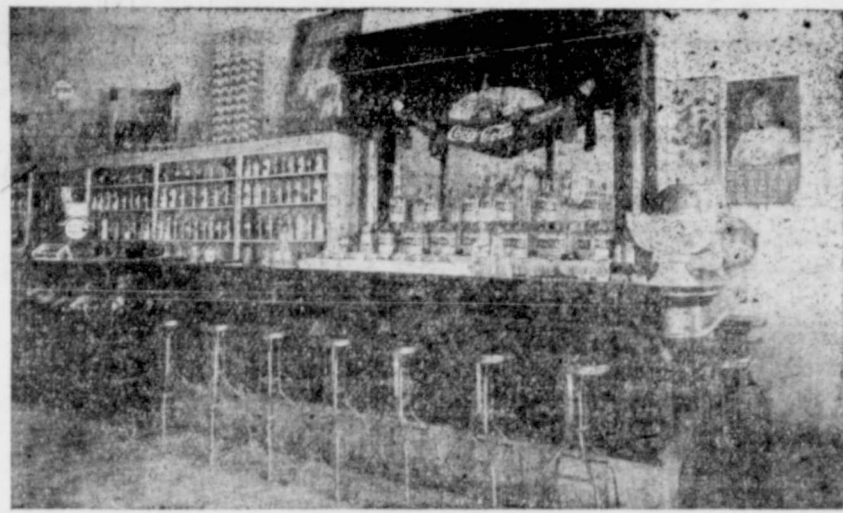

Amarillo's new \$100,000 Santa Fe station and Harvey eating house were formally opened last Saturday afternoon.

An interurban line between Houston and La Porte will be built in the near future by the Houston and Bay Shore Traction company.

State Health Officer Brumby has chosen Manton Hannah, a student in the University of Texas, as consulting engineer in the matter of state sanitation.

Halley's comet appears to have lost its tail, according to some who have seen it, but astronomers tell us that the body will brighten soon and the tail will again be visible.

The entire middle west and northwestern states were held in the grasp of snow, ice and sleet three or four days of the past week, and the loss of crops and fruits will run into millions of dollars.

W. W. Keys, senior editor of the Baptist Courier for thirty years and prominent in the councils of the Southern Baptist Convention, died last Monday in his home in Greenville, S. C.

Physicians near Manor, Travis county, have found a peculiarly diseased patient whom they believe to be afflicted with leprosy. The case will be taken to Austin to be diagnosed by leading Austin physicians.

Hon. Wm. J. Bryan arrived in New York Monday on his way home from a trip to South America and elsewhere. He was enthusiastic in predicting the success of the Democratic party in the next national campaign.

It is possible that the inexhaustible supply of sand near Austin may be utilized by the Indiana Sand-Lime Brick Co., of North Judson, Ind. for the making of sand-lime brick, said to be harder than the ordinary sand and clay bricks.

A peddler in Austin has entered suit against the city for \$10,000 because his horse ran away with him and threw him into a ravine. He says in his petition that the city should have fenced the ravine and, thereby, prevented the injury to him.

The secretary of the Rockefeller hook worm commission has notified the Texas health department that the donation of Mr. Rockefeller is only available to states where an equal amount is appropriated by the government or subscribed by the public. As there has been no appropriation of public money for investigating the hook worm disease Texas will not likely get any of the money to be expended by the commission.

Many persons were badly stung and one man seriously hurt, by bees at Fort Worth last Sunday, when the Rock Island freight train reached terminals there. The bees were enroute to Fallbrook, California, and had been packed in hives in a stable car. The bumping of the train had broken many hives and by the time the train reached Fort Worth the car was literally alive with them. The car had to be pulled out of the yards before traffic could be resumed.

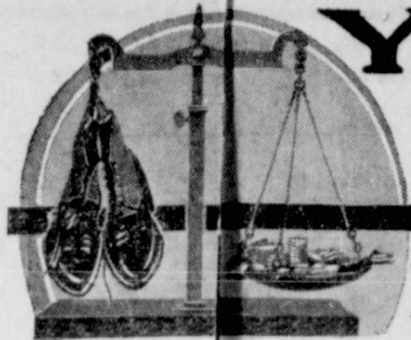

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# CYCLONE AT ZEPHYR

Death and Devastation Where Once Stood a Prosperous Town

Many Carried to the Hospital at Temple—Supplies Needed by the Survivors—Mills County People Liberal.

The once thriving little town of Zephyr was devastated by a cyclone shortly after 12 o'clock Saturday night. One can not imagine the complete wreck and the terrible conditions prevailing here without a personal inspection. People who looked upon the ruin Sunday morning were appalled at its magnitude and one had ever seen more complete destruction in the wake of either storm or flood.

Those of the Zephyr people who were awake and could see the approaching cyclone cloud describe it as resembling the nose from a railroad train and its roaring was like unto a savily laden freight train. Some were able to get to storm houses, but most of those who were killed knew nothing of the approaching storm until it was upon them and they had no time to seek places of safety.

Immediately after the passing of the cyclone the store of the Zephyr Mercantile Co. and the yard of Cobb & Co. took on the glare of the flames and the danger of the spread of the fire added new terror to the town, for had the fire gained any among the ruins of the town where people were dead and buried beneath the timbers, conditions would be far more serious.

The cyclone came from the west and struck on the hillside the outer edge of the town and its way through from about 500 yards wide and the destruction was so complete that it is difficult to believe that some of the buildings were once stood in residences. Passing out southeast of the town, the damage can be clearly seen through the timber for several miles and

fragments of garments and furniture are hanging on the trees and fences. It is not believed that an article of furniture that was in any of the houses can be found that will be of use and even the domestic fowls and a good portion of the stock suffered the same fate as the people—being either killed or badly injured. More than 30 of the dead animals were placed in a pile and burned Sunday afternoon.

As soon as the news of the disaster reached Brownwood physicians hurried to the place and several car loads of provisions, supplies and coffins were sent immediately by the people of that town. Goldthwaite and Mullin contributed to the necessities of the people with medical skill and provisions and they will do more.

E. P. Thompson and family of this city were visiting in Zephyr and the cyclone passed to the north of them, but they could plainly see the moving cloud, hear the crashing of the timbers of the houses and the shrieks of the injured.

C. M. Thompson and family had taken refuge in the storm house and saw the cloud approaching as a column of black smoke. The door of the storm house was wrenched off, but they were not injured.

A stone weighing perhaps 200 pounds was carried from the school building and dropped into a storm house where a number of people had taken refuge and not one of them was injured.

A scantling dropped through the ceiling and roof of T. I. Evans drug store and fell between four show cases, one end resting against a showcase and no glass was broken.

Ten people from Brownwood had gone to Zephyr to visit and six of them were killed.

A number of those who were killed had once been in a storm house, but deciding there was no danger had returned to bed.

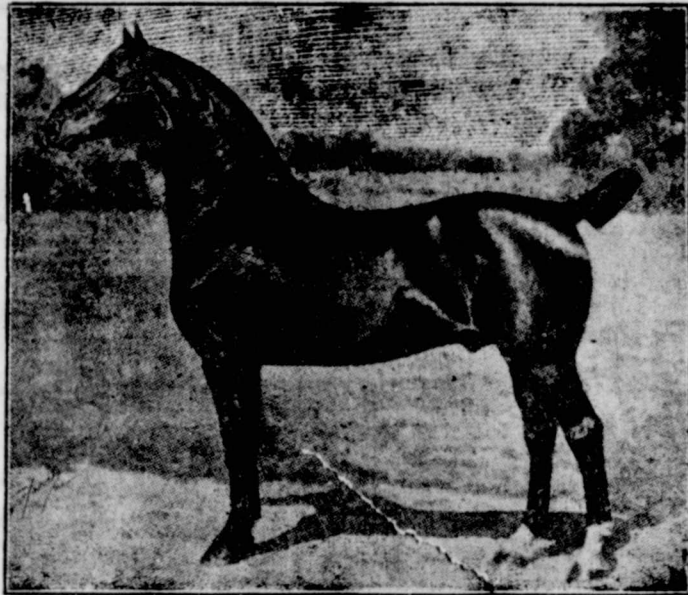

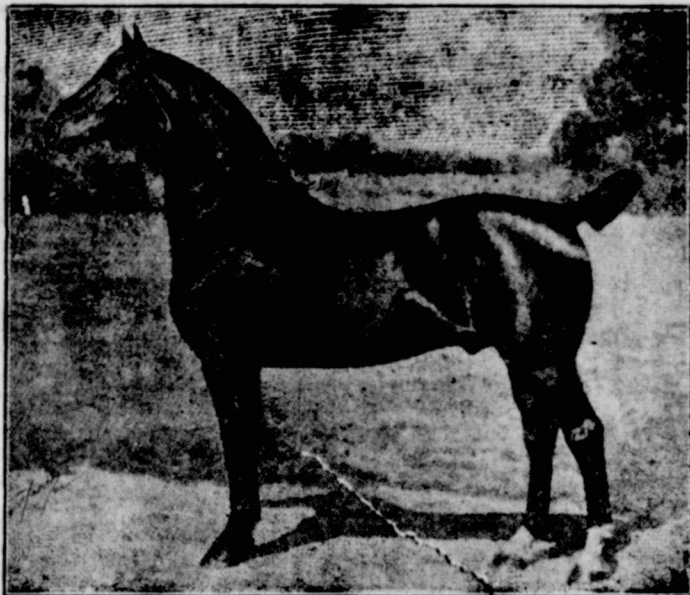

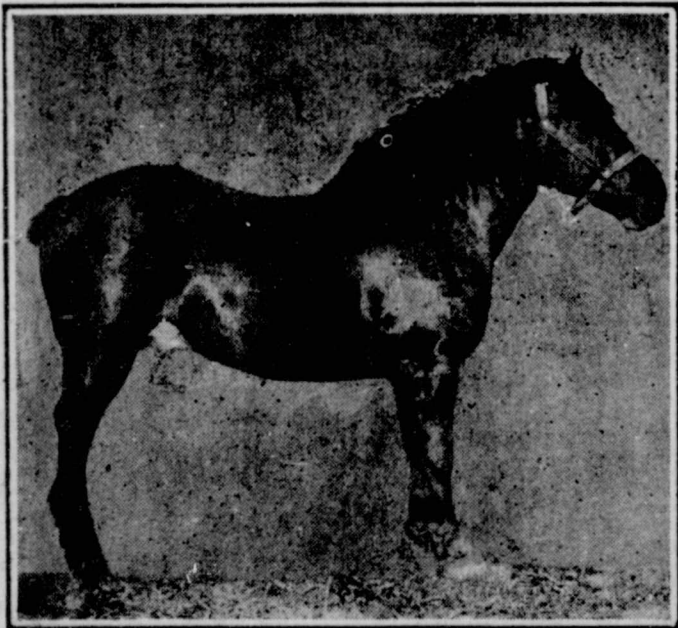

Goldthwaite is credited with having been the first to reach Zephyr with provisions and other supplies. The train from Brownwood soon arrived, however, with a large amount of provisions and other supplies.
