erintendent, and he will come to San Saba at once to get ready for next year's work. His salary was fixed at \$1,350 per annum.

Wm. Scott, census trustee, has completed his work and made his returns to the County Judge. It shows a total of 423 scholastics for the San Saba independent district, made up as follows: white males 219, females 194, total 413; colored males 3, females 7, total 10.

In the election held Tuesday the citizens said incorporate the town by a handsome majority. In fact, had there been a change of just one vote the result would have been two to one in favor of incorporation. T. C. Henry was elected mayor and R. O. Harris and S. W. Walker commissioners. These three men compose the first city council for the municipal government of San Saba town.—News.

The Last Day.

Today is the last day on which candidates for county and precinct officers can file their applications for places on the official ticket. Those who have not yet filed such application will have to hurry, for at mid-night tonight the time expires by operation of law and the chairman would have no authority to receive such application after that time. The executive committee is to meet Monday to draw for places for candidates on the ticket and apportion the expense of holding the primary. The assessment on candidates will be made and they will have only one week in which to pay such assessment or be dropped from the list, so it is also important for candidates to look after the business promptly.

A special from San Angelo
h may prove of interest to
people of this section says:

"An organized band of swindlers
has been at work in different
places in West Texas in de-
frauding a number of people who
purchased bogus vendor's lien
notes. One business man in San
Angelo lost \$800 on such a deal,
yet was too chagrined to invoke
the aid of the law. The bankers
of this section have advised the
public to be extra careful in deal-
ing with unknown parties in pur-
chasing vendor's lien paper with-
out a through investigation. An
effort is being made to locate the
parties."

Relations between Governor
Campbell and Commissioner of
Insurance and Banking Hawkins
became so strained Monday that
the governor asked the commis-
sioner to resign, but that gentle-
man very promptly refused to
comply with the request and the
governor has no power to en-
force his demand, notwithstanding
the commissioner was ap-
pointed by him. The trouble
grew out of the action of the in-
surance rating board in author-
izing insurance companies to
continue to collect the rate hereto-
fore in force until the justice of
the new rate could be established.
Commissioner Hawkins at once
took issue with the board on the
grounds that the law on the sub-
ject of the new rates was manda-
tory and that neither the board
or the governor, who was
largely responsible for the order
of the board, had authority to
annul the law or to authorize
insurance companies to disre-
gard it. That the commissioner
is correct in his contention there
seems to be no doubt.

The liquor interest often de-
mand, with a show of righteous
indignation, that they shall, as a
matter of equity, be compensated
for loss that may come to saloon
property by the refusal of a
license. They should remember
the ancient rule that those who
seek equity must do equity and
enter a court of equity with clean
hands. Do they compensate the
mother when they drag her boy
down to ruin? Do they com-
pensate the wife when they dis-
troy the earning capacity of her
husband? Do they compensate
the children whose lives are
blighted by a father's dissipation?
Do they compensate society when
they convert wealth producers
into paupers? Do they blunt the
sensibilities of citizens and make
a drink more potent than an
argument in securing votes? A
man who profits by cultivation
in others the appetite for a
strong drink ought to be the last
one to insist upon covering com-
pensation for any loss that he
may suffer because of the en-
forcement of laws enacted for the
protection of society.—W. J.
Bryan.

As a result of an investigation
by the railroads entering Mem-
phis, Tenn., a number of indict-
ments have been returned against
some prominent business men in
that city, charging grand larceny
in connection with the disap-
pearance of cotton from the rail-
road platforms in that city. It
is claimed that a systematic orga-
nization has stolen several thou-
sand bales of cotton in the last
fifteen years. Six persons are
said to be implicated.

The state Democratic executive
committee met in Dallas Monday
and made arrangements for the
state convention, which is to be
held in Galveston to nominate
state officers and prepare the
party platform. The Republican
committee also met in Dallas on
the same day for the same pur-
pose and selected Dallas as the
place for their state convention.

The Treasury Department has
taken steps to increase the sup-
ply of small bills, for which there
is always a heavy demand dur-
ing the fall months of the year.
Especially is this the case for \$1
and \$2 denominations.

San Saba is to have another
bank, the San Saba National. It
has been authorized by the
comptroller of the currency to
begin business with a capital of
\$25,000.

School Teachers Elected.

GEN. DAVIDSON SPEAKS.

A Large Audience Well Entertained By Candidate for Governor.

Gen. R. V. Davidson, one of the candidates for governor, addressed a large audience in the district court room here Thursday afternoon. Quite a number of extra chairs had been placed in the building and all of the available space was occupied.

Hon. Phil H. Clements introduced the speaker with a short talk in which he referred to Mr. Davidson's splendid record as attorney general and his high standing as a citizen.

Mr. Davidson reviewed his official conduct as attorney general and told of his contest with the Standard Oil Co. and the Harvester trust and of large amounts of money collected as penalties from them. He also stated that he had recovered a large amount of public land from railroad companies and others who were unlawfully attempted to hold them.

Mr. Davidson makes no claim to oratory, but he is a logical reasoner and talks freely without apparent effort. His voice was in good condition, notwithstanding he has made a great many political speeches during the campaign. 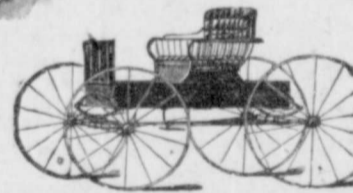
