BIGGEST SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

The Philadelphia School for Nurses is said to be the largest of the kind in the world. In the last year nearly 11,600 patients were supplied with nurses. Fully four-fifths of this service is said to have been gratuitous. At present a large number of two-year scholarships are available to young women throughout the country, the preference being given to applicants from small towns and rural districts. These scholarships include room, board, laundry work, uniforms, all necessary instruction and railroad fare paid to the student's home town on the completion of the course.

SENATE CLERK FORMER ACTOR.

John C. Crockett, the reading clerk of the United States senate, was formerly an actor and his reading of the bills is accomplished with great dramatic force and enthusiasm. He was clerk of the supreme court of Iowa, but resigned his position to go to Washington when he was notified of his choice by the senate committee. Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a Home for Wives and Widows of Confederate Soldiers and Sailors.

House Joint Resolution No. 7. Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provide further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.
SEC 2 The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.
The sum of \$5,000 00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

The Christian Endeavor societies of Missouri have started a state-wide movement for the suppression of love scenes and similar displays in moving pictures.

The state tax rate has been fixed at 4 cents on the \$100 valuation and the state school tax rate at 16 2/3 cents. The school tax rate is the same as last year, while the rate for general purposes is the lowest in the history of the state.

The mother of Lieutenant Governor A. B. Davidson died at her home in Taylor Monday and was buried in Georgetown Tuesday. The legislature intended to adjourn and attend her funeral in a body Wednesday, but the funeral was held one day earlier.

In the election today there need be no misunderstanding of the law governing the manner of voting, etc. The law is plain and there is no difference between this election and any other. A man to vote in this election must be a qualified voter in every way, including having paid his poll tax or secured an exemption certificate.

The special session of the legislature called by Governor Campbell convened Tuesday, but adjourned the next day until Monday, in order that the members could return home to look after their political interests and vote. The governor's message was short and called attention to the insurance rating law, which he desired repealed and another enacted in its stead, and he also desired a law forbidding the display of moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson prize fight. At the close of the message the governor announced that he would communicate further with the legislature when the occasion demanded it, which is an indication to a great many that he is awaiting the result of the primary before making all of his wishes known to the lawmakers.

President Rawn of the Monon route railroad was shot and killed in his suburban home at Chicago Tuesday night. The report was sent out by his family that a burglar killed him, but the detectives and police have decided that he suicided. He was involved in an investigation of graft in connection with a contract let by the Illinois Central railroad, and it is thought worry over the possible outcome caused him to end his life.

Only two states have a greater corn acreage than Texas this year, if the department of agriculture is correct in its estimate. It puts Illinois at the top, with an acreage of 10,609,000; Iowa second, with, 9,476,000, while the acreage of Texas is estimated to be 8,965,000. This acreage is \$15,000 greater than the estimated corn acreage in Texas last year, and since the condition of the crop on July 1 was put at 82 against a ten-year average of 76, it looks as if Texas were in for the largest corn crop in its history. The estimated acreage, it ought to have been remarked, is the greatest in history of the state. We venture to say, also, will show a larger yield per acre for the state as a whole than ever before, largely because of the improved methods of corn growing that have been adopted.—Galveston News.

A special from Austin says: It is learned on trustworthy authority that the Governor will have the special session arrange refund of the State bonds which matured last year, also those to mature on Sept. 1 of this year, and also to pay back interest on the bonds which matured in 1909. The State bonds which matured a year ago this month aggregated \$1,068,000 and bore 5 per cent interest, hence it will be necessary to appropriate \$33,400 to pay the interest though in the future they will bear 3 per cent, if redeemed by bonds bearing that rate of interest. It will be remembered that the Governor vetoed the action of the Legislature in appropriating the Waters-Pierce Oil money with which to take up these bonds. He now proposes to refund them with 3 per cent. The Legislature will probably accomplish it without much objection. The bonds maturing Sept. 1 are 7 per cent. It is proposed to have these in the refunding issues. All of these bonds are held by the school and other special funds. This matter will not be submitted until next week. The bonds maturing Sept. 1 amount to \$268,000.

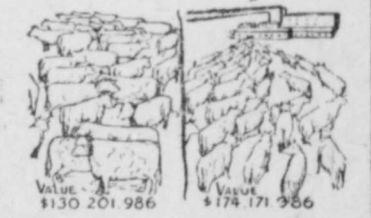
Farm and Factory

Texas has 8,794,000 head of cattle, valued at \$130,201,986. It is a remarkable fact that Texas has the best grade of cattle of any state, but for economic reasons fails to realize their value. It is possible that the Texas farmer may not exceed the Illinois farmer in grade of cattle but our ranches show up exceedingly well in the matter of grade of stock. In Illinois the cattle are worth \$28.02 per head and in Texas \$14.79 per head.



"Comparative Value in Texas and Illinois."
It cost approximately \$5 per head to ship cattle from Texas to the Chicago packing houses and the remainder of the difference in price is accounted for by the fact that Texas cattle are taken off the ranches and pastured and shipped to corn countries where a few bushels of corn are fed to them and \$10 added to their value. If we had enough packing houses in Texas to utilize our supply of live stock and did our own feeding we would add \$15 per head to our cattle, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.

Packing houses sufficient to meet the present needs of Texas would add \$43,970,000 to the value of our cattle, which is more than the packing houses would cost.



Added Value to Texas Cattle by Texas Packing Houses.
By bringing the packing house to the farm we adjust economic conditions and the increase in value of live stock goes to the producer without increasing the price of meat to the consumer, without increasing the expense of the packer. The farm and the factory go hand in hand and the prosperity of either is dependent upon the other, and no clearer example of this fact could be presented, than that of the packing house and the increase it at once brings to the farmer in the value of his cattle.

There is no more progressive citizen on the globe than the native Texan, and he is by nature a builder, but the task of developing the State is far too great for the present generation to see completed. To acquire the population that Massachusetts now has per square mile, we would have 110,000,000 people instead of 4,000,000. If all the people of the United States were to move to Texas our population would be less per area than that of Massachusetts. All the money in the world could find profitable investment in Texas. The figure below gives a comparison of the work of the stork and the immigration agent.



Increase in Population.
The stork gives us an increase of \$6,000 per annum and the immigration agent 69,000 per annum. The natural born citizen brings no property into the State. In fact, 30 per cent of our native citizens leave the State and actually take property away with them. It is fifteen years before the child becomes a revenue producer, and during that period he is an expense to the community, but the immigrant brings wealth into the State, and immediately upon arrival becomes a revenue producer. There is approximately one million dollars per day coming into Texas and making permanent investment in railroads, factories, farms, mines and other industries.



Money Coming to Texas.
We can not develop our State with home capital. A farmer may sell his farm in one section of the State and buy in another section; he has merely changed his location and has added nothing to the State's wealth. A man may sell his farm and buy a factory; he has simply changed his occupation, but has added nothing to the wealth of the State. If this generation proposes to develop Texas, says the Commercial Secretaries' Association, we must get men and money from the outside, and the invitation to homeseekers and capitalists can be cordially extended through an improved system of public highways. A community may not be able to build railroads and factories and other large industrial enterprises, but every section of the State can improve its public highways.

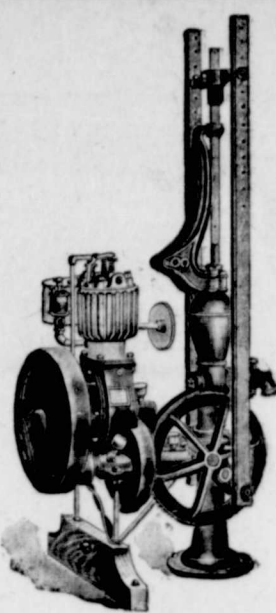

A great many people appear to believe that the statement that newspaper subscriptions are required to be paid up to within a year is a collecting scheme or a joke, but the following press report will show the importance of the matter to publishers:

"Editor Fay, of Lyons, Ia., has been called to Washington City because his subscription list is not as well paid up as the law requires. He will have to explain to the government officials why he has not compelled his subscribers to pay up according to the postal rules. An inspector had visited him two months previously and his list was said to be pretty thoroughly paid up but evidently it was not sufficiently so.
