Monday, Oct. 17, has been selected as Press day at the Dallas fair, which opens Oct. 15 and continues 16 days.

Mrs. Alice Rice was attacked by a bull at Dallas while staking the animal. He plunged at her and tossed her on his horns some feet in the air and was making the second attack when the police arrived and killed the enraged animal with their revolvers.

The man who "knocks" on his neighbors and their business is not helping to "boost the town", but is doing what he can to injure it. To "boost the town" it is necessary to "boost" the legitimate business enterprises and institutions of the town.

Caleb Powers, who was several times convicted of having been implicated in the assassination of Governor-elect Goebel in Kentucky a few years ago and was afterwards pardoned by the governor, has been nominated for congress and his election is certain.

An ordinance passed Monday at Dallas by the Board of Municipal Commissioners stopped all use of water from the city mains for sprinkling lawns or flowers or for use in any manner through hose and nozzle. This order is to remain in force until rains increase the supply of water in the city.

Johnnie Hill aged 4 years was crushed to death Sunday near El Paso, in an Automobile accident. While out riding with his father and mother, the car skidded turned over and rolled into a ditch where the lad was pinned beneath and literally cooked to death by the boiling water from the radiator.

Two masked men with drawn pistols held up an automobile owned by W. K. Ewing at San Antonio Monday night just at the entrance to the grounds of the Country Club. After taking the jewelry and money of the occupants, and compelling them to get out of the car, the men took the car and rode off.

It cost the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Company \$500 00 for the failure of its agent at Alvard, Ok., to open the ticket office for the sale of tickets, one hour before train time on March 8, according to an order entered by the corporation commission. The complainant had to pay 3 cents a mile as the rate changed that night after 12 o'clock from 2cts. to 3cts, and the agent refused to open the window until ten minutes before train time, making it after 12 o'clock.

The Commercial Secretaries say there are one hundred boys in Texas who will make one hundred bushels of corn to the acre this year, with the encouraging statement of J. L. Quicksall of the United States Department of Agriculture who attended the Annual Institute of Commercial Secretaries in Temple recently. Armed with arguments, statistics and general information concerning agricultural conditions in this state, Mr. Quicksall came to the convention to assist the Secretaries in laying out plans for the betterment of agricultural methods and to offer the co-operation of his Department to this end.

Translated Articles.

Editor Eagle:

The following, translated from El Regidor, a Spanish paper of San Antonio, may prove of interest to your readers.

CALCUTTA.

The Asiatic society of Bengal has just obtained, of a certain Montenegrin gentleman, extremely notable documents from Central Asia. These documents are five yellowish leaves of paper that measure 8x5 inches each. The real significance of these leaves of whose genuine origin there is no room for doubt, is that these men of research are face to face with a certain number of consecutive relations of various events written in a tongue of which, until now, existed not even the slightest trace, and of which they have obtained only these fragments of reference, redeemed from the sands of Central Asia. It is very possible that by the aid of these five leaves they resurrect from complete oblivion and important language of whose existence the present generations have not the slightest suspicion. The paging written on the reverse of every leaf proves that these documents are but an infinitely small part of an extensive work, M. Lucho Tachibana with Count Otsai, who have just arrived with these manuscripts from their journey through Central Asia, propose starting a new expedition during October to continue the work of research and make further investigations. Tachibana is a Japanese of twenty years who has now completed a journey of 5000 miles across Asia and has found among other things, magnificent collections of coins. The greater part of these discoveries they made in ancient chapels and sepulchers, in the vicinity of Urga, in Mongolia, Turkestan China and southern Turkestan.

The following, though accredited to an American colony may be, in reality, traced to the powers that be in our national capital.

MONUMENT TO WASHINGTON.

City of Mexico, Sept. 2: The Council of the city has named a small plaza in the street of Denmark, colony Juarez, about one block distant from the Avenue of the Reform, as the site for the erection of the monument to Washington, which the Americans here will raise, Sept. 11 is the date set for the dedication. Assisting in the solemn act of dedication President Diaz and the high functionaries of the Nation. The monument will cost one hundred thousand pesos. Signed, C. E. BULL.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

A Well Attended Meeting—Important Proceedings.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club held a meeting Monday night. While it was a regular weekly meeting, discussion of the matter of securing some kind of fire protection for the town caused a good attendance and considerable interest to be manifested.

After the preliminary exercises in opening the meeting, a discussion of the subject of fire protection was commenced by a report from W. E. Miller for the committee appointed to confer with the city council regarding the purchase of two chemical engines and a hook and ladder truck. He was confident the council would be liberal in the matter and his report was decidedly favorable.

Mayor Rahl was the next speaker and he announced that if the people of the town wanted the equipment and would make a showing to the council to that effect the purchase would be made. He thought an extra tax would not be necessary to provide the equipment.

Col. L. B. Walters believed the chemical engines to be the solution of the question of protection from fire in communities where water was not available. In fact, he announced that the companies in communities where water was used were also equipped with chemical engines and frequently extinguished fires with the chemicals, without turning on the water. He gave a very complete description of the engines and their workings.

Messrs. P. H. Clements, J. C. Darroch, R. E. Clements, L. E. Miller and others made short talks in favor of the proposition, after which a resolution was adopted requesting the city council to procure two engines on trial and provide the necessary hook and ladder outfit. Col. Walters was appointed to organize a fire company, he having had considerable experience in that line.

Two new members were received in the club and the meeting adjourned.

Monday, Oct. 17, has been selected as Press day at the Dallas fair, which opens Oct. 15 and continues 16 days.

Mrs. Alice Rice was attacked by a bull at Dallas while staking the animal. He plunged at her and tossed her on his horns some feet in the air and was making the second attack when the police arrived and killed the enraged animal with their revolvers.

The man who "knocks" on his neighbors and their business is not helping to "boost the town", but is doing what he can to injure it. To "boost the town" it is necessary to "boost" the legitimate business enterprises and institutions of the town.

Caleb Powers, who was several times convicted of having been implicated in the assassination of Governor-elect Goebel in Kentucky a few years ago and was afterwards pardoned by the governor, has been nominated for congress and his election is certain.

An ordinance passed Monday at Dallas by the Board of Municipal Commissioners stopped all use of water from the city mains for sprinkling lawns or flowers or for use in any manner through hose and nozzle. This order is to remain in force until rains increase the supply of water in the city.

Johnnie Hill aged 4 years was crushed to death Sunday near El Paso, in an Automobile accident. While out riding with his father and mother, the car skidded turned over and rolled into a ditch where the lad was pinned beneath and literally cooked to death by the boiling water from the radiator.

Two masked men with drawn pistols held up an automobile owned by W. K. Ewing at San Antonio Monday night just at the entrance to the grounds of the Country Club. After taking the jewelry and money of the occupants, and compelling them to get out of the car, the men took the car and rode off.

It cost the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Company \$500 00 for the failure of its agent at Alvard, Ok., to open the ticket office for the sale of tickets, one hour before train time on March 8, according to an order entered by the corporation commission. The complainant had to pay 3 cents a mile as the rate changed that night after 12 o'clock from 2cts. to 3cts, and the agent refused to open the window until ten minutes before train time, making it after 12 o'clock.

The Commercial Secretaries say there are one hundred boys in Texas who will make one hundred bushels of corn to the acre this year, was the encouraging statement of J. L. Quicksall of the United States Department of Agriculture who attended the Annual Institute of Commercial Secretaries in Temple recently. Armed with arguments, statistics and general information concerning agricultural conditions in this state, Mr. Quicksall came to the convention to assist the Secretaries in laying out plans for the betterment of agricultural methods and to offer the co-operation of his Department to this end.

Translated Articles.

Editor Esqle:

The following, translated from El Regidor, a Spanish paper of San Antonio, may prove of interest to your readers.

CALCUTTA.

The Asiatic society of Bengal has just obtained, of a certain Montenegrin gentleman, extremely notable documents from Central Asia. These documents are five yellowish leaves of paper that measure 8x5 inches each. The real significance of these leaves of whose genuine origin there is no room for doubt, is that these men of research are face to face with a certain number of consecutive relations of various events written in a tongue of which, until now, existed not even the slightest trace, and of which they have obtained only these fragments of reference, redeemed from the sands of Central Asia. It is very possible that by the aid of these five leaves they resurrect from complete oblivion and important language of whose existence the present generations have not the slightest suspicion. The paging written on the reverse of every leaf proves that these documents are but an infinitely small part of an extensive work, M. Lucho Tachibana with Count Otnai, who have just arrived with these manuscripts from their journey through Central Asia, propose starting a new expedition during October to continue the work of research and make further investigations. Tachibana is a Japanese of twenty years who has now completed a journey of 5000 miles across Asia and has found among other things, magnificent collections of coins. The greater part of these discoveries they made in ancient chapels and sepulchers, in the vicinity of Urga, in Mongolia, Turkestan China and southern Turkestan.

The following, though accredited to an American colony may be, in reality, traced to the powers that be in our national capital.

MONUMENT TO WASHINGTON.

City of Mexico, Sept. 2: The Council of the city has named a small plaza in the street of Denmark, colony Juarez, about one block distant from the Avenue of the Reform, as the site for the erection of the monument to Washington, which the Americans here will raise. Sept. 11 is the date set for the dedication. Assisting in the solemn act of dedication President Diaz and the high functionaries of the Nation. The monument will cost one hundred thousand pesos. Signed, C. E. BULL.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

A Well Attended Meeting—Important Proceedings.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club held a meeting Monday night. While it was a regular weekly meeting, discussion of the matter of securing some kind of fire protection for the town caused a good attendance and considerable interest to be manifested.

After the preliminary exercises in opening the meeting, a discussion of the subject of fire protection was commenced by a report from W. E. Miller for the committee appointed to confer with the city council regarding the purchase of two chemical engines and a hook and ladder truck. He was confident the council would be liberal in the matter and his report was decidedly favorable.

Mayor Rahl was the next speaker and he announced that if the people of the town wanted the equipment and would make a showing to the council to that effect the purchase would be made. He thought an extra tax would not be necessary to provide the equipment.

Col. L. B. Walters believed the chemical engines to be the solution of the question of protection from fire in communities where water was not available. In fact, he announced that the companies in communities where water was used were also equipped with chemical engines and frequently extinguished fires with the chemicals, without turning on the water. He gave a very complete description of the engines and their workings.

Messrs. P. H. Clements, J. C. Darroch, R. E. Clements, L. E. Miller and others made short talks in favor of the proposition, after which a resolution was adopted requesting the city council to procure two engines on trial and provide the necessary hook and ladder outfit. Col. Walters was appointed to organize a fire company, he having had considerable experience in that line.

Two new members were received in the club and the meeting adjourned.
