COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING.

Some Changes and Improvements Suggested—Dues Advanced.

The regular weekly meeting of the Commercial club in the court house Monday night resulted in some important improvements being suggested and some changes being advocated.

Good roads are always uppermost in the minds of the business men and this subject was given considerable attention. A suggestion was made that the dues of the club members be made \$5 per month and the amount used on the roads leading to this city. Final action was not taken on the proposition, but it was deferred until next Monday night, in order to give the members who were not present an opportunity to be heard. Should any of them oppose the plan. With the large amount of money raised by the increased dues a great amount of good work could be done on the roads and there would not be serious opposition to the increased amount, the Eagle believes. Every business man in the city, as well as all who are interested in the town in any way, should be in attendance upon the next meeting and urged the adoption of the amendment increasing the dues.

There was talk of interurban railroads and various enterprises were suggested and the meeting was most harmonious throughout. Business men who fail to attend these weekly meetings are missing a great deal that would be of interest to them and many could, no doubt, offer beneficial suggestions if they would but attend the meetings of the club and help "the other fellow" to carry out their expressed wishes to "boost the town."

Be Sure To Vote.

Every qualified voter in the county should be sure to cast his ballot on election day for the nominees of his party, if such nominations have been made, otherwise the voter is free to exercise his judgment as to the best men for the offices among the candidates of other parties. In any event, it is important for every voter to cast his ballot in order that the county may get the advantage of its full voting strength, both in a political way and in property values. Prospectors look after the population of a county or town as a means of ascertaining the worth property. A county is given representation in political conventions in accordance with the votes cast at the last election and in districting the state the same rule applies. Where the voting strength is small the more important speakers can not be secured for public gatherings and little attention is given the county in state and district conventions or in public matters. There is no argument against a full vote and many reasons can be assigned for every voter casting his ballot in the general election.

A new counterfeit \$10 bill has been discovered by the treasury department.

The Texas Cotton Palace opens in Waco Nov. 5 and continues fifteen days.

A great number of lives were lost in the hurricane which swept Cuba the first of the week.

The Colorado gin at Snyder was burned Monday, together with a number of bales of cotton.

Julia Ward Howe, the noted philanthropist and author, died Monday of pneumonia at her summer home in Middletown, Rhode Island.

Mother St. John, founder of St. Joseph's Infirmary and St. Anthony's Home for the aged in Houston, and St. Mary's Infirmary in Galveston, died last week at Galveston.

Fifteen women of Bristow, Oklahoma, armed with hatchets and other implements, battered in a door and raided the store of George Carman, where liquor was said to have been stored, and a large quantity was found and destroyed.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad station at Choteau, Okla., was looted of \$3000 a few days ago, but the loss was not discovered until the auditor took charge of the office and found the safe emptied. Officers are looking for the man who has served as agent for the company at that place.

The Balloon America carrying Walter Wellman and a crew of five in an attempt to reach Europe by the trans-Atlantic flight, was wrecked at sea by storm and abandoned, Wellman and crew were rescued Tuesday by the steamship Trent of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.

A claim has been made to a steamship company in New York for the refund of the amount paid for transportation of a man who died on the voyage. The trip would have required twelve days and he died the second day of the voyage and his relatives demand a return of the amount charged for the other ten days travel.

In a contest over the nomination for sheriff of Harris county it has been discovered that 76 votes were wrongfully credited to [one of the candidates, who would have been elected to the position but for the discovery. It is certainly the duty of the grand jury of Harris county to thoroughly investigate the matter and indict the guilty parties, whoever they may be, no matter how high or low their station.

It may not be a new thought, but it certainly is a true one that it is much easier to criticize the actions of other people than to perform the acts better than they have done. Every "street corner statesman" knows exactly how to conduct the affairs of the government properly, but few of that class have ever been selected to look after the affairs of state. This is equally true in communities. A few men find it necessary to criticize the works of officials and other public men, without being able to make improvements along any line in their own work.
