Straight Talk.

Col. G. I. Goodwin of Brownwood gives some good straight talk to men who claim that they are Democrats and yet are not bound by the July primary. His letter appeared in the Dallas News a few days ago and is as follows:

FROM A CONFEDERATE VETERAN.

I see in the News of last Saturday a warning to Confederate soldiers by P. F. Paige, chairman of the State Prohibition Committee. The Confederates are Democrats, many of them prohibition Democrats, and as such they went into the July primary election and pledged themselves to vote for the nominees of the Democratic party. Afterwards a few men, without any county conventions or proper authority, assumed the right to nominate a State ticket in opposition to the Democratic nominees, and now, through their chairman, openly ask the old Confederate soldiers and the Democrats of Texas to violate their pledge of honor and vote for Col. Houston, an acknowledged Republican and recently an office holder in this party. I am an old Confederate soldier, a Democrat and prohibitionist for twenty-five years, and I made the party pledge and voted for a Democrat-Prohibitionist in the July primary, and now I am publicly asked, requested to violate that pledge, and not only to violate that pledge, but to throw my Democracy away and vote for a Republican for Governor of Texas.

This is an insult to the honor of every Confederate soldier and they will resent it at the polls. The Democrats will do likewise. I have been a voter in Texas for fifty-five years and often have heard men advise others to stand by their pledge and not violate their honor, and now P. F. Paige openly ask them to violate their honor. Had I not seen it in print over his own signature I would not have believed it.

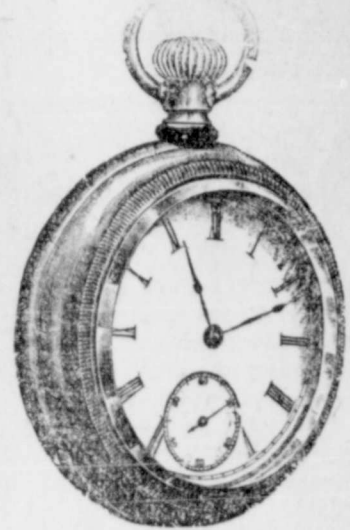

According to vital statistics, over 5000 births were reported in Texas during the month of September.

The dead body of Henry Jones of Lampasas was found in a hotel in Corpus Christi one day this week. It is believed he died from heart disease.

Dr. Crippen, the American physician who murdered his wife and ran away with another woman, has been sentenced to hang Nov. 8, in London.

A premature explosion of a blast at the railroad grade a few miles from Lometa, on the San Saba extension, Monday afternoon seriously injured a number of workmen.

On last Friday at the close of the convention of the Episcopal church at Cincinnati, J. Pierpont Morgan made a gift of \$100,000 to the campaign fund for the world's conference on the unity.

Chairman Lloyd of the Democratic congressional committee says the indications and information concerning the political situation lead him to believe the Democrats will have a majority of thirty-five in the next congress.

The farmer is the man of the hour in Texas, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association. Banks may fail, factories may close and panics may come, but the farmer is on the right side of the ledger and has nothing to fear. If he has looked ahead and planned as he plowed, his alternating crops, his winter vegetables and his hogs will not only safeguard him against the ever increasing cost of living, but will enable him to wind up the year with a snug bank account to his credit.

A feature brought out by the federal census in favor of Texas is the large increase of her rural population. In most states in the Union the figures show that the towns and cities have increased at the expense of the rural districts, but in Texas this condition is reversed and while practically all Texas towns and cities have made remarkable strides in population, the rural communities have also kept pace, proving conclusively that farm life in Texas has its attractions and that the "back to the farm movements" is having its effect in the Lone Star State.

A large per cent of the hogs used by the Texas packing houses are raised outside the state, Oklahoma, Louisiana, New Mexico and other bordering states furnishing large quantities for consumption by the Texas packeries. With an area of 167,000,000 acres of land with ideal agricultural conditions, it would seem as if the state would be able to supply the demand of her own packeries. It is a well known fact that those sections of the country which are known as the hog raising districts, are the most prosperous sections of the state, enjoying financial stability and prosperity the year round. Texas is neglecting great opportunities along this line and one that is costing her thousands and thousands of dollars each year.—Commercial Secretaries'

Star Hotel Burned.

The Star hotel building east of the depot, perhaps better known as the Rahl hotel building, was completely destroyed by fire at an early hour Wednesday morning. The property was owned by J. W. Hasty, who occupied it, having moved in the day previous. It was insured for \$1500 in a company at Cincinnati, Ohio, but the amount would not nearly replace the building and contents. Most of the furniture in the building was saved by the volunteer workers who reached the scene before the fire had gained great headway. The blaze originated in the kitchen about 2 o'clock in the morning and was caused, it is believed by a defective flue.

There was very little wind at the time, which was indeed fortunate, for with a southerly wind of considerable force the Farmers Union cotton yard and war house would have been in great danger, while J. C. Fulton's home on the south and the railroad depot on the west would have been jeopardized had the wind carried the sparks and fire brands toward them.

There was some apprehension for a time that the Farmers Union cotton yard would be burned, as sparks and fire brands were carried over it by the southeastern breeze, but persistent watchfulness and some work on the part of the people prevented any damage being done. The proximity of J. C. Fulton's residence to hotel building endangered that building, but the roof and north end of the building were kept saturated with water and the building was not damaged.

The Eagle is not advised as to Mr. Hasty's intentions regarding rebuilding the hotel, which was an old land mark.

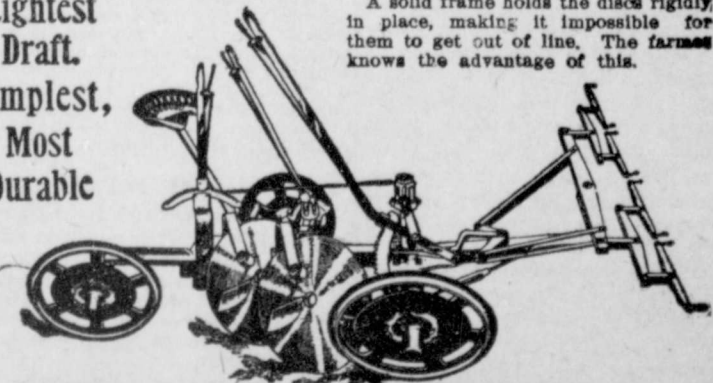
