While his fellow prisoners watched and wondered and cheered him on he slowly worked himself down the hole until finally he was out of sight. The prisoners who were left, listened and watched the outside, and after a few minutes' time they noticed him make his appearance on the outside bareheaded, and, taking a look in all directions, darted westward toward the setting sun.—Chief.

Endorses the Amendment.
Hamilton, Tex., Oct. 31, 1910.
To the Voters of Mills County:

Knowing the general and popular opposition to constitutional amendments I use this method to appeal to every patriotic voter in Mills county to consider deeply and seriously the amendment to be voted on at the election next Tuesday.

This amendment is for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers, and such other women as aided the Southern Confederacy.

To me it seems to be one of the most important and most meritorious measures upon which the people of Texas have ever been called to vote. If this amendment is adopted a comfortable home will be provided for all the deserving and dependant old ladies who aided in the Cause which was never lost, and will cost but a few cents a year in Texas to the average voter. I consider it a duty the imperial state of Texas owes to these sainted old women to take care of them in their declining years. They are not mendicants or objects of charity, but the State will be paying them for noble service rendered in the dark days of the '60's, when they gave to the God of War their husbands and sons and safely and securely kept the home until the warrior's return.


While these warriors were facing the cannon's mouth and many of them pouring out their life-blood upon the battlefield, these women were keeping the vigil of the home—were making homespun clothes for the gallant boys at the front and were enduring untold hardships and privations which eternity alone will reveal. While the Southern soldier marched to the front and established for the world a new standard of military loyalty, the noble women of the Confederacy were equally as brave, and true to the trust reposed in them.

Every loyal Texan feels a deep pride in our Confederate Home at Austin, where nearly 400 old veterans are cared for, and we ought to support this amendment and establish a home for the old women of the Sunny South. It is but a matter of a few short years till "taps" will have sounded for the vanishing guard and the bravest soldiers the world ever saw will have crossed over the river to rest under the shade of the trees.

The richest legacy which my father and mother left me is their record in the cause of the Confederacy, and I can't allow this opportunity to go unheeded to appeal to every loyal son of Dixie to support this amendment and help provide a comfortable home during their declining years for these uncrowned queens of the Southland.

John Adams Acton, a noted sculptor, died suddenly Monday in London.

Henri Dunant, founder of the International Red Cross Society, died Sunday night at Heiden, Switzerland.

The State Bank of Grapeland was robbed Sunday night. The vault was blown open with explosives.

The Paul Garrett flour mill at San Angelo was burned Monday night. The loss was \$30,000, with partial insurance.

Every voter who is subject to the payment of a poll tax must present his receipt to the officers of the election next Tuesday before he can be allowed to vote. If he has mislaid or lost the receipt he can make affidavit to the fact and then vote, but the receipt must have been issued prior to Feb. 1 of this year.

A voter who took part in a political convention or primary is in honor bound to support the nominees of such party, no matter how distasteful they may be to him. The obligation was taken voluntarily, and every man who took part in making these nominations well understood what was expected of him.

Three applications were made this week for injunctions against clubs in San Antonio restraining them from selling liquor on Sunday. In every part of Texas and in the large towns as well as the smaller ones the people are demanding the enforcement of the laws, not only for Sunday desecration but for "boot-legging" of whiskey and other crimes. Officers who will not use their every effort to enforce the laws should be forced to retire and those who are willing to perform their duties should receive the encouragement and support of law-abiding citizens everywhere. Let the slogan in every county and in every precinct be "Enforce the law," and every citizen should make of himself a committee of one to see that the law is respected.

J. C. McNealus, ex-secretary of the Democratic executive committee has issued a statement to the voters in this state urging them to cast their ballots next Tuesday, regardless of their political affiliations. He shows wherein the section of the state in which the heavier voting is done will profit in the redistricting of the state, which is to be done by the next legislature. If the western part of the state falls behind in the number of votes cast the other portions of the state will of necessity get more political advantage, and the same is true of every other section of the state. The property values of a county are gaged to some extent at least by the voting strength, and candidates for state and district offices are always more ready to accept invitations to speak in counties where there is a large voting strength. The county that has 2000 votes can receive more recognition from the law-making bodies and from political conventions than those where the returns show only 1000 votes. Many are the advantages of citizens voting in the general election and there is no argument against the practice.

District Court.

THE WAY TO VOTE.

A Sample Ballot Together With the Law On the Subject.

Those who did not take part in nominating candidates for state, district or county offices are not pledged to any ticket, but have a right as honorable men to vote for whom they please. Of course, those who voted in the primary or took part in a convention of a political party which has a list of nominees are in honor bound to support the ticket of such party.

THE LAW,

(1) A vote is properly rejected where the voter tears off the National ticket of one political party, and attaches it to the State ticket of another political party. Bigham v. Clubb, 95 S. W. Rep., 675.

(2) The ballot for the general election will be of different form from that of the primary ballot. It will be what is known as a "blanket ballot," that is, the names of the candidates of all political parties will be upon the same ballot, in different columns, and in addition to the names of the several political parties, and the nominees thereof, there will be a blank column in which parties may write the name of any person for whom they desire to vote for office, if the person is not already on the official ballot as the nominee of some political party. For instance, if a party desires to vote for all of the nominees of the Democratic party except those for governor, member of congress, county attorney and county judge (I take four to definitely illustrate the manner of voting) and desires to vote for the nominee of the Republican party

for governor, and for the nominee of the Prohibition party for congress, and for the independent candidate for county attorney and desires to vote against all nominees of the People's party, and for some person whose name is not on any ticket for county judge, he will proceed to vote as follows:

- (a) He will run a line entirely through the ticket of the People's party.
- (b) On the ticket of the Democratic party he will run a line through the nominee for governor, congress, county attorney and county judge.
- (c) He will run a line through the name of each of the nominees of the Republican party except that for governor.
- (d) He will run a line through the name of each of the nominees of the Prohibition party except that for congress.
- (e) He will run a line through the name of each of the independent candidates except that for county attorney.
- (f) He will write the name of the party for whom he desires to vote for county judge in the blank column, under the title of that office.
- (3) See the above sample of a mixed ticket as indicated herein.
- (4) In no event must you write upon the ticket of any political party the name of any person for whom you desire to vote. If the name does not appear upon the official ballot write it in the blank column, under the title of the office to which you desire him elected.
- (5) If a party desires to vote the straight ticket of any political party, run a line through all other tickets as is done through People's party ticket in sample here shown.

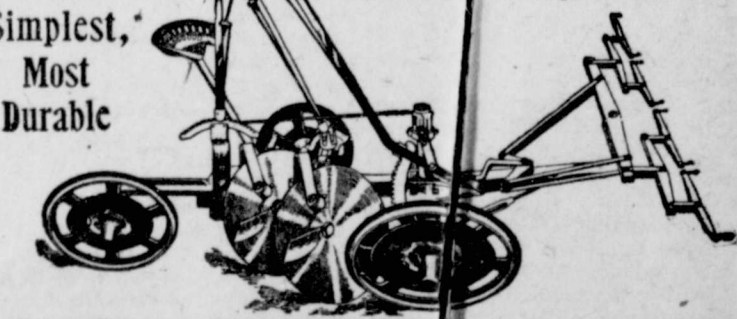
