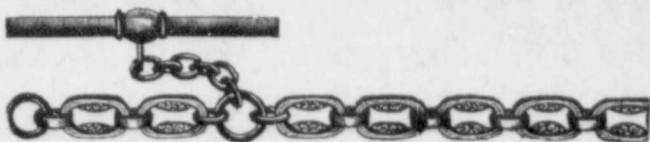

Democratic Landslide

THE LOWER HOUSE OF CONGRESS AND MANY STATE GOVERNMENTS GAINED

Nearly All Doubtful States in Democratic Column and the Majorities in Most Contests are Large. A Light Vote in Texas.

The election Tuesday was a Democratic landslide from New York state to Nabors Creek, and from Hanna Valley to every other place. In almost every state and district the Democrats gained heavily, and in very few instances so far reported did they suffer defeat where victory was expected. The lower house of congress will be largely Democratic and with the large gains in the states where senators are to be elected by the legislature it is certain that the Republican majority in the senate will be greatly reduced.

The Democrats elected the governor in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Ohio and other states where the result was doubtful.

The Texas returns indicate a very light vote, perhaps not more than two-thirds of the voting strength of the state being shown in the total. Mr. Colquitt only fell 40,000 short of the total given Governor Campbell two years ago, and Judge Terrell fell 30,000 behind Judge Simpson for 1908.

The indications are that Carlos Bee, Democrat, was defeated for the state senate by Julius Real, Republican, in the San Antonio district.

In Mills county the result was not in doubt and the election of the Democratic nominees was not a surprise, perhaps, to any citizen. Hanna Valley and Nabors Creek each voted solidly for the Democratic ticket, while at all other boxes in the county the opposition candidates received some support.

Following is the result of the election in this county except the Fisher or Democrat box, where 44 votes were polled. A report by 'phone to the Eagle from that place says Redden Andrews received 21 votes for governor, Colquitt 20 and Terrell 3. Messrs Doggett and Meeks each received 13 votes, which was the highest number polled for the Republican ticket at that place, the other candidates receiving 12. The constitutional amendment was also favored by a majority of 6.

The commissioners court will meet next week to declare the result of the election and issue certificates to the newly elected officers, and the Eagle will publish the official returns next week.

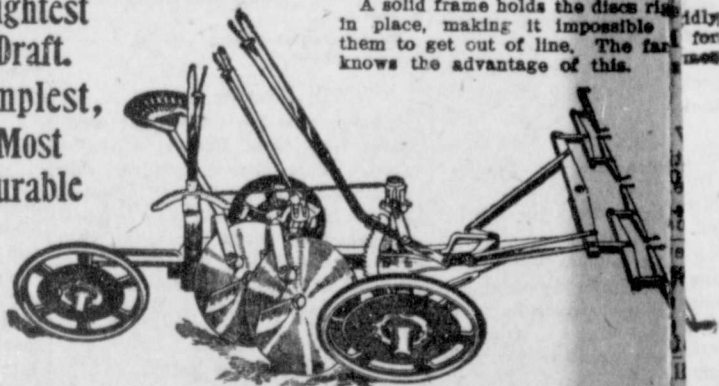
