BROWNWOOD.

Mrs. Dan Williams left last night for Los Cruces, N. M., where she will visit with her parents for a few weeks. She will be joined there by Mr. Williams after the holidays.

As a result of eating mistletoe berries, little Jesse Simmons, the three and a half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Simmons, who live on Clear Creek, west of town, died yesterday afternoon, and

his little sister, just a year his junior, is desperately ill.

The additional \$50,000 road bonds for precinct one have been approved by the attorney general and on January 2, will pass into the hands of Brooke Smith & Company, who will place to the credit of the road fund that amount.

Some few weeks ago Clint McMurray of Clilo fell from a load of hay and sustained a fracture of

the bone in his right leg. The bone penetrated the flesh and stuck into the ground and the wound was considered very serious, but it was thought that the limb could be saved, but recently blood poison set up and on Saturday Mr. McMurray underwent an operation, having the injured limb amputated below the knee.

Unless Congressman Slayden is able to get in behind the secretary of the treasury in the matter of the appropriation of \$75,000 authorized by the last session of congress for the erection of a postoffice on the site already acquired by the government in Brownwood, this town's chances of getting work started on the new building in 1911 are mighty slim.

The examining trial of Luther Wilson, charged with assaulting Lee Norman with a pitchfork, was concluded Saturday afternoon and his appearance on bond reduced from \$2000 to \$500. Wilson and Norman were employed about a threshing machine in the Chapel Hill community some weeks ago when trouble occurred between them and Wilson inflicted rather serious wounds by the use of a pitchfork. It was feared for a time that Norman would not recover, but he is getting along all right now.—Bulletin.

HAMILTON.

Last Thursday the 19th, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Misener in Hamilton, Miss Katherine Campbell, daughter of John W. Campbell, living near Lamkin, and Mr. Charlie Anderson, of Monument, New Mexico, were married.

A negro by the name of Will Williams was shot and fatally wounded at the McSpadden railroad camp five miles north of town Sunday night. The bullet, which was from a pistol in the hands of another negro named Johnson, entered the right side of his stomach, and he died Monday.

There is no longer any doubt about the Quanah & Rockport railroad coming through Hamilton. The railroad subscription committee had a meeting last Friday and it was found that only a small amount was lacking on the stock necessary to be secured and they felt safe in relying on some who had not yet put down, but whom they knew would do it, and so they presented the matter to President Walker who, accepted their assurances that the full amount would be subscribed, thus guaranteeing that the road would be built through Hamilton.—Herald.

A lone bandit robbed the passengers in one coach of a Southern Pacific through train Saturday night as the train was passing through the city of El Paso. He forced the porter to walk ahead of him and receive the valuables from the occupants of the car, who delivered them into the porter's cap while the robber stood behind two large pistols. After securing the money and jewelry he backed out of the door, wished the passengers a merry Christmas, stepped from the train and disappeared in the darkness.

Six men were killed and thirty injured by the explosion of powder at the plant of the American Smelting company near El Paso one day this week.

A heavy rain was reported over north Texas and the Panhandle Wednesday night. From half inch to 2 inches of water fell during the night.

Tuesday night during the progress of a play at the opera house in Tulsa, Okla., two lads robbed the box office of \$1200 and have apparently made good their escape.

The city officials of Fort Worth set all of the city prisoners free Christmas morning and C. H. Bencini gave each of the forty-five persons released a silver dollar with which to buy a Christmas dinner.

The grand jury of Corsicana has reported 84 indictments for whitecapping in Navarro county. The indicted persons are white men who have sought to intimidate negro tenants and frighten them out of the country.

The secretary of state has completed the compilation of the votes cast in the last general election, except for governor and lieutenant governor. Some interesting facts have been shown by his report. Railroad Commissioner Williams led the ticket, receiving 180,574 votes. The counties of Walker, Crosby, Upton, King and Yoakum were solidly Democratic. The counties of Goliad, Gaudalupe and Zapata gave majorities for the Republicans.

Ledbetter-Sullivan.

Mr. Wall was a citizen of Goldthwaite at the time the round house was located here, and he had a number of friends here who were grieved when the announcement of his death was made.

Fred Fleming, former president of the Western Bank and Trust Co., which failed about two years ago, was convicted at Dallas Saturday of having received deposits after he knew the bank to be in a failing condition and his punishment was fixed at four years in the penitentiary.

Mullin.

From the Enterprise.

Mrs. J. B. Applewhite of Lam-pasas was called here on account of the serious illness of her little grand-daughter, Susie Hodges, who died Sunday evening.

The turkey was baked at the home of Mrs. Pyburne, who covered the turkey after it was done with a granite pan in which the enamel was broken, and the hot turkey touched the pan. Several members of each family became very sick soon after. Doctors were hurriedly summoned to the homes of Mr. Smith and Mr. Pyburne, and both physicians pronounced it ptomaine poisoning. All parties are reported out of danger.
