Commercial Club.

The club met in regular session Monday night in the Masonic building. The secretary, Edward Geeslin, being absent, A. E. Evans was elected secretary pro tem.

B. F. Geeslin reported for the roads committee that work would begin Tuesday on the Schuster road, in the Priddy community.

The president was authorized to appoint a committee on farm products to make all necessary arrangements for the display of such products at the fair and reunion July 23 to 25.

The committee having in charge the subscription list for the employment of a night watch for the town reported progress and it was ascertained that almost enough had been raised to secure the services of a reliable man for night watchman. The committee was instructed to complete the circulation of the list at once and confer with the commissioners court relative to the employment of a watchman by the town and county jointly.

The president was authorized to place an advertisement in the Dallas News for attractions on the fair and reunion grounds during the fair and reunion.

This was a most interesting meeting and the attendance was satisfactory. Business men who fail to attend the weekly meetings of the club are losing an opportunity to further the town's interests.

The rain makers are at work at San Angelo and already a light rain has fallen in that section. It is claimed by the Hatfield Bros., who have the contract to make 10 inches of rain fall over a territory of forty miles between this time and September, that they have never failed in a similar attempt. They produce the rain by the use of gases, which is entirely different from the old dynamiting system.

The banks of Texas have agreed to take up the deficiency warrants to be issued for rebuilding the A. & M. college buildings that were recently destroyed by fire, and the work of rebuilding can begin at once, whereas, but for the action of the banks in agreeing to cash the warrants the work would likely have to be delayed until the meeting of the legislature, which would mean the loss of a year's work by the college.

It is through organized efforts that Texas is fast becoming known throughout the nation as the land of opportunity. In our commercial clubs are combined the ingenuity of the East, the energy of the North, the enthusiasm of the West and the conservatism of the South, forming one of the most progressive citizenships of the present age. Nature has given us a soil where the germs of civilization flourish vigorously, and we are entering the struggle for commercial supremacy with all the elements of success at our command, and the whole world is beginning to talk about us as a result of the activities of our commercial clubs.—Commercial Secretaries.

The astounding and gratifying fact is claimed that in the last half century an average of twelve years has been added to the period of human life. Since the first actual records were taken in New York City in the middle '60s the rate of mortality has been reduced from 35 deaths in each one thousand inhabitants to about 15 or 16. This reduction has resulted from the control of infectious disease. The saying thus made relates only to the period of life under fifty years. There is no saving knowledge regarding the organic disease of advancing years, which afflict especially those who have been active in affairs and who are taxed with large responsibilities.—Christian Herald.

Case Reversed.

The school district contest in the Democrat community has been decided favorably to the contention of the Mills county people of that community by the court of appeals. This is a county line school district case and is important to the people of that neighborhood, for it having been in court for three years they have been forced to maintain their school with two teachers by private subscription and without the aid of the public free school fund. The county line district was declared illegal by the supreme court some years ago and the Democrat community organized a district in this county. Later the legislature enacted a law validating the county line districts and it was then contended by some who had been in the former district at Democrat that the county line took precedence over the district that had been formed in this county. The matter was carried to the court and Judge Goodwin decided in favor of the county line district, but the court of appeals has reversed the decision and rendered it in accordance with the contention of the Mills county citizens in the new district.

The Democrat district is one of the most progressive districts in the county. They have already voted \$1500 in bonds for the erection of a school building and have about \$1000 to their credit in the school funds which have been withheld while the case was in court.

Jim Rhodes Dead.

J. K. P. Rhodes died at his home in this city Thursday afternoon, after an illness covering perhaps two years. He was one of the early settlers of this place and was an active and industrious laborer until Bright's disease undermined his once powerful constitution and he became bed-ridden. He was known to all of the old settlers and they will all remember many deeds of charity and kindness by him. He was one of the most liberal hearted men we have ever known and it is a fact that no night was ever so dark or cold that he would not leave his bed to do a kind act for a friend or neighbor and it is likely that he assisted in digging more graves than any man who ever lived or died here. Those who knew him best have kind memories of him. His remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows cemetery yesterday morning.

Peace to his ashes and repose to his soul.

The cotton farmer had a hard year in 1911, according to reports recently issued by Uncle Sam. The boll weevil levied a toll equivalent to seven cents on the dollar. Jupiter Pluvius, by bad behavior, deducted seventeen cents more, and according to market reports, the bears romped all over the cotton fields during the entire year. Yet King Cotton still reigns supreme, moving a half billion dollars of gold from the European vaults to America, and routing its strongest competitors in value of staple products per acre by \$11.60. Cotton produced a farm value of \$24.97 per acre, and corn, its nearest rival, \$13.37.—Commercial Secretaries.

Commissioners Court.

The court met Monday in monthly session and transacted a considerable amount of business of a routine nature, such as auditing accounts, inspecting reports, etc.

The delinquent tax records for the years 1885, 1886 and 1887 were annulled and cancelled.

Field notes of school district No. 15 were definitely defined.

Mrs. Lee Sexton was allowed \$10 per month for her support, conditioned that her supplies shall be purchased from Geeslin Mercantile Co. and the bill therefor shall be approved by the county judge.

The allowance to R. H. Hashaw of \$15 per month was reduced to \$5 per month.

An agreement was made with the commercial club for the county to pay two-fifths of the salary of the night watchman, provided the amount required by this agreement should not exceed \$25 per month. The agreement to terminate when a court house is built and a safe place provided for the county records.

The court was in consultation with architects all day Thursday and some splendid plans were offered, but no definite action was taken. The court will be in session as a board of equalization next week and at the close of the meeting the members of the court will go as the guests and at the expense of different architects to see the court houses at Anson, Aspermont, Floydada, Vernor and perhaps other points. In accepting these invitations from the architects the court places itself at no disadvantage in selecting plans for the court house and, in fact, is under no obligation to select any plans. The idea is simply that the architects are anxious to sell their plans and want the court to see houses built according to the plans, just as a man would show a mule he had for sale with the hope of securing a purchaser.

County Seat Location.

It is now believed that the discussion of an election to decide upon the location of the county seat will end, as the conditions have now become thoroughly understood by all parties to the controversy. Judge Allen went to Mullin last Saturday and addressed a meeting of the citizens at that place on the subject. He explained to them that the only hope of securing a change of the location of the county center was in convincing the commissioner of the general land office that he was wrong in his calculations when he located the center about three miles from this city. This would be hard to do, as he had all of the data at his disposal and had no interest in the controversy and, therefore, must have made it right. Under the conditions, a two-thirds vote would be required to change the present location and few of the most enthusiastic advocates of a change believe that they could secure a two-thirds vote for a different location. Thus, it is hoped and believed the controversy will end.

MORRIS SHEPPARD SPEAKS.

A Large and Attentive Audience Heard Him.

Hon. Morris Sheppard spoke here Tuesday afternoon to a large audience. He arrived in the forenoon from San Saba and was met at the river by a reception committee in automobiles and escorted to this city.

The Goldthwaite Concert band was employed for the occasion by his admirers and at 2 o'clock the band played several selections while the people were assembling.

Prof. A. J. Street, who is a close personal friend of Mr. Sheppard, introduced him in a short and appropriate address, telling something of that gentleman's history from the time he graduated from college until this time.

Mr. Sheppard spoke for about two hours and held the attention of his audience well. While the prohibition question was discussed at length and he explained its connection with this campaign, he discussed the tariff and other subjects and his audience was well pleased with his speech. He is an entertaining speaker and intersperses enough wit and humor into his talks to keep the people in his audience in a pleasant frame of mind all the time.

After the speech he left for Mullin, where he made a talk and went from there to Brownwood, where he spoke that night.

Night Watchman Employed.

The business community, joined by the county commissioners, this week employed E. L. Martin to serve as night watchman for the town for twelve months, beginning tonight. The movement was inaugurated by the Commercial club and a committee from the club secured a sufficient subscription to employ a watchman and the subscribers to the fund met in the opera house Wednesday night and after electing L. E. Miller chairman and A. E. Evans secretary, selected Mr. Martin for the position as watchman at a salary of \$50 per month. Messrs. B. F. Geeslin, E. M. Boon, Jas. Rahl and W. C. Dew were appointed to confer with the commissioners court relative to the appointment.

The committee discharged its duties Thursday morning and the court agreed to the appointment and subscribed two-fifths of the amount of the watchman's salary. Commissioner Hines was added to the committee above named, which is to have supervision of the work of the watchman.

It was decided to purchase a clock to be used by the watchman and various keys will be placed about time and it will be his duty to make certain rounds at stated intervals during the night.

TEXAS LIGNITE

Cheap and Abundant Fuel.—
30,000,000,000 tons on Deposit.

In a report issued by Prof. W. B. Phillips, Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology, some interesting data is given on the fuels of Texas. The lignite fields of the State probably extend over 60,000 square miles, so the pamphlet states, and the original supply of this fuel lying beneath our surface is estimated at 30,000,000,000 tons. As the amount taken from the earth so far amounts to only a small per cent, the supply of this fuel need occasion no anxiety for the next thousand years or so. Every known variety of lignite has been found in Texas, from a material carrying but a few per cent of fixed carbon to nearly 45 per cent and with from 30 per cent of volatile and combustible matter to more than 76 per cent. The beds of this fuel run from 15 feet and more in thickness to depths of 400 to 600 feet. The counties in which workable beds of lignite occur are Anderson, Angelina, Atascosa, Bastrop, Bowie, Brewster, Caldwell, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Dimmitt, Fayette, Freestone, Grimes, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Houston, Jasper, Lee, Leon, Limestone, McMullen, Marion, Medina, Milam, Morris, Nacogdoches, Newton, Panola, Rains, Robertson, Rusk, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt, Webb, Wood and Zavalla. In a general way, workable lignite is found in all that part of Texas lying east of the 97th meridian of west longitude and north of the 31st degree of north latitude, but there are a few important areas outside of these boundaries.

The average value of the lignite mined in Texas in 1910 at the mines was 96 cents, the production having been 979,232 tons, the largest in the history of the State.

It may be accepted as a fact that there is enough lignite beneath the surface of Texas to run our engines, supply our factories and provide fuel for heating purposes for several centuries to come.

The University of Texas is using lignite for running the power house of that institution, a Texas railroad is using it for fuel, and Texas lignite bids fair to become universally used as a fuel during the next decade.

Commissioners Court.

The court met Monday in monthly session and transacted a considerable amount of business of a routine nature, such as auditing accounts, inspecting reports, etc.

The delinquent tax records for the years 1885, 1886 and 1887 were annulled and cancelled.

Field notes of school district No. 15 were definitely defined.

Mrs. Lee Sexton was allowed \$10 per month for her support, conditioned that her supplies shall be purchased from Geeslin Mercantile Co. and the bill therefor shall be approved by the county judge.

The allowance to R. H. Hashaw of \$15 per month was reduced to \$5 per month.

An agreement was made with the commercial club for the county to pay two-fifths of the salary of the night watchman, provided the amount required by this agreement should not exceed \$25 per month. The agreement to terminate when a court house is built and a safe place provided for the county records.

The court was in consultation with architects all day Thursday and some splendid plans were offered, but no definite action was taken. The court will be in session as a board of equalization next week and at the close of the meeting the members of the court will go as the guests and at the expense of different architects to see the court houses at Anson, Aspermont, Florida, Vernon and perhaps other points. In accepting these invitations from the architects the court places itself at no disadvantage in selecting plans for the court house and, in fact, is under no obligation to select any plans. The idea is simply that the architects are anxious to sell their plans and want the court to see houses built according to the plans, just as a man would show a mule he had for sale with the hope of securing a purchaser.

County Seat Location.

It is now believed that the discussion of an election to decide upon the location of the county seat will end, as the conditions have now become thoroughly understood by all parties to the controversy. Judge Allen went to Mullin last Saturday and addressed a meeting of the citizens at that place on the subject. He explained to them that the only hope of securing a change of the location of the county center was in convincing the commissioner of the general land office that he was wrong in his calculations when he located the center about three miles from this city. This would be hard to do, as he had all of the data at his disposal and had no interest in the controversy and, therefore, must have made it right. Under the conditions, a two-thirds vote would be required to change the present location and few of the most enthusiastic advocates of a change believe that they could secure a two-thirds vote for a different location. Thus, it is hoped and believed the controversy will end.

MORRIS SHEPPARD SPEAKS.

**A Large and Attentive Audience
Heard Him.**

Hon. Morris Sheppard spoke here Tuesday afternoon to a large audience. He arrived in the forenoon from San Saba and was met at the river by a reception committee in automobiles and escorted to this city.

The Goldthwaite Concert band was employed for the occasion by his admirers and at 2 o'clock the band played several selections while the people were assembling.

Prof. A. J. Street, who is a close personal friend of Mr. Sheppard, introduced him in a short and appropriate address, telling something of that gentleman's history from the time he graduated from college until this time.

Mr. Sheppard spoke for about two hours and held the attention of his audience well. While the prohibition question was discussed at length and he explained its connection with this campaign, he discussed the tariff and other subjects and his audience was well pleased with his speech. He is an entertaining speaker and intersperses enough wit and humor into his talks to bring the people in his audience in a pleasant frame of mind all the time.

After the speech he left for Mullin, where he made a talk and went from there to Brownwood, where he spoke that night.

Night Watchman Employed.

The business community, joined by the county commissioners, this week employed E. L. Martin to serve as night watchman for the town for twelve months, beginning tonight. The movement was inaugurated by the Commercial club and a committee from the club secured a sufficient subscription to employ a watchman and the subscribers to the fund met in the opera house Wednesday night and after electing L. E. Miller chairman and A. E. Evans secretary, selected Mr. Martin for the position as watchman at a salary of \$50 per month. Messrs. B. F. Geeslin, E. M. Boon, Jas. Rahl and W. C. Dew were appointed to confer with the commissioners court relative to the appointment.

The committee discharged its duties Thursday morning and the court agreed to the appointment and subscribed two-fifths of the amount of the watchman's salary. Commissioner Hines was added to the committee above named, which is to have supervision of the work of the watchman.

It was decided to purchase a clock to be used by the watchman and various keys will be placed about time and it will be his duty to make certain rounds at stated intervals during the night.

TEXAS LIGNITE

Cheap and Abundant Fuel.--
30,000,000,000 tons on
Deposit.

In a report issued by Prof. W. B. Phillips, Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology, some interesting data is given on the fuels of Texas. The lignite fields of the State probably extend over 60,000 square miles, so the pamphlet states, and the original supply of this fuel lying beneath our surface is estimated at 30,000,000,000 tons. As the amount taken from the earth so far amounts to only a small per cent, the supply of this fuel need occasion no anxiety for the next thousand years or so. Every known variety of lignite has been found in Texas, from a material carrying but a few per cent of fixed carbon to nearly 45 per cent and with from 30 per cent of volatile and combustible matter to more than 76 per cent. The beds of this fuel run from 15 feet and more in thickness to depths of 400 to 600 feet. The counties in which workable beds of lignite occur are Anderson, Angelina, Atascosa, Bastrop, Bowie, Brewster, Caldwell, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Dimmitt, Fayette, Freestone, Grimes, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Houston, Jasper, Lee, Leon, Limestone, McMullen, Marion, Medina, Milam, Morris, Nacogdoches, Newton, Panola, Rains, Robertson, Rusk, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt, Webb, Wood and Zavalla. In a general way, workable lignite is found in all that part of Texas lying east of the 97th meridian of west longitude and north of the 31st degree of north latitude, but there are a few important areas outside of these boundaries.

The average value of the lignite mined in Texas in 1910 at the mines was 96 cents, the production having been 979,232 tons, the largest in the history of the State.

It may be accepted as a fact that there is enough lignite beneath the surface of Texas to run our engines, supply our factories and provide fuel for heating purposes for several centuries to come.

The University of Texas is using lignite for running the power house of that institution, a Texas railroad is using it for fuel, and Texas lignite bids fair to become universally used as a fuel during the next decade.

Bulletin on Higher Education in Texas.

The Educational Campaign committee of the Hogg Organization, composed of F. M. Bralley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Executive Secretary, Austin, Texas; President W. B. Bizell of the college of Industrial Arts, Dean Charles Paryear of the Agricultural and Mechanical college, President S. E. Mezes of the University of Texas, President R. B. Cousins of the West Texas State Normal college, President S. P. Brooks of Baylor University, and Lee Clark, General agent of the conference for Education in Texas, has published for free distribution a bulletin on "The State Institutions of Higher Education in Texas, Their past Services, Future Possibilities and Present Financial condition."

The bulletin shows what the people may reasonably expect of the State institutions of higher education, what these schools are now doing, and what they could do under the more favorable conditions of proper financial support; and discusses the needs of the State's institutions of higher education.

Our institutions of higher education should prepare men and women for the most useful citizenship, for efficiency in the various occupations, industrial and otherwise; they should apply technical learning to the various resources of business and philanthropy; they should contribute to the sum of human knowledge, offering advantages to all people of the State through extension lectures and correspondence courses.

To accommodate the needs of the student body, which exceeds 3,000 annually in all departments, and to serve Texas in the largest and most useful way, the University should have a larger teaching force, more buildings, better equipment and additional course of instruction. It is conservatively estimated that an increase of 50 per cent in the University's income would increase many times the efficiency of the institution, extending its benefits to increased numbers of loyal Texans.

Texas needs at the Agricultural and Mechanical college, where the number of students has increased from 500 to 1,125 within the past five years, several new buildings and additional instructors, in order that efficiency may be increased along technological lines and that the institution may perform its duty to the people.

Likewise the college of Industrial Arts and the four state Normal schools should be provided with additional buildings, new departments, more teachers, additional dormitory and laboratory facilities to meet present demands.

It is also shown that the private, endowed and denominational schools have rendered invaluable service to the State, and that they are rightly entitled to adequate support.

The discussion closes with diagrams and tables of statistics of the following fourteen leading states with respect to their institutions of higher education: Texas, Illinois, Ohio, Missouri, Michigan, Indiana, California, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and North Dakota. Of these fourteen states Texas ranks third in population; but in the financial support of higher education, the following interesting comparisons indicate the rank of Texas: Total income, 13th; income per inhabitant, 14th; income per \$1,000 property, 12th; income per student, 14th; income from State tax and appropriation, 10th; income from other sources, including tuition fees, 8th; teachers per 100 students, 14th; value of buildings, 8th. Our institutions of higher education should be made as good as the best.
