### COMMERCIAL CLUB

The Club meeting was not well at-  
tended Monday night, on account of  
many believing that the fair and re-  
union having been carried to a suc-  
cessful termination there was no  
business to transact, but in this they  
were mistaken, for there are a good  
many things that need attention. In  
fact it is 'keeping eternally at it'  
that brings success and the club  
should be awake to every opportunity  
for the advancement of the town and  
county.

The committee reported consider-  
able money on hand from the sale of  
privileges at the reunion grounds and  
the donations for the barbecue and  
the hope was expressed that the do-  
nators could be reimbursed to a con-

### SCHOLASTIC CENSUS.

The scholastic census of the county  
has been compiled and shows a total  
of 1999 children in the scholastic age  
in the county, outside of the inde-  
pendent districts. Of this number,  
993 are boys and 1006 girls.

Goldthwaite district has 342 schol-  
astics, of which 172 are boys and  
170 are girls.

Mullin has 219 scholastics, of which  
128 are boys and 91 girls.

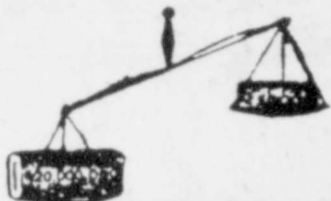

The old gentleman left three children—a daughter in Arizona, a son in California and a son here. It is likely Dr. Huddleston will leave in a few days for Kentucky to wind up his father's business affairs.

## Markets

It is as important to properly market as it is to properly raise farm products. We are a producing country and therefore interested in markets and market facilities for our products. The world's average is two acres of cultivated land per capita while in Texas we have seven acres of cultivated land per capita leaving a surplus production of five acres of cultivated land for each individual which must be sold. The world's average in consumption of cotton is thirteen bales per 1,000 population; in Texas we raise one thousand bales of cotton per one thousand population or one bale per capita. We have a surplus production of 987 bales of cotton per one thousand population for sale. Texas produces 20 per cent of the cotton of the world and on a per capita basis uses one fourth of one per cent. We not only produce a large surplus but, through lack of diversification, concentrate our production—making a deficit in certain lines of production, equally as abnormal as our surplus production in other lines. We are a people of producers and interested in receiving a high price for our products. An increase of one cent per pound in the market price of cotton on 1908 basis of production will place in the hands of the Texas producers of cotton \$20,000,000 and take out of the pockets of the Texas consumers of cotton goods \$250,000 leaving a trade balance of \$19,750,000 in our favor, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.



### "Balance in Favor of Texas Producer."

Our prosperity depends upon the producer getting a high price for his products. The Farmers Association, Fruit and Truck Growers Association, and all organizations and influences that tend to raise the price of products should be encouraged by all the people.

There is more seriously in need of business than perhaps any other state in the union. Our principal products are cotton and cattle and the entire output of the cotton field and the ranch must pass through the factory before it is consumed. The Texas farmers ship \$1,500,000 of raw material daily to the factories outside the state and buy a portion of this back as a consumer.



### "Raw Material Leaving Texas Daily."

The farmer must pay the freight to the factory and although his products may cross the ocean he must foot the bill every mile of the way. By moving the factory to Texas we move the market to Texas, and eliminate the expense of transportation.

### TO MILLS COUNTY CITIZENSHIP

Now that the election is over, I desire to say a few things to you.

First, I want to thank you sincerely for the overwhelming victory you gave me at the polls last Saturday. While I appreciate the honor you conferred on me two years ago, I appreciate this one far more. The first was an expression of your confidence that I would fill the office, with credit; this one is an expression of your approval of my work and my policies. I thank you.

Some of my friends requested me to refute, in print, some misrepresentations and misunderstandings of me before the primary. This I declined to do, as such would have had only political significance. Now, since there are no votes to bid for, I write these explanations that I may enlist your co-operation in securing measures of interest to us all. One objection stated is that I am a high tax man. I never cast a vote in my life to raise the tax rate of Mills county. I am opposed to high tax for most purposes but I am in favor of high tax for our public schools. I made my race advocating it. The people in 26 of our common school districts have responded to my appeal for a better school fund and have held elections within the last 18 months, 23 of them voting a school tax. I take it that our children's highest interest is our highest interest. I take it that our children deserve just as good educational advantages as do any children on earth, but if we give them such advantages we must tax ourselves for funds to maintain better schools. The disgruntled feelings on the part of some that I am somehow to blame because the center of Mills county is where it is, is too foolish to mention. The belief that I advocate a high priced court house was given you by somebody whose imagination is much stronger than his information. I never have advocated a court house of any price. The people ought to settle that question. In two mass meetings they have demanded a good house to cost not exceeding \$75,000 I think they have a right to what they want.

Now, these and other misrepresentations can do no harm except that they might lead some good people to fall to co-operate with me in my effort to do what is best for our county. To those who voted for me I promise to try to merit the honor you have conferred upon me. To those who opposed my re-election, I recognize your right to such opposition. I entertain for you only the very kindest feelings, and a desire to serve you in any way possible. I am sure you will lend me your hearty support in furthering the interests of our county.

### ROSEN'S TRIBUTE TO PRESS

Former Russian Ambassador Says He Hasn't Been Misquoted by Reporters in 35 Years.

When Baron Rosen, the retiring Russian ambassador, took passage at New York in the Muretania on his return trip to St. Petersburg, where he is to be minister of foreign affairs, a reporter sought to procure from him his opinions on current events. "I have spent 35 years in this country, and in all that time I have never been misquoted by a newspaper man. I am, therefore, certain that none of you will misquote me now incorrectly, when I say that I cannot speak on any public subject, for I am still true to my training as a diplomat."—Exchange.

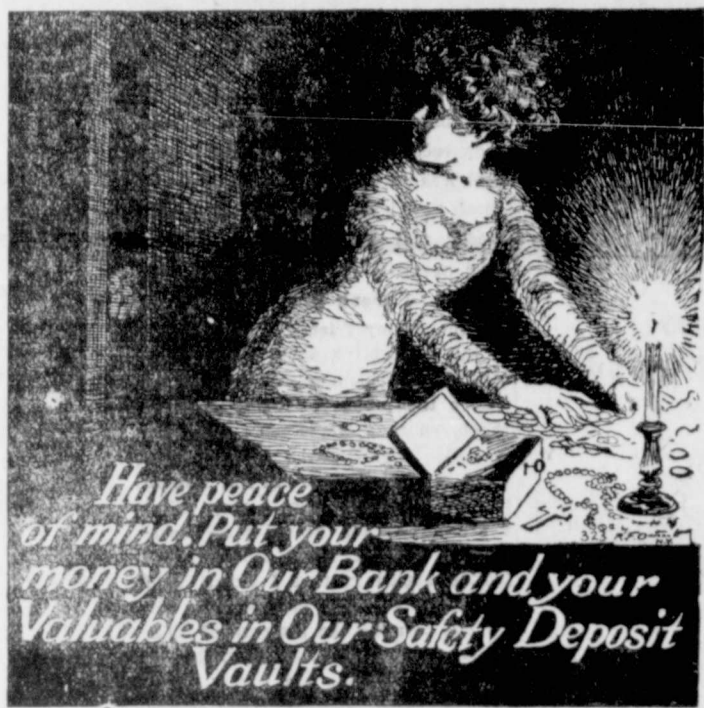

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION SO AS TO AUTHORIZE THE GRANT OF AID TO INDIGENT AND DISABLED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS AND THEIR WIVES.

(S. J. R. No. 9) Senate Joint Resolution.

Senate Joint Resolution to amend Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the grant of aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows, and to soldiers who served in the militia and in organizations for the protection of the frontier and their indigent widows, and to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for the indigent and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors, and such women as aided the Confederacy, and authorize a special ad valorem pension tax, and making appropriations for same.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3, Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporation whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1900, and their widows in indigent circumstances, and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since January 1, 1900, and who were married to such soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1, 1900; to indigent and disabled soldiers, who under special laws of the State of Texas, during the war between the states served for a period of at least six months in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican marauders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas; who were in active service for a period of at least six months during the war between the States, to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances, and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1900, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since 1861, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors their wives and widows, and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided for by law; provided, the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home.

The Legislature shall have the power to levy and collect, in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property not exceeding five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate Army and Navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations, or militia.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election of State officers, in November, 1912. At which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'For the amendment to Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution relating to increase of Confederate pensions;' and the voters, opposed to said amendment, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'Against the amendment to Section 51, Article 3 of the Constitution, relating to increase of Confederate pensions.'

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

### Proposed Amendment To The Constitution Authorizing Cities of More Than 5000 Inhabitants To Adopt Their Charters By Vote Of The People.

(H. J. R. No. 10.) House Joint Resolution.

House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 5, of Article II, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for cities of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants to adopt their charter by a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this state; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent. of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund of at least two per cent thereon; and provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every two years.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be held in this State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State. At such election, those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: 'For amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people;' those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'Against amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people.' The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much as is necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas out of moneys not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of the publication of this amendment and the proclamation for the election.

# ELECTION RETURNS

Contests Still In Doubt.

COLQUITT AND SHEPPARD ARE EASY WINNERS.

Heavy Vote Over the State—Mills County Election Returns Complete.

The Democratic primary election last Saturday resulted in the re-nomination of Governor Colquitt by a majority which may reach 50,000 when a full report is secured.

Morris Sheppard was also an easy winner for the United States senate, having defeated Col. Wolters by more than 30,000, while Randell and Zolner were scarcely in the running.

Will H. Mayes was nominated for lieutenant governor; W. P. Lane, controller; J. M. Edwards, treasurer; J. T. Robison, land commissioner; Ed R. Kone, commissioner of agriculture; W. E. Hawkins, associate justice of the supreme court.

There is doubt in some cases and a full count of the vote may be necessary, so close have the candidates run. Walthal has a slight lead over Leoney for attorney general, but this may be reversed before the statement is put in type. Judge Nelson Phillips has a very slight lead for the position on the supreme bench now occupied by him and lately vacated by Judge Ramsey Earl Mayfield of Temple appears to have defeated John Wortham for a position on the railroad commission now occupied by Mr. Wortham. Hatton W. Sumners of Dallas and Daniel E. Garrett of Houston appear to have been elected congressmen at large. C. G. Fouat is believed to be nominated for state senator in this district and it is thought certain that Rev. A. R. Watson has defeated

his opponent for the nomination for representative by an overwhelming majority, although all of the figures are not available at this time.

In the county election the figures from each box are given below, in cases where there were contests. Where there was only one candidate the result is already known and reference to the announcement column will show the result in most cases.

At Mullin George Pyburn was nominated for public weigher, over three opponents and in some of the precincts there were no candidates for justice of the peace or constable and the candidates were nominated by a scattering votes, as in Goldthwaite, where Mr. C. W. Lindsey was nominated for constable.

### COURT HOUSE PLANS

Insurance Adjusted and Election for Bonds To Be Ordered.

The adjusters for the seven insurance companies carrying policies on the court house have agreed upon the payment of the policies in full and have recommended that drafts for the money be at once forwarded to the officers of this county. The full amount is \$20,500 and this together with \$55,000 in bonds will provide the \$75,000 court house which has been approved by two mass meetings and by many citizens besides. It is believed that fully that much money will be necessary to secure a building suited to the county's needs and it is likely the court will arrange for a building of that character.

The court will meet in regular session one week from next Monday and will likely select an architect to prepare plans and at the same time submit to the people the question of issuing the bonds. With the insurance settled, the time for the bond election near at hand and the size and the price of the building practically agreed upon it should now be but a short time until the building of a new court house is under way.

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Providing That Members of The Board of Regents Of The State University And Boards of Trustees And Managers of The Educational, Eleemosynary And Penal Institutions Shall Be Elected Or Appointed For The Term of Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 9.) House Joint Resolution.

An Act proposing an amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new section thereto, to be entitled "Section 30a"; providing that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University, and the boards of trustees or managers of educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions of the State, and such other boards as have been, or may hereafter be established by law, may be elected or appointed for a term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of said boards to be elected or appointed every two (2) years, in the manner provided by law, fixing the time for holding the election and making the appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known and designated as "30a," and to read as follows:

Section 30a. The Legislature may provide by law that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees or Managers of the educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions of the State, and such boards as have by law, may hold their respective offices for the term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of such boards shall be elected or appointed every two (2) years in such manner as the Legislature may determine; vacancies in such offices to be filled as may be provided by law, and the Legislature shall enact suitable laws to give effect to this section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for the members of the Legislature, at the next general election to be held in this State, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law." And all voters opposed to said amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said elec-

tion, and have the same published, as required by the law of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of said proclamation, publication, and election.

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Creating The Office of Prison Commissioner And Making The Term of Office of The Board of Prison Commissioners Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 22.) House Joint Resolution.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Article XVI of the State Constitution by adding thereto Section 58, creating the office of Prison Commissioners, and making the term of office of the members of the Board of Prison Commissioners six years, and making an appropriation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section which shall be known as Section 58 and shall read as follows:

Section 58. (Article XVI.) The Board of Prison Commissioners charged by law with the control and management of the State prisons shall be composed of three members appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office shall be six years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified; provided that the terms of office of the Board of Prison Commissioners first appointed after the adoption of this amendment shall begin on January 20th of the year following the adoption of this amendment, and shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two years, one four years, and one six years. Their terms to be decided by lot after they shall have qualified, and one Prison Commissioner shall be appointed every two years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of this state shall fill said vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term thereof.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "For a six years' term for Prison Commissioners" and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "Against a six years' term for Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of the Governor's proclamation submitting this proposed amend-
