#### THINGS IN GENERAL.

The chain of industry is no stronger than its weakest link and to withstand the severe trials that civilization places upon it, there must be a strengthening of the weak links. There is no influence more corroding than indifference, no test so trying as uncertainty and nothing so destructive as ignorance. The organization of the Farm Life Commission, having for its purpose the study of production and marketing of crops and suggesting intelligent methods of co-operation between industries, is a forward step in organized progress and one that will eliminate haphazard methods of planting and marketing as well as result in perfect understanding between different lines of business. Texas needs industrial co-operation.

Texas has been chosen as the home of 19,902 immigrants who have come to America during the past year. The progressive, wide awake people of this state are beginning to appeal to the immigrants whose great aim in life is to come to the United States to make money. Only a few of the immigrants are members of the professional world. There are some actors, a few architects, some clergymen, a very small number of editors, and a somewhat larger number of teachers. Those foreigners who come from the countries in the southern part of Europe frequently settle in some of the southern states here. The Greeks maintain that the climate of Texas is not much unlike that of Greece, and they still the homesick calls for the fatherland in the interests of earning a livelihood in the new land. The general classes of foreigners enter the commercial world and interest themselves in farming, carpentering, plumbing, and various industrial pursuits.

Texas is putting on a turkey trot that is astounding the nation. A short time ago we raised comparatively few turkeys but "everybody's doing it now" and the gobble of the popular fowl can be heard

from the Sabine to the Rio Grande. When these birds start for the eastern and northern markets, we put on a turkey trot that thrills the people with joy and gladness and incidentally those who participate in the feast must pay the Texas farmer. On November 28 when the nation with bowed heads and grateful hearts returns thanks to Him from whom all blessings flow, two million Texas turkeys will grace the Thanksgiving table and provide a feast for the American people that is fit for the gods.—Commercial Secretaries.

## CITY ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, amending Art. 1, Chap. 11, of the Code of Ordinances of said city; prescribing the limits wherein hog-pens are prohibited, and providing how hog pens shall be kept and constructed, and providing a penalty for violating the provisions of said ordinance.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That Art. 1, Chap. 11, of the ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to have and use any hogs in a pen in the City of Goldthwaite without keeping same cleaned at all times. And that said pens are hereby required to be built with plank floor and so constructed as to have the floor of said pen slanting so that rain or water split or poured therein would drain off and not remain in such pen and create a stench. Provided, that no hog pens of any character of construction shall be maintained in said city which are large enough to cause a stench calculated to impair the health and comfort of the inhabitants. Provided further, that there shall be no hog pens whatever allowed within the territory bounded as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point, the intersection of Sixth and Reynolds streets, thence east along Sixth street to the intersection of Sixth and Reley streets; thence north along Reley street to the intersection of Fourth and Reley streets; thence east along Fourth street to the intersection of Fourth and Rice streets, the southeast corner of Block 38; thence north along Rice street to the intersection of Rice and Second streets; thence west along Second street to the intersection of Second and Reynolds streets; thence south along Reynolds street to the place of beginning. Any person neglecting, failing or refusing to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a nuisance, and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and publication.

Passed, approved and adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council, all members present and voting for the same, held in the city of Goldthwaite on the 4th day of Nov., 1912. JAS. RAHL, Mayor.

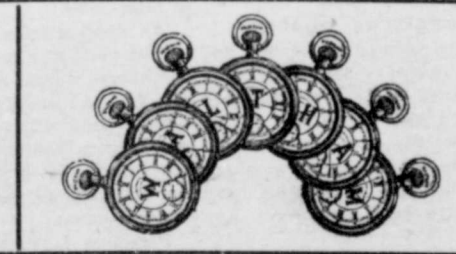

**ROSEN'S TRIBUTE TO PRESS**

Former Russian Ambassador Says He Hasn't Been Misquoted by Reporters in 35 Years.

When Baron Rosen, the retiring Russian ambassador, took passage at New York in the Muretania on his return trip to St. Petersburg, where he is to be minister of foreign affairs, a reporter sought to procure from him his opinions on current events. Baron Rosen naturally had nothing to say under this head, but what he did have to say is worth noting:

"I have spent 35 years in this country, and in all that time I have never been misquoted by a newspaper man. I am, therefore, certain that none of you will misquote me now incorrectly, when I say that I cannot speak on any public subject, for I am still true to my training as a diplomat."—Exchange.

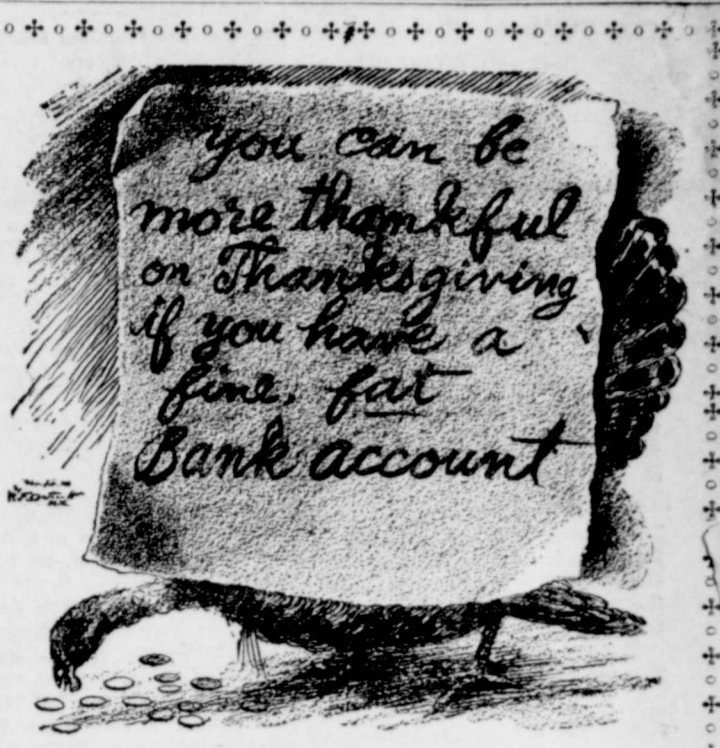
**COMMISSIONERS COURT**

The trial of J. Neal Sneed, charged with the killing of old man Boyce in Fort Worth, is still in progress in that city and will likely continue through several weeks. The case will be a hard fought one from both sides.

The announcement has been made by President Taft that he expects to fill all vacancies in federal offices by appointment before his term of office expires in March. This will end the contest among the Democratic candidates for the postmasterships in many places.

Plans are being made to pass the first vessel through the Panama canal some time next summer or early fall. The digging of this canal was one of the greatest undertakings in the history of the world and it is due to American energy and enterprise that it has been accomplished.

An indictment was reported by a federal grand jury at Augusta, Monday against Tom Watson, publisher of a paper called The Jeffersonian. The charge against him is sending obscene matter through the mails, growing out of an article published by him some time ago arraighing Catholicism.

A maniac carrying dynamite, a bottle of nitro-glycerine and a six shooter took possession of the city hall in Los Angeles, Cal., Monday and the occupants of the building fled panic stricken. Finally an officer was found who had nerve enough to knock the man cold and prevent great loss of life and property.

The four men known as the "gunmen" who killed Gambler Rosenthal in New York some months ago, were all convicted of the murder this week and sentenced to be electrocuted. The jury only required a few minutes to find all of the men guilty. Police Lieutenant Becker was convicted a few weeks ago for having incited the murder.

The Bulgarians and their allies have agreed to treat with the Turks for a cessation of hostilities and it is probable the war will be ended without the overthrow of Constantinople, which is regretted by the people of all nations. Providence seemed to be assisting the forces of the Allies to speakable terms to dispose of the peninsula and thousands of the people of that country, including the soldiers, are dying daily from cholera and fever.

Indications are that the Allen gang, who shot and killed several officers in Hillsville, Va., while one of their number was being tried, will reach the electric chair in good shape. The supreme court of that state has refused a new hearing to Floyd Allen and his son Claude and the time of their execution was fixed for yesterday, but the governor granted them a respite. Sidna Allen, another member of the gang, has been on trial this week for his part in the shooting.

Proclamations have been issued by both President Taft and Governor Colquitt designating the last Thursday in this month as "Thanksgiving" day and the time should certainly be observed by the people of Mills county, for we have everything for which to be thankful. We live on the best part of the earth, have made fairly good crops this year and the prices have been decidedly satisfactory, our citizenship is made up of the best people in the known world and the continued prosperity makes everybody happy.

Allenists who were appointed by the court to examine the crank Schrank who shot ex-President Roosevelt several weeks ago, while he was in Milwaukee, have reported that they believe the man insane. There are those who believe that the reported shooting was a hoax and that the alleged shooting was for the purpose of creating sentiment in the interest of Col. Roosevelt's campaign. Others as firmly believe that he was really shot, but if the man who is alleged to have done the shooting is found to be insane the true story may never be known.

TO MILLS COUNTY PEOPLE

The election has passed, new officers have qualified, and things, in that respect, are settled for two years. No one rejoices over this more than I, because that, notwithstanding a number of unwarranted attacks made upon some officials by designing, self-serving parties, the voting citizenship stood nobly by their selections of the primary. And also, because, the election over, quiet is restored and we may again get down to real work for the upbuilding of our county, which, I still think, is the best county in the world. I ought to believe this or leave the county; I ought to believe it in order to do my best for my county.

I have had little to say about reports, derogatory to myself. I have been too busy trying to do some good for the county to stop to run down false reports from irresponsible sources. Nor would I refer to them thus indirectly even, except as a part of my appeal to you, citizens—friend and foe alike—to use me in any way you can to serve our county's best interests. As a rule I have not found croakers, who spend their time misrepresenting those who are really trying to do something, very valuable citizens, nor very liberal, self-sacrificing toward those needing help. Take that class of people in Mills county—and, unfortunately, we have some—have you ever known them trying to make better schools or better churches in the county? Is a single one of them noted for his liberality toward the poor? I have no criticisms against them for their stand along these lines, for a man has the privilege of cursing churches, stifling education, and withholding bread from the starving poor about him; but I do think he should allow other men to help these causes without continually attacking them and misrepresenting them. Such a man cannot hurt the man he so attacks, but may so mislead the public as to cause them to get less good out of their real friend than they could get. I say again, when you hear a man vilifying some one whom you know is unselfishly doing what he can for the highest interests of your county and your children, just stop and try to recall any thing the villifier ever did not help anybody but himself, and don't stop too long, for if you stand till you find such a man you will not likely ever see him do anything else ever by you live.

We have a good county. We have more good people according to population than any county in the world. No place has cleaner public morals than has Mills county. We have as happy and independent people as live on earth. We may make choice between entering heartily into the work of pulling together to keep and strengthen and develop what we have that is good for our county, our homes and our children, or we may join the very few we have who are trying to down those who are trying to help us in these respects. "You can't fool all the people all the time." I have an abiding faith in the triumph of the Right. Right can take care of itself, but let us not be led into the fight against the Right.

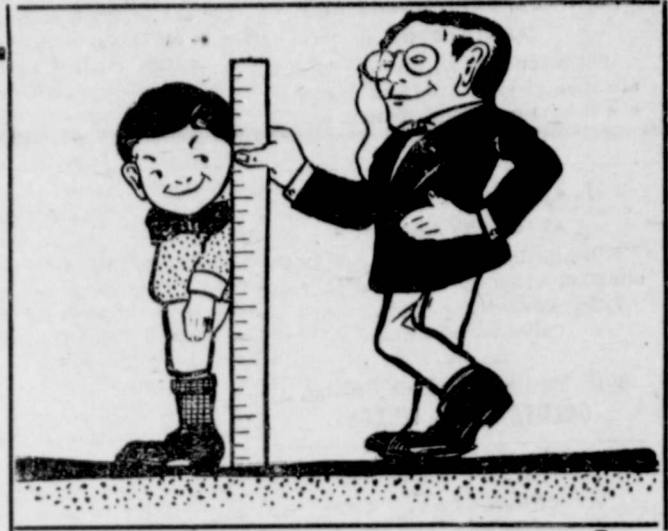

Plaintiff further alleges that the said deed executed by defendant J. L. Kinnebrew, Jr., conveys no title and represents no value, and that the said deed from plaintiff to defendant, J. L. Kinnebrew, Jr., is now and was at the time of its execution wholly without consideration, and plaintiff offers and tenders same and a reconveyance thereof back to defendants.

Wherefore plaintiff prays that defendants be cited in terms of the law to make answer herein, that upon final hearing he have judgment cancelling said deed so executed by him and that cloud be removed from his title to said Mills county land, and that said trade or exchange of land be in all things rescinded, and for all costs of this suit, and for such other and further relief both general and special, both in law and in equity.

Herein fail not, but have before said court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

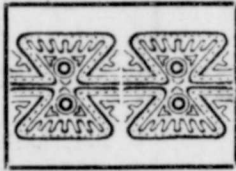

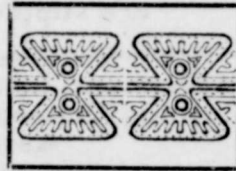
