One has a liberal education if he has been so trained in his youth that his body is the ready servant of his will, and does with ease and pleasure all the work that, as a mechanism, it is capable of; whose intellect is a cold, clear logic engine, with all of its parts of equal strength, and in smooth working order; ready, like a steam engine, to be turned to any kind of work, and spin the gossamers as well as forge the anchors of the mind; whose mind is stored with a knowledge of the great and fundamental truths of Nature and of the laws of her operation; one who, no stunted ascetic, is full of life and fire, but whose passions are trained to come to him by a vigorous will, the servant of a tender conscience; who has learned to love all beauty, whether of nature or art; to hate all villainy and to respect others as himself.—Huxley.

The recent report of the federal agricultural department giving a comparison of the 1911 crop with that of 1910 teaches a very practical and comprehensive lesson in economics. The Texas cotton crop in 1911 produced 4,297,248 bales valued at \$236,910,000 and in 1910 produced 3,672,932 bales valued at \$247,880,000, the 1911 crop showing an increase in bales of 1,224,316 and a decrease in value of \$16,970,000 over 1910. The Texas farmers paid a penalty of \$16,970,000 for increasing production 1,224,316 bales. The Texas situation is typical of that of the entire south. Certainly farmers are not suffering through lack of ability to produce cotton; in fact excessive production is destroying him. He needs help in decreasing production and in such emergencies drouth and the boll weevil appear to be his most reliable friends and allies. The country is beginning to recognize the value of the work of the Farmers Union in pleading for reduced acreage and better methods of marketing cotton. The Texas Farm Life Commission has a great work before it in studying these problems.—Commercial Secretaries

### PARCELS POST

The parcels post will become operative on Jan. 1, and every one should be familiar with its every provision, in order that they may give it a fair test and ascertain whether or not it will be beneficial. Patrons of the rural routes who do not understand the provisions of the new law should make special effort to inform themselves before the regulations become operative. There are two of the provisions that are especially important and should be carefully remembered. One is that regular letter postage WILL NOT be accepted on parcels, but they must be stamped with a distinctive stamp. The other rule is that every package forwarded through the mail under this system must bear the return card of the sender. By remembering these two rules much annoyance and inconvenience can be avoided for all concerned.

### SLACK CASE DISMISSED

The case of J. R. Slack, charged with shooting a man by the name of Speed or Snow in his corn field last year, was dismissed this week. The court of appeals delivered an opinion stating practically that Mr. Slack had a right to shoot a man degrading in his field and sent the case back to the district court here. The ruling made the dismissal necessary.

The grand jury investigated the shooting of J. B. Carter by Mr. Slack last summer and decided that no indictment should be returned, consequently he and his bondsmen were released from further responsibility in the case.

**TEACHERS INSTITUTE**  
To Be Held in Goldthwaite, December 16 to 20.

The school laws require all teachers having schools in the county to attend the institute the full five days, and to respond promptly and cheerfully when called upon for any work in the institute. We are anxious to make this work of practical value to the schools of the county. This may be done by earnestness and real interest on the part of teachers in attendance. The law provides that teachers shall receive regular wages for the institute week, provided they spend the entire week in institute work. No teacher losing a part of any day is entitled to pay for the institute week. The county superintendent is not authorized to excuse any teacher from full attendance; except it be upon a physician's certificate of actual sickness.

In making the program many good teachers' names do not appear. Those whose names do appear are merely leaders in the subjects assigned. All are expected to take part. It is hoped that a good attendance of trustees will be had Wednesday afternoon, the 18th. Teachers are urged to request the attendance of their trustees. State Superintendent Bralley has recommended the use of "School Room Essentials" by Sutton and Hern. This book is sold by C. A. Bryant & Co., Dallas, Texas. You may order from them direct, or I can furnish you the book at the same price and save you trouble and postage.

Teachers examinations for the next year will be based on this book. I have requested Prof. A. J. Street to have general charge of the institute. Respectfully,
