#### THINGS IN GENERAL.

There are not many men in the world big enough to build cities, but fortunately we have a few such men in Texas. Civilization has never been able to lay down specifications for building cities. They spring up in obedience to the command of powerful men. One man who can do things is of more value to a community than the entire population of a dozen dead towns.

There is no valid reason why there should be a pound of meat shipped into Texas, and the continued prosperity of agriculture demands that we raise more livestock--and especially hogs--of which we are sadly deficient. In fact, we should become heavy exporters of all kinds of meats. The geographical location of our packing houses gives them command of the trade of the southern hemisphere, and the opening of the Panama canal will bring the Orient within their trade territory, yet the Texas packing houses are able to supply only 2 per cent of the cured meats and lard shipped into Southern United States which transportation advantages, due to location, entitle them to furnish.

Clarence Ously appeared before the House Judiciary committee and urged the passage of the Calvin joint resolution proposing a constitutional county warehouse for the storage of cotton and other agricultural products. Discussing the work of our agricultural departments, Mr. Ously said: "The state is spending \$50,000 per year on agricultural experiment stations, etc., to increase the farmers' production, yet the more the farmer produces, the less he gets. If it were statesmanship to educate the farmers to increase production, it is now much more the part of statesmanship to provide for a proper system of marketing his products that the hands of the producer may get adequate remuneration. Mr. Ously has very aptly stated the situation. The

greatest curse in agriculture today is over-production and until we get a business method of marketing cotton, the boll weevil is as good a friend to the cotton farmer as the man who teaches him to increase production without providing a market.--Commercial Secretaries.

The government mints began to turn out nickels of the new design on Feb. 1. On one side of the coin is the head of a Cheyenne Indian chief, without the war bonnet, but with a feather arranged in his plaited hair. On the reverse is an American bison. These new coins will replace the old ones bearing the Goddess of Liberty design and the Roman numeral V. The new design, it is understood, will be maintained for the next twenty-five years, according to the law governing designs on coins in the United States. This is the only coin in circulation by the government that could be changed at this time.

If every business man gave his patronage to some hard pay customer rather than to the customer who pays his debts, the prompt pay man would have a "rocky" road to travel. Fortunately, few business men use their patronage as a collection agency and many of them refuse to patronize those who will not pay accounts. Let there be a premium placed on settlement of obligations rather than upon "standing off" bills.

"A wise man enjoys what he has--a fool keeps worrying trying to grab more," remarked the Galveston Tribune. If we were measured by the amount of financial wealth we possess, a great many of us would be very unwise, with the standard suggested by the Tribune applied to it. However, the real philosopher, perhaps, is the man who, having provided for a rainy day, is content to use the money he acquires afterward in doing good deeds and in making others happy and comfortable.--San Antonio Express.

#### SCHOOLS TO CONTINUE

Perhaps the most important feature in the \$10,000 prize offer of the Industrial Congress contest is that providing for competing schools in the four-crop model class. The Congress desires as many of the schools as will take this class and teachers and trustees everywhere are urged to provide a suitable tract of land to be cultivated by the pupils of the school in cotton, cowpeas and either corn or milo-maize.

This is a practical course in agriculture that every school is advised to try. The cultivation of the farm is to be directed by the teacher and trustees, the pupils of the school doing the work. Any of the prizes that might be awarded to the school and the proceeds of the crop could be used for a school library or otherwise as the school officials and the pupils might decide.

Any land owner who permits the use of four acres of ground for this demonstration farm will be amply repaid in the added fertility of his land that will result from plowing under the vines on the acre planted in cowpeas.

The schools everywhere should take advantage of this opportunity. Full particulars may be had by writing to the Congress at Dallas.--Industrial Congress.

SHORT WINTER COURSE.

For Farmers at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Several years ago the college authorities seeing the need of a course where the farmers could get together for a short time, set to work and organized the "Farmers' Short Course." These efforts were not in vain; as a course was planned which helps old and young, rich and poor; whether they come from the black land or from the sandy land of Texas. The third annual winter course was held this year from the 6th to 19th of January. There were enrolled about two hundred farmers from different parts of the state. The farmers who have attended the course in the past years owe much of their success to it.

In all business, and especially so with the farmers, new and improved methods must be studied to attain the highest success. In the past it was thought any one could farm; not so today. With the present price of Texas farming lands, a man must be a good farmer in order to pay for the land and lay by each year money to educate his children and enjoy the necessities and many of the luxuries of life. The farmer's girls and boys deserve the best education the state offers. A farmer must study his soil as the business man does his goods. The farmer must plan today for tomorrow.

There are many benefits to be derived from attending the short course. The instruction on the careful selection of seed was well worth to me and others the price of the course. Here it seems important to say that to neglect the field selection of seed is to neglect one of the most important requirements on the farm; but today this is one of the most neglected things on our Texas farms. We send north for our seed corn, when home grown seed that are already acclimated will do much better and do not cost near the money of northern seed. This not only applies to corn, but to other seed as well. The farmer who is field selecting his seed is the one who comes out ahead at harvest time.

The subject of plant propagation with the best methods of grafting and budding was discussed and illustrated by Prof. E. J. Kyle of the Horticultural department. Every farmer who owns an orchard should understand grafting and budding.

Prof. Jno. C. Burns of the Animal Husbandry department gave lectures on the feeding of live stock. Practice was also given in the judging of farm animals. Hog houses and hurdles were discussed. Proper feeding means the saving of money; therefore it is very important to the farmer that he understand feeding properly.

Lectures by Drs. Francis and Marsteller of the Veterinary department on the subjects of: Texas Fever, Tuberculosis, Hog Cholera, Lameness and Soundness are subjects that every farmer should familiarize himself with.

The following subjects were also discussed: Leguminous Crops, Staple Crops, Insects, Fertilizers, Spraying, Cold Frames and Hot Beds, Alfalfa, Fodder Crops and Solls. Monday was set aside for the use of tractor and farm machinery. A subject well discussed was how the county

with good roads must needs be the leading county. Bad roads are a hindrance to any county.

One day was taken by the Silo experts on the building and filling of silos. Prof. J. W. Ridgway of the Dairy department of the college discussed the cement silo, its cost and erection; followed by discussions on the stave silo. The silo has been for a long time a very necessary requirement of northern farms, and Texas ranchmen and farmers are fast learning that to keep abreast with the times they must follow their northern neighbors and build silos. If there is any country that needs the silo more than another, it is our western country. The hot winds are the cause of many a corn failure in this section of Texas. If this corn is cut at the time it begins to burn and put in the silo, it will save the farmers a neat sum of money each year. Corn, maize, kafir, and sorghum are the crops grown to fill a silo. The farmer with a few dairy cows, a silo, a cream separator and a few hogs to drink the skimmed milk does not have to dread dry weather.

During the course lectures were given by Col. R. T. Milner, Col. Henry Exall, Hon. S. S. Lindsey, Hon. Peter Radford and Hon. Sam. H. Dixon. Those who heard these men were doubly repaid for the time given them. I have pointed out the benefits derived in attending the farmers' short course given at the college each year. There are several reasons why every farmer should attend this course.

- 1. To get posted on the latest improved methods of farming.
2. To enable the farmer to make his soil produce the maximum yield on the minimum amount of moisture.
3. To post ones-self on the feeding and judging of live stock.
4. To meet with other farmers and discuss the different farming methods employed.
5. To study the insects so common on Texas farms.
6. To visit the school and see what Texas is doing in an educational way for the coming farmers of Texas.

### GOOD ROAD WORK.

Commissioners and Club Join in An Effort for Improvement.

Mills county's roads are to be greatly improved within the next twelve months, if the united work of the Commissioners court and the Commercial club can improve them.

A committee from the Commercial club appeared before the commissioners court this week and made a proposition that if the court would set apart a reasonable amount of the road funds of the county for special work to be done regardless of precinct lines and would select a supervisor to have charge of the work, the club would pay the wages of the supervisor, provided he was a practical road builder and was acceptable to all parties to the agreement. The court very wisely adopted the plan, since it meant the addition of a considerable amount to the road fund without taking the management out of the hands of the commissioners or placing it on roads without the direction of the court. The plan was proposed to the former court, but for some unaccountable reason was rejected, notwithstanding the county was to receive several hundred dollars from the club, without the club receiving a single cent from the county.

Under this agreement the court apportioned \$2,000 of the road fund to general use, to be expended by the supervisor under direction of the commissioners, the supervisor's salary to come from the treasury of the Commercial club. This means much more to the county than might be imagined, for it will enable the court to have a great deal more work done than the commissioners could possibly supervise. The law only allows the commissioners 24 days in each quarter for road work and they can and will still do the 24 days work, the supervisor's work to be in excess of this amount.

Now it behooves the citizens of each neighborhood and those living adjacent to any of the public roads to co-operate with the court and the club and we will soon have model roads throughout this county. The club is contributing the money for the supervisor and if the citizens living along the roads will contribute a reasonable amount of work in excess of that for which they receive pay rapid progress will be made.

One of the stipulations by the court was that the citizens of each neighborhood where road work is done should be given the preference in employment by the supervisor, provided suitable men and teams can be had at the different places and at a uniform price.

The people have learned this early that our commissioners are all enthusiastic good roads advocates as well as careful and level headed business men, and we all expect the county's interests to be materially advanced by them.

### QUEER COINCIDENCE.

John W. Latchford, engineer of Houston & Texas Central train No. 17, met instant death at precisely 2:48 o'clock Saturday morning when his locomotive plunged into a ditch.

The watch was in perfect running order; it had just been adjusted at the request of the engineer. Yet, exactly at 2:48 it stopped. This fact was discovered Saturday morning by L. S. Racine, an employe, who opened the safe to get out the watches and noticed that Latchford's watch had stopped. He tried to wind it, but was unable to—it was wound up tight! He took it to pieces and found that there was nothing wrong with any part of the works. The son of the owner of the establishment was in the office at the time and corroborates the story in every detail. The watch is a standard 21-jewel movement and is in absolutely perfect running order. No explanation of the matter has as yet been made. Latchford had had the watch for many years and this was the first time in years that he had gone out on the run without it.—Houston Chronicle.

### TELEGRAPH LINES BY GOVERNMENT.

The San Francisco Call in discussing the parcels post system and its success, which has been far greater than its friends expected for it, predicts that the government will in time take charge of the telegraph lines. The Call says in part: "The United States postoffice department has not yet reached the limit of its usefulness to the public. The next work it will probably undertake is the inclusion of the telegraph and telephone service among its functions. This may be accomplished either by purchase of the existing systems or by establishing a competing system. The former method would be the more economical, if the acquisition could be honestly and fairly accomplished. Postmaster General John Wanamaker in 1892 advocated that reform. He has since repeated his opinions on that subject, and is quoted as saying in New York in November, 1911: "It is no new thing, the suggestion that the postoffice department acquire and operate the telegraph in America. 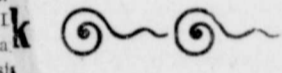
