THINGS IN GENERAL.

Col. Peter Radford, president of the Farmers' Union, has given the press some interesting data and startling information in relation to over-production and its effects upon marketing farm products. The statement shows that in 1911 the south produced 16,109,349 bales of cotton, which sold for \$732,420,000 and in 1910 we produced 11,965,962 bales which sold for \$820,320,000, an increase of 4,143,387 bales and a decrease of \$87,900,000. Agriculture has sunk its roots more deeply into government and industry during the past decade and in our mad rush to increase production, the marketing side of our farm problems has been overlooked. Production without profit is no incentive to the farmer.

Texas does something original most every week and other states and nations that desire to keep abreast of the times should send emissaries to Texas where they can see the fresh rush of life as it enters into new evolutions of progress. We are the thought-center of the nation and in this state powerful minds set in motion new economies that belt the earth in their travels. The latest achievement is a duel between pests, announced in press dispatches from Port Arthur. The Commercial club of that city has procured a supply of bats to turn loose on mosquitoes that thrive in the swamps of southeast Texas. The plan is said to work successfully and the bats disappear after ridding the country of mosquitoes.

In erecting an employees' club-house and restaurant, Sears Roebuck & Co. of Texas have inaugurated an important feature which will no doubt be followed by other concerns who employ a large number of people. This club-house will be three stories high and will contain cafeteria, dining room, and lunch room facilities accommodating six-hundred people at one time. The main cafeteria will be so arranged

that it can be turned into an assembly room for the employees.—Commercial Secretaries.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

The initiative, referendum and recall met its Waterloo in the house during the latter part of last week. The vote stood 84 to 36. It requires ninety-five votes, or two-thirds of the house membership to submit an amendment to the constitution. Rogers of Wise county led the fight for the measure.

The house has adopted the senate concurrent resolution, submitting a constitutional amendment providing for bond issues for the State University, A. & M. college, penitentiary system and for public warehouses, with only two votes cast in opposition.

The Senate Insurance committee has reported favorably upon the house bill regulating reciprocal insurance companies and the bill prohibiting life insurance agents from misrepresenting their own or a rival company.

The Senate Judiciary committee No. 2 has reported favorably upon the bill prohibiting the sale of beverages containing caffeine to minors. This measure has created considerable discussion throughout the state.

The senate has adopted the house concurrent resolution providing for sine die adjournment of the regular session April 1.

Governor Colquitt is reported to have declared that between now and adjournment nothing save platform demands and appropriation bills would be read or considered by him.—Commercial Secretaries.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Interesting Meeting—Important Committees Appointed.

The meeting of the Commercial club Monday night was interesting throughout.

A report was made that the road work was progressing rapidly west of the bayou and the Ebony and Regency road would soon be in fine condition. The fair committee was instructed to prepare a letter to the people of that section advising them of the completion of the road and inviting them to come to Goldthwaite to buy goods.

The president appointed the following special committees for the fair: Committee on grounds—J. H. Randolph, J. B. Whiteman, H. G. Bodkin.

Committee on sale of privileges—B. F. Geeslin, E. M. Boon, A. E. Evans.

Committee to prepare premium list—W. P. McCullough, H. F. Martin, Edward Geeslin.

The committee appointed to secure prices on fire extinguishers and solicit the purchase of extinguishers by the business men reported progress. The extinguishers were priced at \$6.50 each and the information was that insurance companies granted a reduction of 8 per cent on the premiums for insurance where a sufficient number of the extinguishers were installed.

The matter of erecting a building for an exhibit hall at the fair grounds was discussed and the committee on grounds was instructed to ascertain the cost of a suitable structure and prepare estimates for the consideration of the club. E. M. Boon was appointed to act with the committee in this matter.

The club will meet again Monday night and all those who want somebody to "boost the town" are urged to attend the meeting and at least give an idea of the kind of "boosting" they desire done.

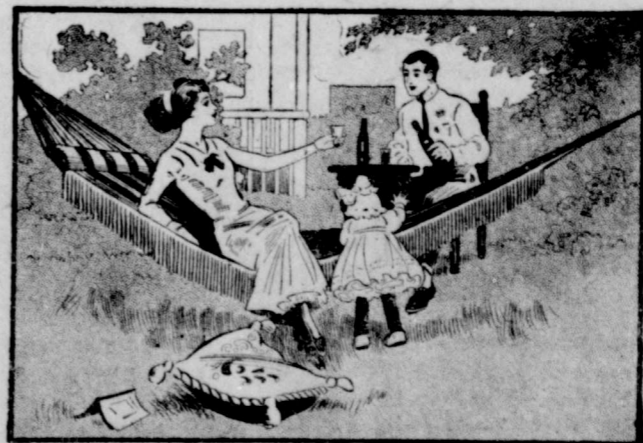

The regular session of the thirty-third legislature of this state will come to a close at noon next Tuesday, according to resolutions adopted by both houses.

Seventy students were dropped from the rolls at the state university at Austin last Saturday because of their failure to make the necessary grades in their studies. This is the first time such drastic measures have been adopted by the faculty in enforcing the rules.

According to Hon. Chas. Mills, member of the legislature from Navarro county, the lobbyists at Austin are exceedingly bold and some are even insolent. One lobbyist had the audacity to announce to several different people that certain legislation which he opposed should not even be considered by the law-makers.

So far the legislature has done nothing toward providing for more room in the insane asylums, in order that the unfortunate insane who are now confined in county jails over the state may be properly cared for by the state and given treatment that may result in the restoration of their mental faculties. No more important matters could be given attention by the legislature at this time.

The suspension of Judge T. A. Bledsoe as county judge of Taylor county a few days ago was followed by his indictment on several counts for forgery, the charge being that he cashed a number of county warrants by forged signatures. He was arrested as he boarded a train at a small station near Abilene, but he jumped from the train and made good his escape. Judge Bledsoe was elected president of the county judges' association a few months ago.

The reforms in the penitentiary management and in the control of convicts have been marked and wonderful in the last few years and the humiliation of being a convict is now about all the punishment that attaches to one found guilty of crime. The Eagle believes that the result will be detrimental to the country, in that men will not be deterred from committing crime because of the fear of punishment and that class that is not humiliated by a conviction will feel free to commit crimes and depredations at will. The penitentiary reforms and the suspended sentence laws are mainly in the interests of criminals and against the best interest of the country.

When Governor Hogg announced a few years ago that he intended to put some of the trust magnates in stripes, many of the people believed the statement to be that of a vote hunting demagogue, but time has proved that his ideas were correct and the prevention of the oppression of the people can be accomplished by convicting the men guilty and placing them in penal servitude rather than placing fines upon them, which are in turn assessed against the people. The time is not far distant when these gigantic combinations will be broken up and the men who are responsible for their formation will indeed and in truth be wearing stripes.

The appalling disasters caused by rain, floods and fires in Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Nebraska and other states within the last few days have few equals in the history of the country. The greatest flood damage was done at Dayton, Ohio, where hundreds of people lost their lives when the levees broke and the city was inundated. Bodies floated about the streets and hundreds of people were drowned in their homes. At Indianapolis, Ind., the condition was almost as bad as at Dayton, although the loss of life was not so great. At Fort Wayne, Evansville, and other points in Indiana, and at Cincinnati, Hamilton, Delaware and other points in Ohio, conditions were equally as appalling. Citizens of Comanche were startled Sunday night about 7:30 by the fire alarm, the blaze proving to be the barn of County School Superintendent W. D. Jenkins, the building being entirely destroyed. Besides the loss of the building and feed stuff therein, Mr. Jenkins also suffered the loss of two horses and a surrey.

D. E. Anderson, aged 72, suffered the accident of breaking his leg at his home six miles east of Comanche Thursday morning of last week. NEW PENSION LAW.

A law granting to Ex-Confederate soldiers pensions of \$8.33 per month under the provisions of the recently adopted constitutional amendment is practically passed in both branches of the thirty-third legislature. This new law will enlarge the number of pensioners now on the rolls of the state more than double what they are at present. It is estimated that there will be not less than twenty-five thousand on the new rolls and the work of issuing the quarterly reports to these men and women will be a tremendous task. The provisions of the law apply also to the widows of Confederate soldiers born not later than 1861. Of course only those soldiers and their widows who are "indigent" will receive such pensions, but the bill goes on to define the word indigent in such a way as to admit to the benefits of the law all those not having property worth in excess of one thousand dollars over and above the value of the homestead, where the homestead itself is not worth more than a thousand dollars, household goods not to be considered. Altogether it seems to be a very liberal law.—Brownwood Bulletin.

GOOD ROADS.

Many of the model highway laws in the various states have been prepared under the advice of the road experts of the Department of Agriculture and all the data and statistics of the Office of Public Roads are at the disposal of the legislature.

In the last bulletin of the Office of Public Roads, it was stated that at the close of 1909, 8.66 per cent of the roads in the United States were improved. This represents a gain in the total road mileage improved for the five-year period, 1904-1909, of 1.52 per cent or, in other words, the percentage of improved roads has increased during this period from 7.14 to 8.66 per cent.

In the three years that have passed since then, it is roughly estimated that the percentage of improved roads has gone well beyond 9 per cent and possibly close to 10 per cent. It is estimated that if 20 per cent of the public highways were improved—each highway being selected and improved with a view to the proportionate traffic upon it—a high degree of efficiency in highway transportation would be reached. It is figured that millions of dollars would be saved annually in the transportation of crops, the wear and tear on horses and vehicles, and in the minimizing of the waste in truck farming. Where roads are bad, the farmers frequently find it impossible to get their products to the shipping points and thus perishable products are wasted, perceptibly increasing the cost of living.

The conditions in the flooded district of Ohio and Indiana beggars description. Dayton, Ohio, suffered more than any other one point, the estimate of the number who perished being from 2000 to 8000 people. One report from that city says: "At least 65,000 persons are imprisoned in homes and in business buildings. It is feared that two days imprisonment with accompanying hunger and fright has caused tremendous suffering. The flood came with such suddenness that food supplies were whisked away by the torrent that reached to second floors in almost the flash of an eye. Skiffs started at the edge of the flooded district attempting to take food to those whom it was impossible to carry off, but the fierce current discouragingly retarded this work."

In a statement recently issued, Representative Boehmer of Eagle Pass, stoutly denies the report that his famous illiteracy bill included any reference to poll tax receipts. He states that he has always opposed the poll tax requirement. His bill provides that no one shall be allowed to assist a voter in making out his ballot. An educational test is also included in the measure.

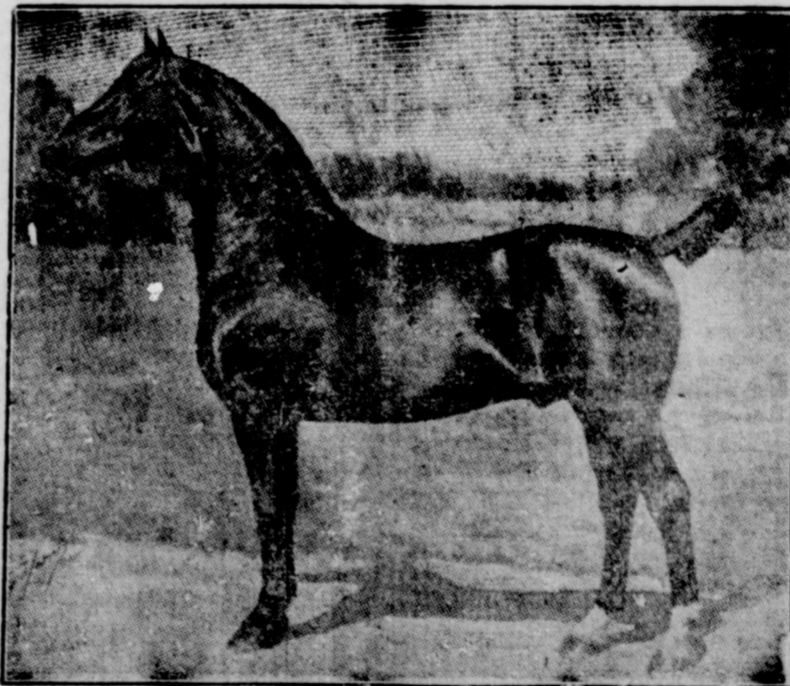

His first investment was made when a confidence man sold him the Brooklyn bridge for \$1000. Later he was confided by sharpers out of several hundred dollars and left for his native country a much wiser but much poorer man.

The day of trusts and combines in this country is drawing to a close and that rapidly. The people have become aroused over the subject and the courts and legislative bodies devote a great deal of time in dealing with the matter of suppressing these unlawful combinations. Like the prohibition question, time and experience is necessary in framing laws that will be effective, but some of the best minds of the nation are at work framing statutes that will make such gigantic combinations as the Standard Oil Company impossible.

A question of vital importance to the express companies and the public under consideration by the postoffice department and the legal department of the government is whether or not the express companies have the right to carry small parcels which can be carried by parcels post. There is a federal statute which forbids private individuals or corporations competing with the government in the matter of handling mail and it is thought by some that this statute operates against the express companies when they attempt to compete with the government by carrying packages that can be carried by the parcels post.
