The amount of the shortage in the funds of the State National bank, one of the Fort Worth big banks, as determined by the expert accountants and the bank examiners, has been fixed at \$130,000. Mike L. Wood, who was active vice president of the bank for a long time, is charged with embezzling the funds and has surrendered to the officers. Wood stands high and his friends and acquaintances are slow to believe that he is guilty of the charge.

There is a rumor in Washington that Hon. Jas. L. Slayden will be a candidate for governor of Texas in the next campaign. He is in Europe and will not return to this country for several days, consequently, the rumor could not be verified, but it is probably incorrect.

In the prohibition election in Calahan county last Saturday the county remained in the dry column by an increased majority over the vote of two years ago. The pros. also secured a large majority in the election at Clyde Saturday.

Manifestos have been sent to the revolutionists in Mexico by the Huerta adherents advising them to unite with the government forces to protect their country against the invasion of the United States troops. It is claimed by the federal military authorities that invasion is almost certain.

The democratic tariff bill passed the senate Tuesday and was referred to a conference committee from both branches of congress. The measure as finally adopted made an average reduction in tariff charges of about 23 per cent from existing rates.

Those who want the bat kept out of our penitentiaries and labor union working hours for the convicts seem to have no objection to the rod being used on our school children or to boys and girls on the farm working from sunrise to sunset.—Victoria Advocate.

The Mexican congress meets Monday in the City of Mexico, at which time the resignation of Huerta, who claims the presidency, is expected to take place. The constitution of Mexico forbids the president ad interim becoming a candidate for the office, but he can resign a few days before the election and in that way avoid the constitutional inhibition. The most serious difficulty in his way is the refusal of the United States government to recognize his government, which prevents him borrowing money to continue the war. President Wilson says that he will not give governmental sanction to an election that would place Huerta in charge of Mexico's affairs and this announcement may make a change in the plans of the groasers in charge of the government's affairs.

Heavy rains have fallen in some parts of the state this week and in almost every section there has been some rain. At Lampasas there has been more rain than has fallen there in a number of years and the Leader says that water was higher in the streets there than some people there ever saw it.

All over Mills county good rains have fallen, but the quantity has not been sufficient to do damage. The fall feed crops will be benefitted, ground has been put in fine condition for fall plowing and oat sowing and the outlook is encouraging to everybody. There is a great deal of open cotton in the fields and a heavy rain accompanied by wind would have caused great damage, but the way the rain fell it was of vast benefit and no damage.

The list for the High school will not be published, but High school students are hereby directed not to purchase books until instructed to do so in class, after the opening of school. This list includes only the books required for the first part of the session. The complete list will be in the catalog.

Entombed in a grim castle on the outskirts of Lisbon are some of the most miserable men on earth. These are inmates of Portugal's "prison of silence." In this building everything that human ingenuity can suggest to render the lives of its prisoners a horrible, maddening torture is done. The corridors, piled tier on tier, five stories high, extend from a common center like the spokes of a huge wheel. The cells are narrow, tomb-like and within each stands a coffin. The attendants creep about in felt slippers. No one is allowed to utter a word. The silence is that of the grave. Once a day the cell doors are unlocked and the 500 wretches march out, clothed in shrouds and with faces covered by masks, for it is part of this hideous punishment that none may look upon the countenance of his fellow prisoners. Few of them endure this torture for more than ten years.—Baltimore Sun.

#### ELECTION ORDER.

The State of Texas—County of Mills.

Whereas, on the 11th day of Aug. 1913, a petition was presented to the Commissioners court of Mills county for an election in the territory comprised in and composing the common school districts of Becker Mountain and numbered 47 and Priddy, numbered 54, of this county on the question of prohibiting horses, cattle, jacks and jennets from running at large in the said territory; and whereas, the said Commissioners court passed an order granting the election prayed for; and whereas, said petition and said court order were in all respects in conformity to law.

Now, therefore, I, E. H. Allen, in my capacity as County Judge of Mills county, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 27th day of September, 1913, in the village of Priddy, in Mills county, Texas, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified voters in the territory above set out desire that the classes of stock above mentioned be prohibited from running at large in said territory.

Joe Pfluger is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after the said election has been held, make due returns thereof to the Commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

The ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE STOCK LAW."

"AGAINST THE STOCK LAW."

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are resident voters in said district shall be entitled to vote in said election.

This order published shall be due legal notice of said election.

Rain has fallen in almost every section of Texas this week.

American inspectors at El Paso shot and killed a Mexican soldier on the bridge across the Rio Grande Saturday night. The greaser made a murderous assault upon the inspectors and but for their prompt action he might have killed one or both of them.

The arrest of Attorney Jerome in Canada, on a charge of gambling, was applauded by the great mass of the American people as well as the people of other countries who were advised concerning the lawyer's proceedings in hounding Harry Thaw. He was subsequently acquitted and liberated, but the arrest and trial gave the public an opportunity to show its disapproval of the "shyster" methods employed by the lawyer.

Fire in the business section of Hot Springs, Ark., which commenced in a negro hut and was communicated to the business section, destroyed many millions of dollars worth of property. Block of buildings were burned, notwithstanding the efforts of a large force of trained fire fighters equipped with all modern machinery and supplied with ample water supply. Hundreds of people were rendered homeless and lost all of their belongings in the fire.

Eight negro convicts were suffocated in a small dark room on the state farm near Richmond Saturday night. The suffocation of these convicts was directly traceable to the Sunday school methods adopted by the state government in the management of the penitentiaries. The whipping system being abolished the criminals no longer fear those in authority and refuse to obey orders and are said to curse the guards openly. Saturday twelve negroes were reported to the manager for failure to pick the requisite amount of cotton and they were ordered placed in the dark room as a means of punishment. The meagre amount of air admitted to the room by means of four holes in the floor was not sufficient to sustain life in the men. Had the whipping system been in vogue the negroes would likely have picked the required amount of cotton, fearing that punishment would be meted out to them, but since the whipping could not be administered, they cared nothing for the orders or requirement. Many times already the falacy of the abolition of the strap in the government of convicts has been shown and will continue to be shown.

The story is told of the old farmer who was always deep in the dumps. A neighbor visited him and listened all the morning to his tale of woe. The noon hour came and with it a splendid repast; but, the meal finished, the farmer again took up his story of hard times and drew many ugly pictures of despair. In the afternoon the smoke house was visited, and the guest was shown the splendid display of fine hams and middlings—but the farmer continued his stories of starvation and woe. Finally the guest ventured to suggest that his host had an ample supply of meat. "Yes," said the farmer, "I have plenty of meat for this year, and have fine killing hogs for next year's supply of meat, and shotes for meat year after next, but where under the shining sun of heaven the next meat is to come from I don't know." And so it is with all of us. Our hope, our assurance is but for the minute. We have never seen anybody starve, but our imaginations, our fears strew the future with the skeletons of those who fell and perished by the wayside for lack of bread and meat. Looking upon us as He did upon the Hebrews of old, doubtless the Master is led to say every day, "O ye of little faith."—Honey Grove Signal.

Miss Nellie Anderson came in yesterday from her home in Brady. She will teach in the public school here again next year.

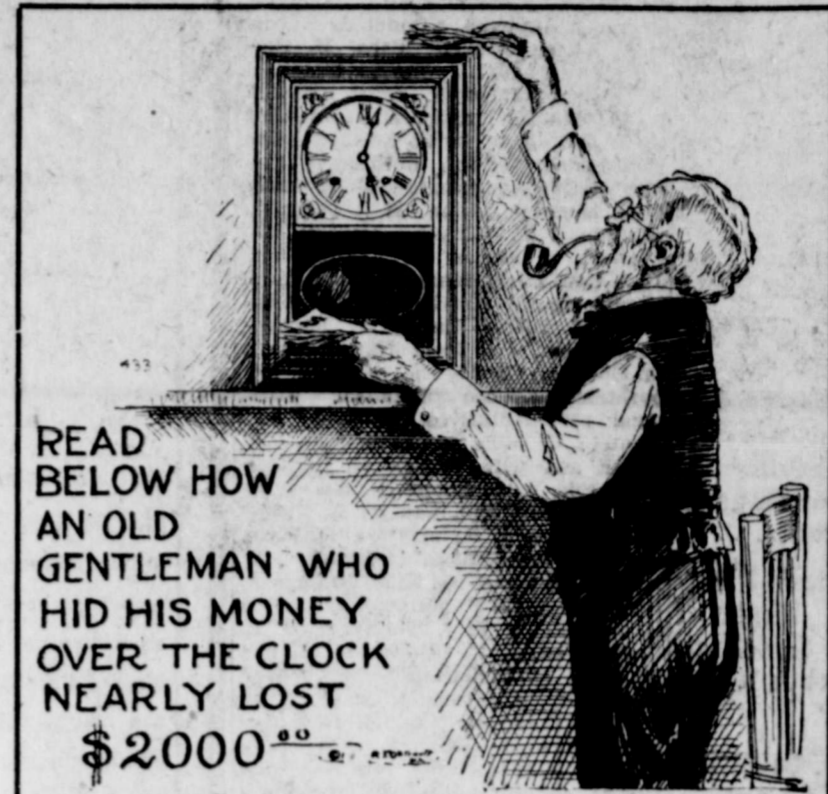

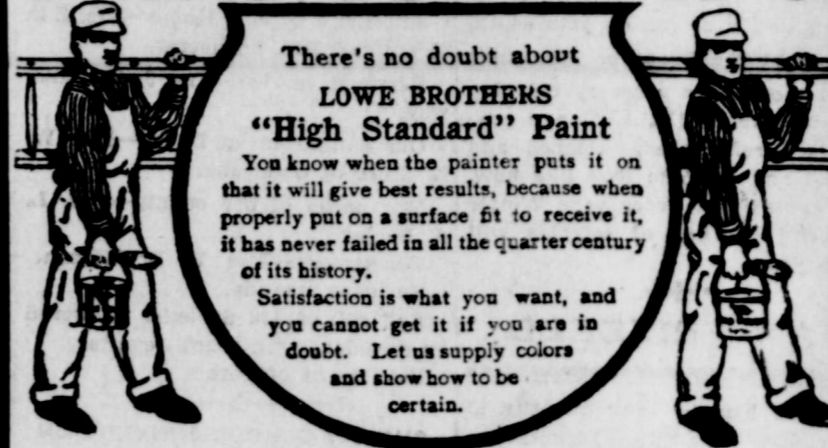
