

### FIRE AT LOMETA

About 12 o'clock Saturday three buildings and their contents were destroyed by fire at Lometa, the total loss being something like \$3000.

The Masonic hall building was destroyed. The lower story belonged to Wm. Sonneman and the upper story to the Masonic fraternity, and the entire building was lost. Value about \$1000, R. E. Hill had a stock of saddlery, harness, tools, etc., in the lower story and this was also a complete loss; value about \$1000. The Masons had \$500 insurance on . their part of the building and fixtures, but neither Sonneman nor Hill had insurance.

The tin shop owned by Jim Sanders was destroyed and was valued at \$300, with no insurance. The building was owned by Mrs. Phelan and was not insured.

The building and blacksmith shop of Mr. Nance was a total loss with no insurance and probably \$500 went up in flames at this place.

The fire was right against the Barnes Lumber Co. office and yard. and some damage was done to the stock, but this is fully covered by insurance.

The origin of the fire is unknown. but it is thought to have originated from a soldering pot in the tinshop.-Lampasas Leader.






