In the cleanest town in Texas contest inaugurated by Holland's Magazine Bonham was winner by 3-10th of 1 per cent over Brownwood.

Fire destroyed the docks at Jacksonville, Fla., last Saturday, causing the loss of a half million dollars. Several ships at anchor in the harbor caught fire and were damaged.

Many deaths in Japan have resulted from volcanic eruptions and earthquakes in the last week. Thousands of people have been rendered homeless and cities have been destroyed.

The announcement was made in the daily papers of Sunday that Sam Sparks of Austin, former state treasurer, would be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor.

The geologist of the Colorado state university states that there are fifteen radium springs in Colorado, but for lack of funds a complete bulletin of the find can not be made at this time.

It is safe to depend that there will be another statewide prohibition campaign in 1915. The meeting of prohibitionists in Fort Worth today will discuss the matter and likely outline the campaign in a general way.

A man known as H. P. Witt was convicted of murder at Gatesville last Saturday and given seventy-five years in the penitentiary. Witt has frequently passed as a preacher, although he was a fugitive from justice, charged with bigamy, it being known that he had five living wives.

A most unusual case is reported from Galesburg, Ill. A girl not yet out of her teens confesses that she conspired with her step father to murder her mother in order that they might be married. She states that she was in an adjoining room at the time of the murder and assisted in planning it. The man has confessed.

Paderewski, the great pianist, has cancelled his dates for entertainments in Texas because of an attack of neuritis in his left arm. He is now under treatment in California, but it is not known what the result of the treatment will be and it is feared he will be incapacitated for some time. He was to have appeared in Houston next week.

A commission has been appointed by the French government to investigate the alarming increase of leprosy in that country. It is claimed there are now 600 lepers in France, which is an alarming increase over the number a few years ago. Medical experts say that in many instances rats have carried leprosy from one place to another.

Seven men were killed and three other persons were wounded at McAlester, Okla., Monday when three convicts attempted to escape from the state penitentiary. The three men were killed, but the desperate men killed Judge John Thomas and three prison officials and wounded three other persons, one of whom was the young lady operator at the prison telephone exchange.

The meeting of the prohibitionists who favor eliminating all but one of the candidates for governor who favor prohibition will be held in Fort Worth today. It is not likely they will accomplish anything worthy of consideration, for the candidates do not desire to enter such a contest, preferring rather to submit their claims to the Democratic party and few of them are willing to rest their claims on one issue alone.

An American syndicate has offered to the Turkish government a loan of \$120,000,000 on condition that it shall receive several important timber and railroad concessions in Asia Minor. According to a dispatch from Constantinople the concessions contemplated include the whole right of exploitation of timber areas and railroad concessions in Central Anatolia. This scheme of promotion was first suggested by Arthur Chester of New York two years ago.

## TALENT APPRECIATED

From the time of Father Abraham to the present time people have entertained angels unaware and have also been associated with men and women with unusual ability without fully appreciating them. When, a few years ago, Mr. Leonard Doughty published for the first time his translations from Heine in the columns of the Eagle it is likely many of the readers did not fully appreciate the greatness of the work. The translations have since been published in the Alcalde, a magazine by the alumni of the University and the following article on the work was written by Mr. John H. Reagan and published in the Houston Chronicle of last Sunday.

**In the Days of Heinrich Heine**  
Have you met Leonard Doughty? An ex-University of Texas man who practices law and follows literary pursuits as a hobby? Of course, if you have, more words are unnecessary. You have been ruled out of order, shown the idiosyncrasy of your ways and the narrowness of your vision; but if you have not, then you still have the pleasure of meeting a man of poetry, a genuine scholar, a clever delineator of types and a successful business man. He recently published the first of a series of Heinrich Heine's poems done into the English. These appeared in the December issue of the Alcalde.

If in characterizing the man I had mentioned alone the first three beatitudes and withdrawn the last you would be justified in refined snubbing. Just as much so as you have in sitting at a respectful distance from a crack-brained fellow who not infrequently rides upon one of our street car lines, but withal has enough of "beauty in his heart" to live out under the trees at a place he calls "The House of Seven Pines Under the Blue Dome." Poets are and always have been dangerous fellows.

To judge Leonard Doughty from the standard of "ginger" into the story and "human interest" in the lead is to be slightly disappointed. He's a bit heavy to the average—the unhappy average. There's no doubt but what he's read most of the Greek and Roman classics and enjoyed them. It's a business calamity and to be deplored, but so long as he has been successful at business, the shortcoming may be overlooked.

Kenneth Grahame, who wrote the Golden Age, and so many other splendid English books, was a successful banker. Of course he did not let his banking people know that he had a "literary bee" in his bonnet, or they would have withdrawn their accounts. And that fine fellow Steadman, who went down on the Titanic, was a publisher. Romain Rolland taught and lectured upon music for what "seemed ages," and de Morgan, the author of Joseph Vance, painted and did other commercial things before he brought down a mantle of the "dubious" on his head by writing a really wonderful book. So after all Mr. Doughty does not stand alone in his delicate position. We might even say fragile position when we recall some of the better known Texas authors and poets.

The first series of the Heine poems appears in the Alcalde, the official publication of the former students of the University of Texas. It is Leonard Doughty's second appearance in that magazine. Both times he has caused what a well informed society editor would term a "furor." His first brilliant appearance upon the horizon was in an article upon Governor Oran M. Roberts, whom he had known and loved as friend and instructor. The paper was one which struck into the very camp of the alumni of the State University, and since then he need only say, "I wish," and there are thousands of men and women who would answer: "It's yours whatever you wish."

The work of a translator is usually thankless. It is no easy matter to take a poet, so individual as Heine, and transform the original text into the English. There are German idioms which will not yield to the pressure of the Anglo-Saxon hammer, and there are Heine threads of gold and wit which will not render the same clear note in the one language as in the other. ## INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS.
