INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS.

Competitive Live Stock Production Included in the Plans.

Robert H. Cary, a boy eleven years old of Laneville, Rusk county, has written to the Texas Industrial Congress at Dallas that he has a fine Hereford calf which he wants to enter in the Pryor Beef Club of the Congress and that he expects to make west Texas "sit up and take notice" that the eastern section of the state can produce livestock.

The Congress this year, following out the plans of Col. Exall, has provided three livestock classes and has named them in honor of three prominent Texans, who have shown especial interest in livestock production. For men, the Congress has provided a contest for the best three year old steer, to be fed from July 1 to Nov. 1 next. The animal in this class, which is termed the Kleberg Beef Club, will be judged from the butcher's standpoint. Ten prizes, amounting to \$600 will be awarded for the best results.

Contestants in this class are required by the Congress to be contestants in class A, which constitutes the model demonstration farm contest.

The Pryor Baby Beef Club is intended for boys and girls between the ages of ten and twenty years, who produce the best baby beef from the butcher's standpoint. \$500 divided into fourteen prizes are offered for the best results shown in this class.

For boys and girls who are interested in hog raising, the Congress has formed the Frank P. Holland Hog Club, and offers fourteen prizes amounting to \$500 for the best hogs produced.



The prohibitionists were victorious in the elections in Lampasas and Limestone counties last Saturday. The Lampasas county election was of especial interest in this county.

The state board of water engineers will be in Goldthwaite on April 7 to hear the petitions of those interested in using the waters of the public streams for irrigation purposes.

An old man in San Antonio is desirous of donating one of his legs to a young friend who has lost a pedal extremity. However, the surgeons refuse to amputate the limb and the old man is mad about it.

Good rains have fallen in different parts of the county this week and there is a good season in the ground and fine prospects for crops in every community.

The city election takes place next Tuesday and the pool hall election on Wednesday, April 8. Every voter should go to the polls and cast his ballot on the subjects submitted. Don't forget about these elections.

No matter how one thinks of the Mexican situation or which side has his sympathy, the valor and endurance of those taking part in the Torreon battle forces admiration for all of them.

The plant of the Franklin water and light company was destroyed by fire Saturday. An election has now been ordered in that town to authorize the issuance of bonds to provide a municipal water and light system.

A mob took a negro woman from jail at Muskogee, Okla., Monday night and hanged her to a telephone pole. The woman murdered a young white man in that city a few nights ago by stabbing him through the heart as he passed her house.

The lower house of congress voted Tuesday to repeal the provision of the Panama canal act exempting American vessels from payment of tolls. The result was a victory for President Wilson, who favored such a repeal and the vote was 274 to 161.

A citizen of Lometa started to Temple a few days ago to have an operation for appendicitis. He stopped en route at Belton for a visit to relatives and while there his wife found the point of a needle protruding from his side and when it was removed he was relieved from his "appendicitis."

The announcement is made from Austin that Will H. Mayes, lieutenant governor of the state and editor of the Brownwood Bulletin, has been made dean of the school of journalism in the state University. Mr. Mayes is eminently fitted for the position, having spent many years in the newspaper work, besides being a man of fine ability.

A citizen of McLennan county has filed a suit against the I. & G.N. railroad for damages for ejecting him from a train because he refused to surrender his ticket until the trainmen provided him with a seat. It has long been believed that passengers could demand a seat on a train where they paid their fares and the courts will now have an opportunity to pass on the question.

Efforts are being made by friends and admirers of Governor Colquitt to induce him to enter the race for a third term and submit his name to the elimination convention on April 14. The withdrawal of Sam Sparks from the contest leaves the anti-prohibition Democratic endorsement where it can be had by J. E. Ferguson for the asking, if Governor Colquitt does not get his "hat in the ring."

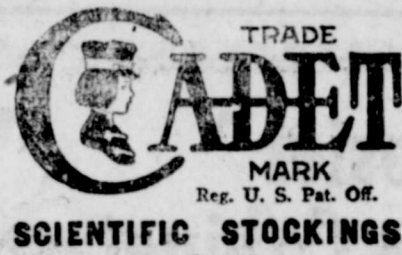

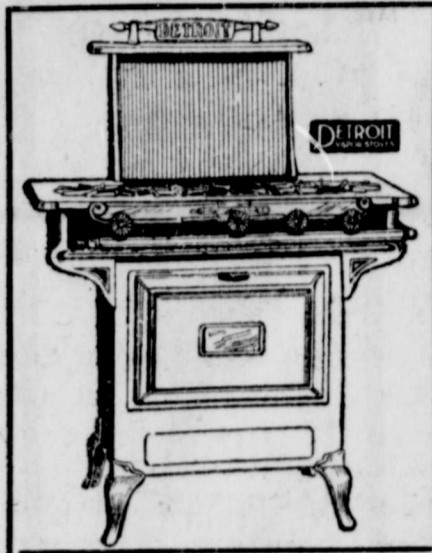

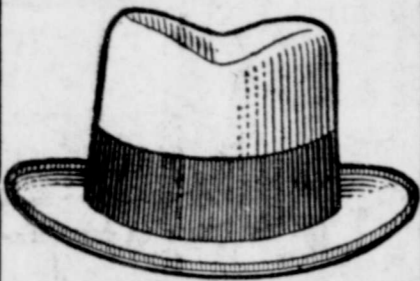
