### AIRSHIP AT FAIR.

Money Subscribed to Pay for Nine Flights During the Three Days.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club has secured the funds to pay for an airship to make three flights daily during the fair and reunion here July 28, 29, 30. The secretary of the club was instructed to at once close the contract with the firm furnishing the entertainment and there is now no doubt that the people who attend the fair will see an up-to-date aeroplane and will not only see it fly but will be enabled to make an inspection of the machine and ascertain just how it is operated. The headquarters of the company are in New York city, but they will have one of their "1914 Model" Military Speed monoplanes in this state next month and Goldthwaite will be on the list of towns to be visited. They travel in their own special car and will be here on time and remain all the time.

This will be one of the best opportunities the people of this section will ever have to see one of these big flying ships in operation and inspect its working.

It is planned for this occasion to be the greatest of the kind in this part of Texas. Ample provision will be made for the comfort as well as the entertainment of the people and it is hoped and believed that thousands of people will be here for the three days.

### DON'T STOP CULTIVATING

In the country correspondence of the press of the State, the statement is becoming frequent that "the farmers are almost ready to lay by their corn and cotton." Texas has had an unusually wet spring, which very probably indicates a wet summer and it is a well known fact that plants do not root so deeply in the wet springs. Therefore, if there ever has been a time when the crops should receive frequent shallow cultivation up to the time of making the ear or the opening of the boll, that time is now. Maintaining the soil mulch by cultivation will keep all the moisture in the ground, moisture that will be greatly needed if there should be a season of drouth. Two or three late plowings of corn have been known to make a difference of from five to twenty percent in the yields, and this difference, expressed in dollars and cents will mean a good deal later on. Farmers should not be too ready to "lay by" since keeping at it will make the crops more profitable--Industrial Congress.

### COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Arrangements for Fair--Airship Secured--Encouraging Outlook.

The Goldthwaite Commercial club met in called session Monday night to hear reports of committees in charge of the arrangements for the fair and reunion.

The program committee reported a ready response to the demand for entertainments. Speaking, music, contests and other modes of entertainment and amusement had been provided and arranged. The first and second days to be devoted to a general line of entertainment together with the Confederate reunion. The third day will be Fraternal Order day and the third night will be the time for the contest between the singing clubs of the county.

The amusement committee reported along with the program committee, besides stating the progress of plans for securing an airship or flying machine for all three days. It was announced that a reliable company producing such entertainments, had agreed to furnish an up-to-date machine to make three flights daily for the three days for \$150 per day, making a total of \$450 for the three days. The club appropriated \$100 of this amount, or as much thereof as might be needed to make up the amount, and President W. C. Dew announced that he would personally donate \$100 for the entertainment. A committee composed of W. H. Trent, Lee Jones, and L. E. Miller was then appointed to solicit contributions from the business men and citizens generally to pay the remainder.

Mr. W. F. Barnes of Lampasas, senior member of the firm of Barnes & McCullough, was present and made an interesting talk and demonstration on silos.

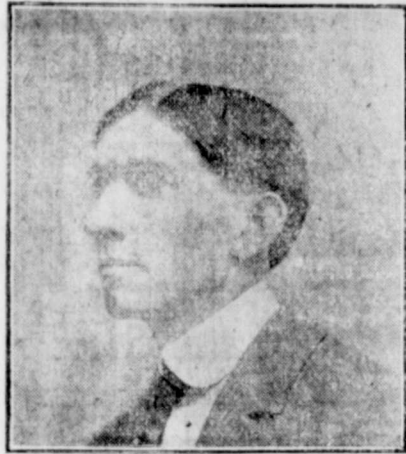

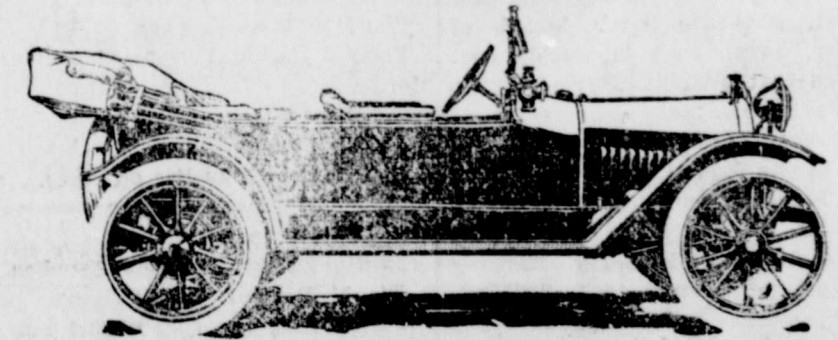

A donation of \$11,000 has been made by John D. Rockefeller to the commander of the Salvation army, for the relief of the sufferers from the steamship Empress of Ireland disaster.

Four of the old soldiers from the Confederate Home at Austin have written Brother Haralson that they expect to be at the reunion here next month. We are going to have a crowd from every direction, both old and young people.

An actor known as "Willard the Wizard" suicided Saturday night in the jail in Cincinnati, where he was held on a charge of having murdered his wife and child. His real name was Bob. Maloney and his home was in Cuero, Texas.

A "black hand" agent in San Antonio shot and painfully wounded a merchant of that city Monday morning, after being refused a demand for \$100. The merchant exchanged shots with the blackhand, but his bullets went wild.

The manager of a theatrical troupe consisting of a den of trained lions for exhibition was killed and partly devoured when he entered a car in which they were confined in Chicago Saturday night. Four of the mighty beasts leaped upon him at one time and his assistant was powerless to help him. One of the lions endeavored to prevent the attack on the keeper.

Crockett County citizens are much interested in an important election which will be held in that county on July 8. This election is not called to decide a road bond issue, neither is it for the purpose of voting on local option; it is to decide whether or not they will eliminate the tick. Many stockmen claim that the election will carry, while others, less optimistic, declare that in this campaign, as in all others, there are followers on both sides of the question and the outcome is uncertain. The bill permitting elections for the eradication of the tick by dipping, to be held in separate counties, was passed by the last Legislature and became a law on April 8—Commercial Secretaries.

It is pretty safe to say that L. Craddock & Co., wealthy and well known wholesale liquor dealers of Dallas, have been thoroughly convinced that prohibition prohibits, no matter what their idea may be of the measure and the advocates of it. In the federal court in Dallas last Saturday a plea of guilty was entered to the charge of shipping liquor into the old Indian Territory portion of Oklahoma by L. Craddock, O. P. Storm, J. M. Kennedy and W. C. Joliff. Craddock was allowed to go free upon the payment of a fine of \$5000, while the others named were sentenced to a year and a day in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kas. Prosecuting Attorney Wilson assured Judge Meek that he need have no fear of Craddock violating the liquor shipment statute in future.

The Farmers' Union has announced that in accord with a resolution passed at the last annual meeting of that body, a cottonseed department will be established, with Charles Smith, former Secretary of that organization, in charge of the department. In creating this department during the coming season, the Union is following a precedent of long standing. Every year since 1909, this department has been successfully conducted in connection with other work of the Union. The entire membership of the Union is appealed to for co-operation in making the department more successful than in any preceding year. "Co-operation is the watchword of the Farmers' Union," reads the announcement of the new department, and a strong plea is made for the handling of cottonseed by the Union method.—Commercial Secretaries.

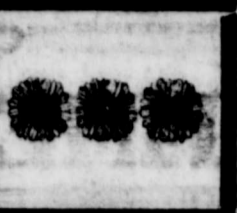
For the past 26 years he had been a consistent member of the Christian church and died in full confidence that the "redeemer liveth." He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

He leaves surviving him a wife and twelve children. The children were all with him during his last sickness and were all present when the death angel came except three sons, who had returned home a few days before.

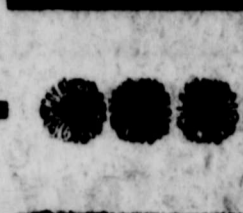
A number of friends from San Saba attended the funeral services. A good man, devoted husband and considerate father has gone and many friends mourn with those who weep.—San Saba News.

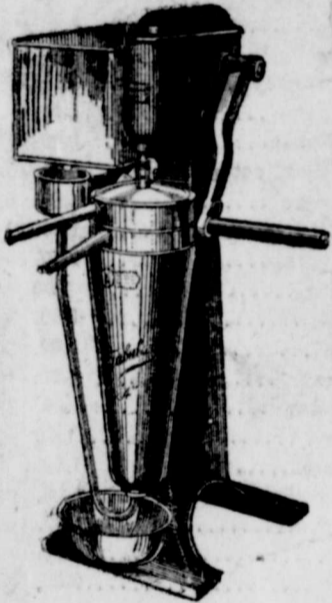
