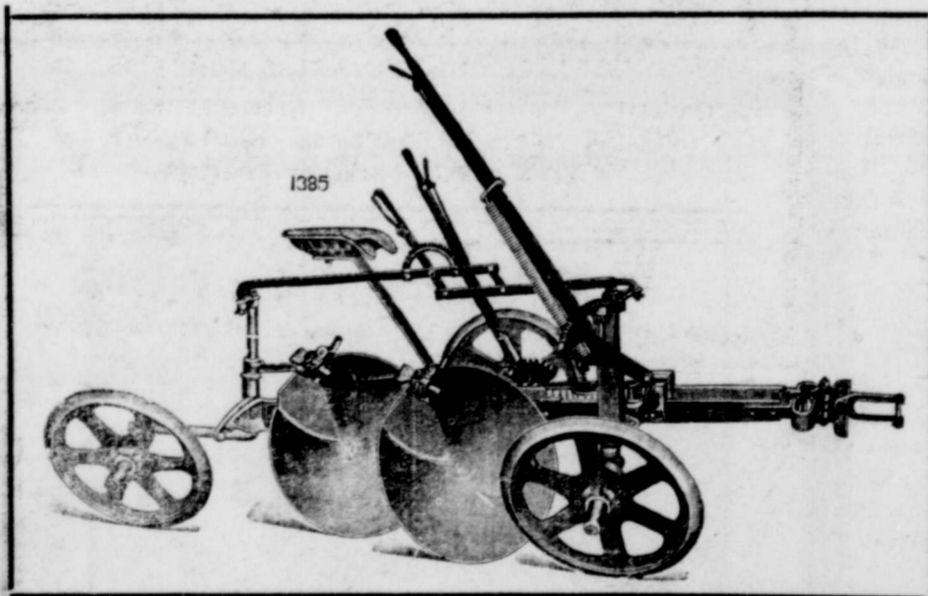

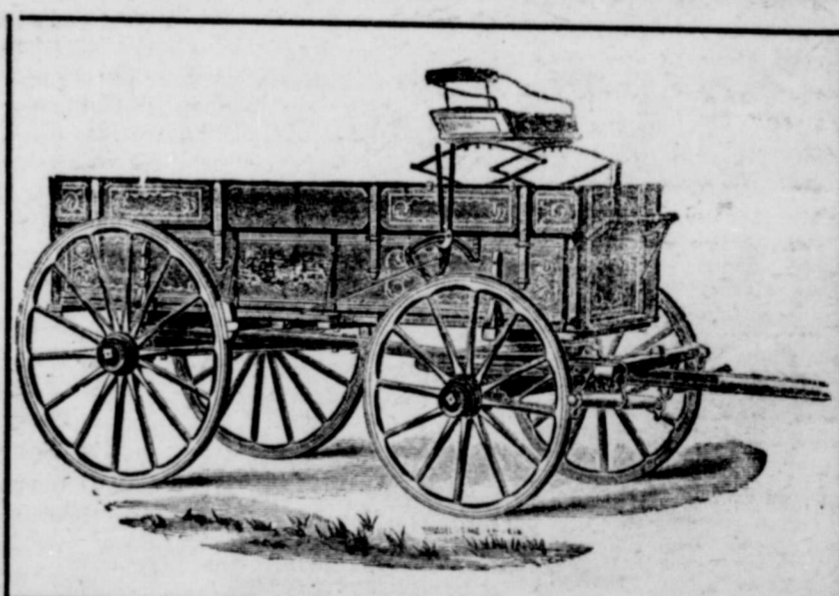

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING ARTICLE XI, SECTION 7a, OF THE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR AUTHORIZING COUNTIES BORDERING ON THE GULF OF MEXICO TO BUILD SEAWALLS.

(S. J. R. No. 22.)

#### Senate Joint Resolution.

To amend Section 7, of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls by adding Section 7a, so as to authorize such counties to build sea-walls and designate sea-wall reclamation districts for the protection of life and property from storm overflows, and to build or condemn land for sea-wall and reclamation districts, the county to have State's title to the roads and bay shore line to low tide within the district and the right to issue district bonds for acquiring and developing the district and building the sea-walls, and when district is developed as townsites, to sell such portions of the land as not reserved for public use by the county. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas be proposed to the voters of the State of Texas for their adoption in accordance with law, and that the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to add Section 7a of Article XI, and that Section 7a of Article XI shall read as follows, to-wit:

Section 7a. Where protection against the waters of the Gulf of Mexico is needed for protection of life, health, property or the sea-wall, any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico may acquire title to the land for said sea-wall or sea-wall reclamation district as designated by the county Commissioners' court by purchase or condemnation of all the land desired for sea-wall and land for the sea-wall reclamation district from the sea-wall to bay shore tide line boundary of the property abutting on the bay, and the State hereby cedes to the county, for such district, for reclamation and general uses of the district, the title to bay shore lands in the district between the property tide line boundary and the low tide line of the bay shore, and any land in the reclamation district that may have been retained by the Republic of Texas or of the State for roads when the lands adjacent were platted and sold, and the county is given the right to dredge in the bay or in the gulf for fill for the district, and right to sell the land when reclaimed and laid off as townsites or otherwise, and where condemnation is used to acquire the land the proceedings to be as under the Statutes for condemnation for railroads, provided that the condemnation shall vest title in fee in the county, and county may issue bonds or other evidence of district indebtedness for acquiring the property, building the sea-wall, reclamation developments and all incident thereto as expenses of sea-wall and reclamation district, with lien on land and such terms and conditions as county, through its commissioners' court may deem best, and the county commissioners' court shall appoint two persons who are owners of land within the district, and who desire to sell for reclamation and buy back from the county when reclaimed, who with the county judge as chairman, shall continue a sea-wall reclamation district commission whose compensation shall be fixed by the court, and this commission has power to make all rules and regulations for acquiring the land of district sea-wall building, reclaiming and plating land of district, issuing bonds or other evidences of indebtedness for same, subject, however, to all such rules, regulations, and acts of the commission being authorized and approved and ratified by county commissioners' court. The district must bear all expenses of sea-wall and purchase of the land and expenses of filling (filling) same and other expenses, and the same shall not in any way involve the credit of the county or be a basis for a tax by the county on general lands of the county unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the property taxpayers of the

county voting at a special election therefor. It is further provided that any owner of land in a proposed district may subscribe and pay for the district commission, when organized, as the pro rata of his land of the expense of the wall, reclamation, platting as town lots on a basis as such area of land is to be the whole land of the reclamation district and sea-wall, and at any time before the completion of the district may surrender the bonds and receive from the county a bond or title for his land in town lots, less streets and alleys deducted therefrom for which on surrender deed may be demanded from the county after the district is walled, filled, and platted into streets, alleys, and lots, and bonds so bought shall so provide. It is further provided that no district shall be formally designated by the county commissioners' court until owners of at least one-half of the proposed area of district petition therefor, and subscribe out for bonds for repurchase from the county as herein provided. This amendment may be acted on without delay of legislation in aid thereof or legislative action may be had in furtherance thereof if desired by the county, acting through its commissioners' court.

Be it further resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas for their ratification and adoption at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and at such election those favoring the ratification and adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." and those opposing the adoption and ratification of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." Proclamation of such election shall be made by the Governor, as required by the Constitution and the law, and there is appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising and holding such election.

(Note.—S. J. R. No. 22 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 24, nays 1, and the Senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 27, nays 0; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 114, nays 0.)

Received in the Executive Office April 1, 1913, and filed in the Department of State April 5, 1913, without the approval of the Governor.

**SACK ACROSS THE CREEK.**

(By J. H. Briley)

I left Ebony, Texas, June the 3rd, arrived at Fort Worth on the 4th. I found my son, A. B. Briley, and family well during my stay.

I visited the Baptist church at North Fort Worth and got acquainted with the pastor, Rev. Allison. I heard him preach and think him truly a noble man in the cause of Christ. At the close of his discourse, two candidates having accepted Christ by faith were received for baptism, also two by letter. I think Brother Allison is leading his flock in a noble and progressive way.

In one of my strolls in the city of Fort Worth, I found Mr. Sam Ross. He gave me a cordial invitation to visit his feed and sales stables, which I gladly accepted and later on found myself at Ross Bros' stables. Now things look prosperous there. The stables were one hundred and eighty feet by two or three hundred feet. You can see nothing but pleasantness and prosperity. The reason is the right men are in the right place. But I would not fail to say that the Ross brothers are former Mills county men.

I sure want to say that I visited the packing house while in Fort Worth. The Swift house is the one I was in. I can't say how much land measure the flooring contained, but will say that it is immense. I think the plant, as it now stands, cost three million dollars. It has seven stories. I saw a place where two to three thousand hands are employed the year round. There was a place to kill the stock and it passed from one set of hands to another until it reached the car for shipment. Then right by was the Carter house, equal to or greater than Swift's. Both houses work from four to six thousand hands and are means of feeding eighteen to twenty thousand persons. My! Everything Texas does she runs on a grand scale. Off for Dallas.

June 15th, got as far as Dallas. Found my son and his wife with Miss Ruth Briley in the best of health. It is awful hot and sultry with plenty of rain, so I am taking a rest for three or four days. Then I decided I would satisfy my longing to hear Dr. George W. Truitt preach, so I told him by a friend that I could not hear well, so he gave me a hearty welcome right in the front pew, and as he appeared on the rostrum from the preparation room, I saw a man almost perfect in form, with a calm and sincere look, dressed extremely neat but not costly. To look at, he was a model in a physical form to be sure, but soon his attraction vanished, because he hid behind the cross and made plain the beauties, the greatness of love, and saving power. Oh! one would forget Dr. Truitt was about him indeed, could one but realize the truth of Christ. Two joined by relation and two by letter. The hour was one of spiritual uplift. The more good one sees, the more one desires, so we find our way to the Baptist sanitarium at Dallas as a noble exhibition of God's goodness by a noble people. People desiring to become more familiar with the work can do so by getting the Texas Baptist Memorial Sanitarium. It is a Baptist institution, with its corps, doctors and nurses, and yet anyone can have their own physician if they so desire, yet it is risky to turn down a corps of physicians and risk one. One thing that is notable in their grand building is that its various rooms are all outside rooms, giving plenty of light and ventilation.

June the 23rd, off for St. Louis, after leaving Dallas. Lots of dry territory and short crops except in small places, wheat excepted. Well, I am off for Scottsville, Ky. Arrived at Scottsville about sunset. Found my laughter and family well and had a glad meeting with them.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING SECTION 1, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION, PROVIDING FOR THE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM**

S. J. R. No. 12,

Senate Joint Resolution.

To amend Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give to the people, or reserve to them, the power to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any Act of the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read:

Section 1. The legislative power of this State shall be vested in a Senate and a House of Representatives, which, together, shall be styled "The Legislature of the State of Texas," but the people reserve to themselves power, as herein provided, to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any law, or any part of any law, enacted by the Legislature. The Legislature shall provide by law for submitting to the vote of the people, upon petition of twenty per cent of the qualified voters of the State, the enactment of laws and the approval or rejection of any law enacted by the Legislature.

Be it further resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: that the above and foregoing is proposed as an amendment to the constitution of this State, and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Texas for members of the Legislature, for their adoption or rejection as a part of the Constitution of this State, and shall be voted on by such electors at the regular election for the election of officers to be held throughout the State, on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and those voting for the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and the referendum," and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and the referendum." And the foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four consecutive weeks, commencing at least three months before the election at which it is to be voted upon, in one weekly newspaper in each county in this State, in which such a newspaper may be published. The Governor shall make proclamation of such election upon said proposed amendment by publication as aforesaid, and as required by the Constitution and laws, and the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is now appropriated out of any fund in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of making such proclamation and publication and holding said election.

(Note.—S. J. R. No. 12 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 5, and was further passed by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 7, and Senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 0; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by the following vote: yeas 84, nays 36.)

Received in the Executive Office April 1, 1914, and filed in the Department of State April 4, 1914, with the approval of the Governor.

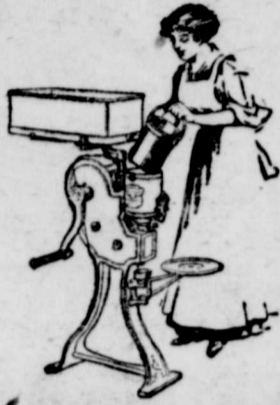

Miss Mattie Palmer returned Saturday night from Huntsville, where she attended the summer school at Sam Houston normal. She became quite ill and her brother, Joe Palmer, went to Huntsville and accompanied her home and she is now fully recovered.

The nation is in sadness because of the death of Mrs Woodrow Wilson, wife of the president of the United States. She died Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock, after a long illness, with Bright's disease and nervous collapse. Her ill health was not generally known to the public and the announcement of her serious illness, followed closely by the announcement of her death, was received with sorrow. Her death is especially regretted at this time, when her husband's time and attention is necessary in attempting to bring about peace in Europe, settle the affairs in Mexico, and avert a strike among railroad employees in this country.

War in Europe has reached great proportions and the result will be far reaching. Already, England, Russia, France, Belgium and Serbia are arrayed against Germany and Austria-Hungary, with the probability of other nations becoming involved. The attitude of Italy, Spain and other nations of more or less power has not been made known, but the probability is that they will co-operate against Germany and Austria-Hungary. Japan has notified England of her readiness to co-operate in the turmoil, and it is feared that this action may involve the United States, although there have been no developments in that direction so far. Opinion is divided as to the effect the war will have on the cotton prices and the movement of the coming cotton crop, but well-informed men whose opinions are worthy of consideration believe that cotton growers need have no fears of a depressed market. In fact, it is very likely hostilities will terminate before the cotton crop is ready to move and the people of this county will suffer no evil effects from the war. The United States congress has appropriated \$2,500,000 for the relief of citizens of this country who are in the European countries.

Many people have become unduly alarmed over the European situation because of lack of information regarding the conditions. The situation is serious, to be sure, but we of America need have no fear of great calamities befalling us on account of the wars.

Again has President Wilson demonstrated his greatness and his wonderful ability as a statesman. He has averted the greatest strike among railroad employees in the history of this country by interesting himself in bringing the employees and employers together in arbitration.

Gen. Carranza demands of Carral that the government of Mexico be surrendered unconditionally and to enforce that demand has ordered 70,000 well armed troops to march on the capital. There can be no reason or justice in the contention of Carral and his supporters that amnesty for adherents of Huerta, the assassin, be one of the terms of the surrender. Huerta has fled the country thru fear of the constitutionalists and the demand that the surrender be unconditional is but just and right. The constitutionalists won the victory and are entitled to it without conditions.

The state Democratic convention will be held in El Paso next week and if indications and reports can be trusted to portray coming events, there will be a "hot time" from the time the gavel falls Tuesday morning until the close of the convention, whenever that may be. Some say there will be a fight on the national administration, and others predict a struggle to prevent the placing of Mr. Ferguson's campaign pledges in the platform demand. Some of the big fighters will be there and it will be indeed strange if the convention does not develop some interesting and perhaps sensational proceedings.

The thoughtful man thinks ahead. The prudent man profits by his ability to forecast the future as well as to scrutinize the present. One of the most prominent advertisers in the country says he makes it a rule to increase his advertising appropriations wherever business slackens and he doubles and trebles it in times of severe business depression. This is his logical conclusion: "The new customers that I get when times are hard, I always keep when times become good. They come to me largely from those who lose them because they fail to continue their publicity campaigns. Business depressions in this country never last long and it is always seed time for me. The harvest follows when prosperity returns." It is a wise man who knows his business better than the other man does—Le. He's Weekly.

The subject of candidates' expenses, especially those for state offices, has been thoroughly discussed the last few years and the fact that it has become almost impossible for a poor man to make a successful race for a state office has been proven. The reason for this increase in campaign expenses seems to mystify most people who have not watched the developments and changes in business affairs during the last quarter of a century. The greatest expense to candidates is the service they receive from newspapers, which formerly was donated by the publishers and is now accepted as a matter of business and column after column of matter that was used as "editorial" matter in years gone by, now passes through the business office and is used as "advertising." The cost of a state campaign has not really increased so much, but it has been transferred from the publishers of newspapers to the candidates and their friends.

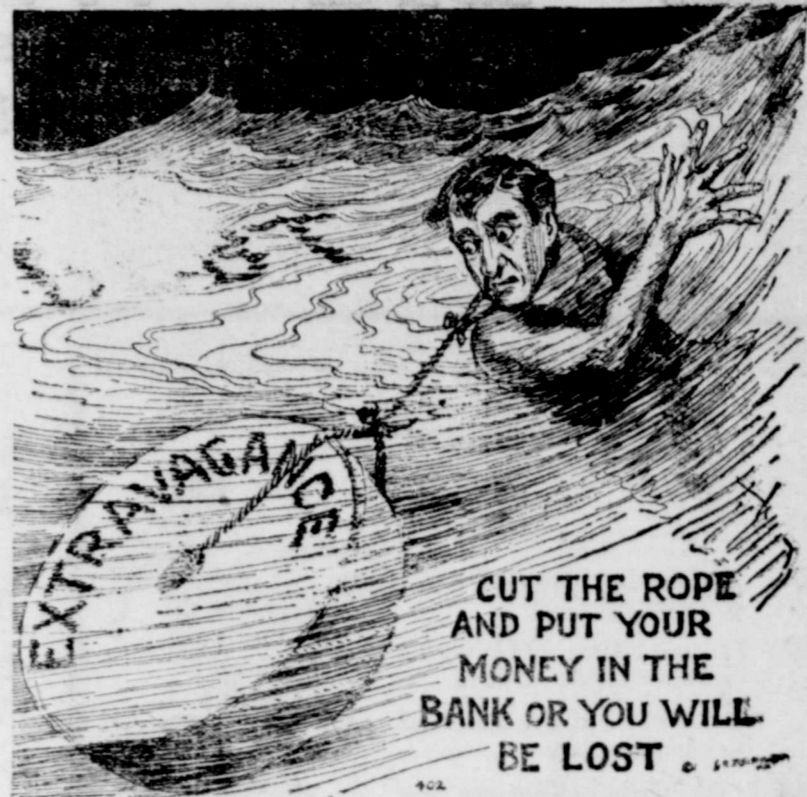

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING SECTION 24, ARTICLE 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION INCREASING COMPENSATION OF THE LEGISLATURE AND EXTENDING LENGTH OF REGULAR SESSION.**

(S. J. R. NO. 26.)

Senate Joint Resolution.

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section No. 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of State Officers, or at a previous general election, in case a general election for the State shall be sooner ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, the following amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, and extension of term of regular sessions, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the Legislature is held, payable in equal installments on the twentieth days of January, April, July and October of the year in which the regular session is held, or every special session held in the year next succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, at the first general election to be held in this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution, increasing compensation of the Legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the legislature." Those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution increasing compensation of the members of the Legislature, and extending the term of regular sessions of the Legislature."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

(Note.—S. J. R. NO. 26 passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 26, nays 0, and Senate concurred in House amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 1; and was passed by the House of Representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 101, nays 22.) Approved April 3, 1913.

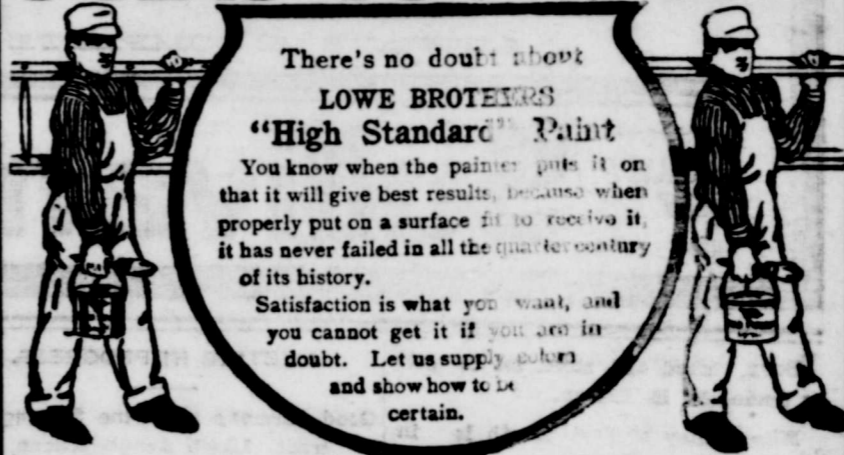

The following resolutions were adopted, after which the convention adjourned:

### Resolutions:

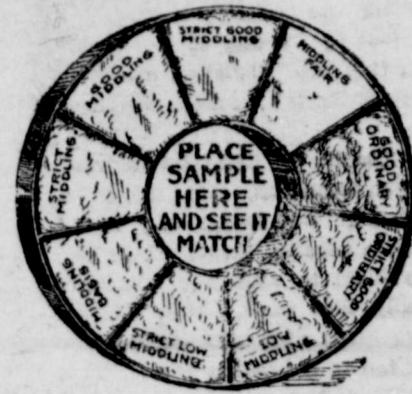

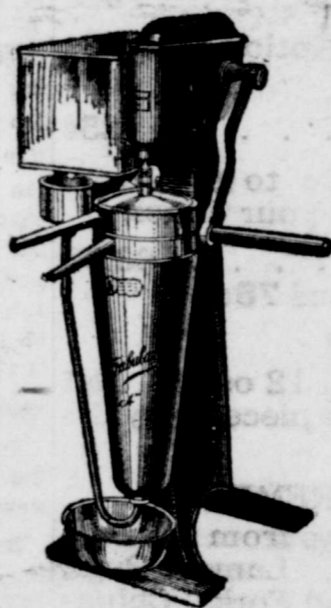
