Methodist Conference Makes Appointments for Conference Year
The Methodist annual conference for the West Texas district was held in Austin and completed its work Monday, at which time the preachers were assigned to the various churches within the bounds of the conference, which extends from Midland to Brownsville and from San Angelo to Cuero, including Austin and San Antonio in its boundaries. A great number of preachers are members of the conference and were assigned to work. However, the Eagle readers would not likely be interested in the entire list, but a number of appointments are of interest.

Rev. J. W. Cowan was returned to the Lampasas district as presiding elder and Rev. J. G. Forrester was assigned to the Goldthwaite station; Rev. Geo. G. Smith was returned to Center City and Rev. Lee A. Clark was sent to Mullin; Rev. J. A. Foster who served Mullin church the past conference year transferred to New Mexico conference; Rev. L. N. Myers, who had charge of the Star work was transferred to West Point charge, Austin district, and Rev. Geo. L. Ryan was sent to Star. Rev. Z. V. Lile was returned to Lampasas, Rev. H. E. Draper to San Saba, Rev. F. M. Jackson to South Heights, San Antonio, Rev. J. S. Fowles to Brownsville, Rev. R. L. McIntyre to Ector, Rev. R. S. Rev. F. M. Jackson and Rev. R. L. McIntyre were made members of the Conference finance committee.

HOG RAISING

A new approach to the proposition of growing hogs on the farm as a "cash crop" has been made by a progressive farmer of San Benito. Without waiting for the tanks to furnish the credit, Mr. Parron purchased a carload of thoroughbred Duroc Jersey sows and had them shipped to San Benito. Then he carefully selected a number of worthy farmers and leased them one or two sows each, as the circumstances appeared to justify. By the terms of the lease the lessee agreed to care properly for the sows, and at the end of three months to return the sows and one-half of the pigs to him keeping the other half for himself.

The banks of Texas have been and are leaders in the better farming movement, and will no doubt render substantial aid in their own communities along these lines, but this accomplishment shows that any public-spirited citizen can initiate this plan if necessary.

The introduction of hog raising on a larger scale around San Benito, has not only furnished every grower with meat, but has also provided a cash crop that wartime conditions will only render more remunerative. Grain and sweet sorghums, cowpeas, peanuts, and other feed can be grown cheaply in almost every section of the State, and a carload of fat hogs marketed twice a year will make a man a better living than many farmers have ever made from cotton.—Industrial Congress.

The trial of Mrs. Carmen at Mitchell, N. Y., was concluded last Friday and the jury could not agree on the case and was discharged Saturday. Mrs. Carmen was released on bond and it is now believed the case will be dismissed. She is charged with killing another woman at her husband's office, but denies her guilt.

The general election takes place next Tuesday and every citizen who is entitled to a vote should go to the polls and cast his ballot for the candidates.

A terrible mine disaster was reported from Royalton, Ill., Monday. Four hundred men were at work in the mine and 70 were killed outright by the explosion.

It is proposed to inaugurate a campaign in each county in Texas for a reduction of the cotton acreage and the planting of food crops instead. It is a mighty good plan.

Waco Cotton Palace opens today and continues to Nov. 15. Many who have visited the Cotton Palace in years past say it is the best exposition in the state and is entitled to liberal patronage.

The offer of the warring nations to allow the importing of cotton into the countries of their enemies without attempting to intercept or confiscate it will likely have an influence to improve the price of the staple. That result is sincerely hoped for by all parties interested in the growing and marketing of cotton.

The first issue of the Copperas Cove New Era, edited by R. E. Downey, has reached this office. It is just such a paper as Downey always publishes—well edited, well printed and claiming its town to be one of the best on the face of the earth. The people of Copperas Cove can well feel proud of their new paper and its editor. They can be sure that Mr. Downey is one of the best printers in the work, a high class gentleman who is honorable and conscientious in every transaction. The Eagle sincerely wishes unbounded prosperity for the new paper.

Ever since the "buy-a-bale" movement was inaugurated there has been or constant attempt on the part of many manufacturers, wholesalers and jobbers to work the newspapers out of advertising space free of charge. Many letters have been received by the Eagle telling of the patriotic move on the part of manufacturers or other persons or combines who are anxious to place their advertisements before the people in this way, but in each case we have consigned such literature to the waste basket. We are glad many liberal and philanthropic people have entered into the plan to assist the cotton growers and hold up the price of cotton, but we are under no obligation to give them lengthy advertisements impressing the public with their deeds and incidentally telling of the goods they have for sale. Besides this we feel confident that much of this advertising is not based on facts and that the parties named never did nor never will buy a bale of cotton at any price.

There are moments in our lives when there comes flashing back upon memory's changing track recollections of friends who have been called to that home beyond the stars not made with hands. As one contemplates the sweet moments spent with them, a peculiar inexpressible sadness creeps into the heart, and there is a loneliness that cannot be described—a yearning for the dear comrade now sleeping under the cold ground, tongueless, silent, as helpless to comfort and console as the sod that rested upon his coffin when laid to rest. It is a part of life to love and be separated, to have friends and have them move away, to form attachments and have them torn asunder by death, the great leveler, which is no respecter of love and friendship. Today we love, tomorrow we mourn. Today we laugh, tomorrow we cry. Today we rejoice, tomorrow we lament. Today our friends laugh with us, tomorrow we laugh alone. It has been thus since the beginning of time, and it will be so until there shall be no time, and the earth shall be swallowed up in the final eternal design of the Creator.—Cleburne Review.

EVIDENCE OF PROSPERITY

Deposits in Postal Savings Banks Increased

The war in Europe is proving a big boon to postal savings in this country. From the very day hostilities opened across the seas postal savings receipts began to increase by leaps and bounds and withdrawals fell off, a result quite contrary to the predictions of many well-informed persons who, in their imagination saw lines of feverish depositors at post-office pay windows anxious to again return their savings to the boot leg and body-belt depositors whence they came before intrusted to Uncle Sam. But the forecasters failed to reckon on the absolute confidence of the American citizen, regardless of the flag that first met his eyes, in the ability and purpose of the Government to carry out its obligations, not only among the nations of the earth but with the humblest citizen of our land.

Two important results have followed; thousands of people, largely of foreign birth, accustomed to send their savings abroad, are now patrons of our postal-savings system; and enormous sum of actual cash have been released for commercial uses among our own people at a time when the need for every available dollar is pressing.

The growth of postal savings in the United States has been steady and healthy and the system has filled an important gap between the tin-can depository and the factory paymaster. On July 1, when affairs were running smoothly here and abroad and the transmission of money across the Atlantic was safe and expeditious, there was approximately \$43,000,000 of postal savings standing to the credit of about 388,000 depositors. Since then over \$10,000,000 of deposits have been added and the number of depositors has increased enormously. This unprecedented gain is the more striking when it is considered that the net gain in the last three months is larger than the gain for the entire fiscal year 1914. Scores of offices have done more postal savings business since the war has been going on than was done by them during the previous existence of the service. The increases are confined to no special localities, but have been felt in every nook and corner of the country. New York City alone made a gain in September of more than a million, while Brooklyn showed a relatively big increase. Chicago reported a larger gain in the past three months than for the previous twelve months. More than 7,000 new accounts were opened during the period, bringing the number of depositors in that city up to over 21,000.

The unexpected increase in postal savings business has not only added greatly to the general administrative duties of the system, but has brought up many new and interesting problems which have called for the careful personal consideration of Postmaster General Burleson and Governor Dockery, Third Assistant Postmaster General. But their task has been lightened somewhat by the promptness of depository banks in furnishing additional security to meet the abnormal deposits. A number of the very largest banks in the country, which have heretofore declined to qualify as depositories for postal-savings funds, are now among the eager applicants for them.

The Post-Office at Goldthwaite was designated as a postal-savings bank nearly three years ago. Since that time no business has been transacted. In the last 16 months only one person has inquired about the business. He was prompted by curiosity only.

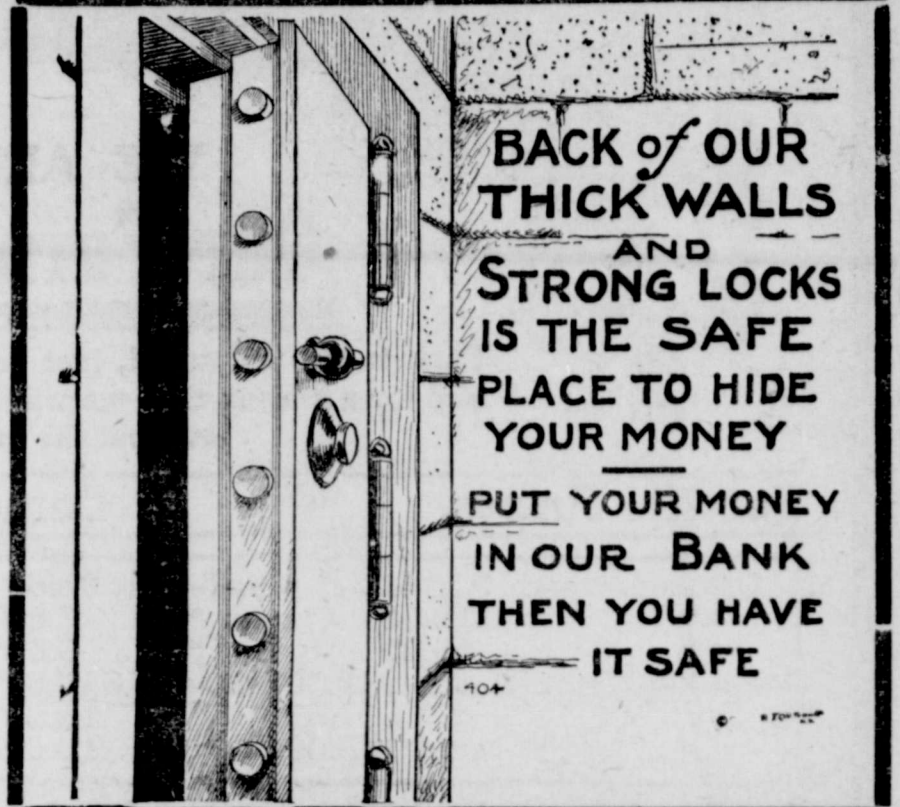

DANGEROUS CHEAP LOAN SCHEME

In the Weekly News Letter to Crop Correspondents the U. S. Department of Agriculture warns farmers against a kind of cheap loan scheme that is being operated. The agitation for cheaper money for farmers and for a form of long time loan has got the sharks at work to try to use a cheap money bait to separate the farmer from some of his hard-earned money.

This scheme as outlined sounds very attractive. The farmer is approached and the company offers to lend him money at 3 per cent and allow him to repay it in easy monthly installments. This sounds attractive, just what the farmer wanted. It furnishes money at a very low rate and allows the loan to be paid back gradually.

If the farmer agrees to the terms he gets a contract to sign. This contract requires the farmer to begin paying off his loan at the rate of \$10 a month at once if the debt is \$1,000 but he gets no money yet because the company has no money. It is to get its money by the payments of those who join. You keep on paying in the ten dollars a month and the company says it will let you have the \$1,000 whenever it gets it.

This is what you would call a loan working around the wrong way backwards. Instead of getting to use some extra money to carry on your business, you have to pay out a fixed sum monthly and wait an indefinite period to get this money back. A man wouldn't go into it if he realized what he was doing, but the agents don't make everything exactly plain. They emphasize the loan, the monthly way of paying it back, the 3 per cent interest and your signing the contract. They would rather that you do not find all out until you have signed the contract and at least paid in some of the monthly payments.

The kind of scheme the companies suggest could never work out to the benefit of all. It would prove to be a savings bank that paid no interest and after a long wait of several years gave the depositor back his money with probably a sum deducted for handling the business. Still the average investor would do well to get back about what he put in after a wait of several years, because men who are sharks enough to start such a scheme are likely to be unprincipled enough to get away with a lion's share of what goes through their hands.

We want cheap money on liberal terms, and the men who will start a company on a sound basis that will get money to farmers at three, four or five per cent interest and will provide for them to pay back in annual or monthly payments, stretching out the final payment through a period of several to fifteen or twenty years, will be great public benefactors. Still since unprincipled men are using the cheap loan scheme as a catch it behooves everyone to know what he is going into before he signs anything.—Southern Agriculturalist.

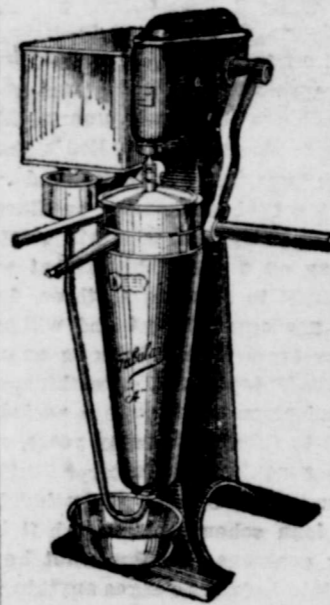
