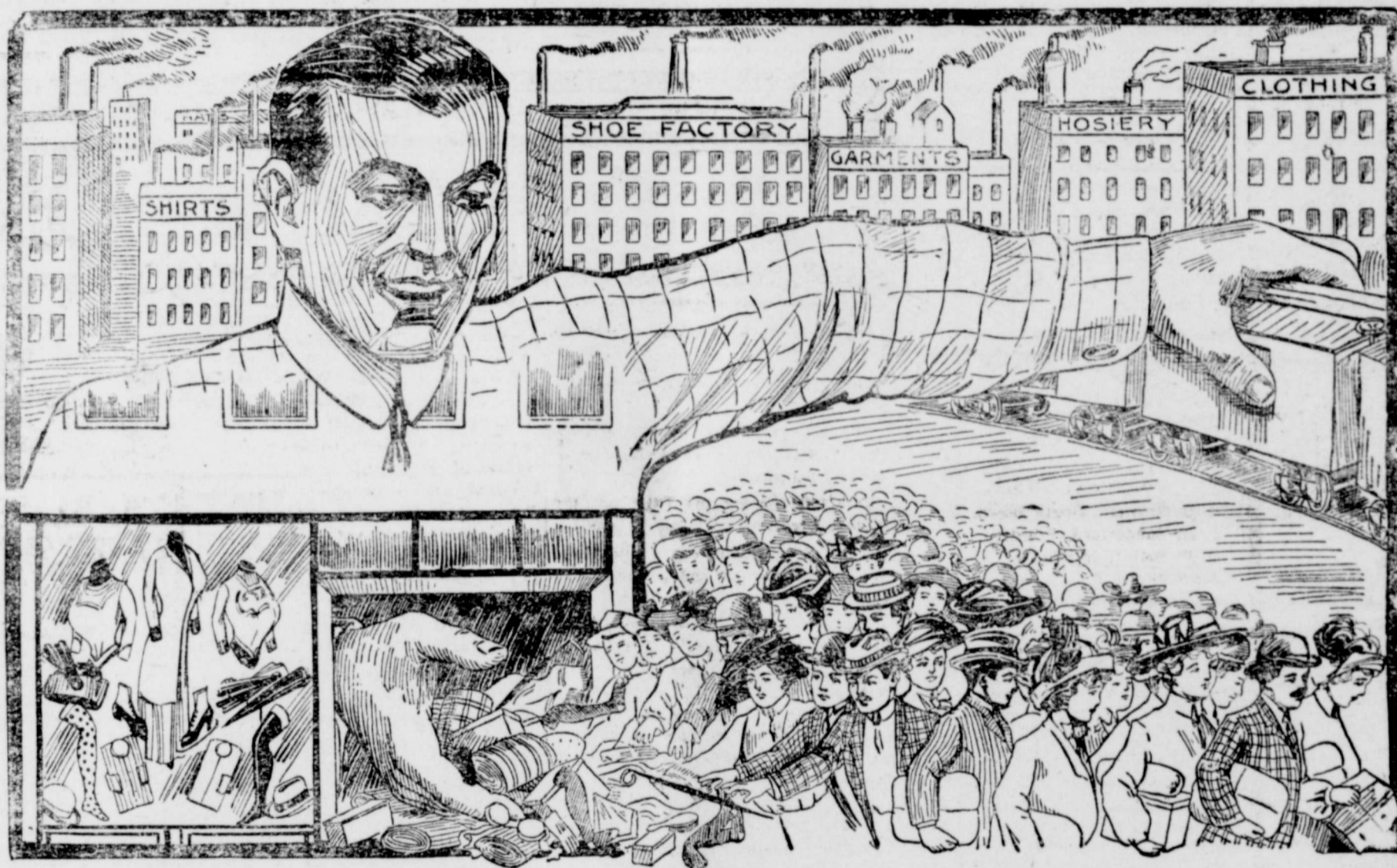

A statement has been filed with the state comptroller by the penitentiary commission declaring that there need be no appropriation by the coming session of the legislature for the penitentiaries as those institutions will be on a self-sustaining basis in future.

United States troops were ordered to Naco, Arizona, to protect that place from the Mexicans who fire across the line. A number of citizens were killed and a large number wounded by bullets from the revolutionists in Mexico and a strong protest was made to President Wilson.

Some of the newspapers carry big headlines saying there are fourteen reasons why Villa should be suppressed in Mexico and some of the reasons are perhaps valid and logical, but it is the same old story of the convention of the rats, "Who will bell the cat." Villa is rather hard to suppress.

The sixty-third congress of the United States re-assembled for its third session Monday at noon. It is said this session will be called upon for appropriations aggregating a billion dollars. It is likely additional to the army will be authorized and additional war vessels may be built, including a fleet of submarine vessels.

The Texas Industrial Congress, assisted by the State University, the A. & M. College, the State Department of Education, the State Department of Agriculture, the State Teacher's Association, and other organizations, local and state-wide, purposes to hold a contest during 1915, with cash prizes as incentives for the best results obtained by the school and by boys and girls in home and school gardening. Assurance has already been given by officials of these organizations of the most hearty co-operation in the effort to bring about the cultivation of one-hundred thousand new gardens in the state next year.

The one crop system is the most dangerous agricultural system that has ever been practiced by any people in the South today the people are on the verge of bankruptcy. We have to call on the states that have been diversifying their crops, to help us out of the hole, when we have the best country in the world for diversified farming. In the history of the world wherever the single crop has been depended upon there have been full years and empty years, and always more empty ones than full. Texas has always depended upon one crop and more often than not we have had failures. We make one good crop, then wait and hope thru many failures for another. If we survive until it is repeated we are satisfied, if we fall the sea on is blamed for the shortightedness. The remedy for this is diversification of crops, raise all that you need for supplies, then look to the money crop.—Comanche Chief.

The publicity department of the A. & M. College sends out the following information: Three teams of experts in organization of co-operative marketing and diversification clubs, representing the Extension service of the A. & M. College, began a whirlwind campaign for the organization of the associations Dec. 1st. The organization experts will cover between sixty and one hundred of the principal cotton producing counties of the state. On their first visit they will talk over with the business men and commercial club leaders methods of organizing to secure diversification and for affording better marketing facilities for the new crops. After the local people have taken the matter up with the farmer, the A. & M. leaders will return and assist in the final organization of these clubs. The proposition is not to organize the farmers but to help them to organize themselves. With pledges of diversification will come automatic reduction of cotton acreage

RURAL MAIL SERVICE

Ways to Make It Helpful—Facts Worth Knowing

The officers of the Rural letter carriers association of Travis county issued a circular to the patrons of the rural routes in that county and the statements therein apply equally as well to the patrons of rural routes elsewhere. It says:

Rural delivery of mail is making great strides each year toward making life in rural districts more desirable. The rural carriers of Travis county desire the co-operation of their patrons to make the year 1915 the banner year for rural delivery since the inception of the service.

To this end we make the following suggestion: Maintain a good mail box, conveniently located for the carrier. Your box should be firmly attached to a good post, set solidly in the ground. A ramshackle box is an abomination. As far as practicable, all of your business with the carrier should be transacted at your box, so as not to delay him in the delivery of mail to other patrons. One minute's loss of time at each box on a route with 150 boxes causes the carrier to serve his last box two and a half hours late. Do not leave unstamped letters or cards in your box. An order of the Postoffice Department reads:

Postmasters at rural delivery offices and rural carriers are directed to bring to the attention of patrons that it is the desire of the Department that all first-class mail matter deposited in rural mail boxes shall be stamped before being deposited.

Your carrier is always supplied with stamps, stamped envelopes, stamp books, postal cards, and blank applications for money orders. You may purchase your money orders through your carrier or cash them. You may also register any letter or valuable package with him. The Postoffice Department is making a special effort to enable the farmer to market his produce at a small cost. A package weighing fifty pounds may be sent to any address at your local office for thirty cents and to any office within the radius of 150 miles for forty-four cents. Perishable goods are given special attention; no one is to lose time going to market with a few pounds of butter, a few dozen eggs and a few bunches of turnips.

Insist on your correspondents addressing your mail to your route and box numbers. When possible, the stamped envelope with your return address should be used in your correspondence. If the roads traveled by your carrier in your vicinity are in bad condition, kindly take up the subject with your neighbors and the proper officials, that the necessary repairs may be more promptly made.

Concentrated action from intelligent progressive people always commands attention from public officials.

RED CROSS SEALS

It is hoped and believed that Goldthwaite will do a full share in the purchase and circulation of the Red Cross seals from this time until the holidays. Every person who can spend any amount from a copper cent upwards should purchase some of these seals and aid that much in maintaining the hospitals in this state for the treatment of consumption. Every city, town and community in the state is being called on in this campaign against the dreadful plague and while the donations need not be large, every one should feel it a duty to help to some extent. When you buy a present for a friend or holiday goods for the household remember the poor children who are suffering and invest a few cents in these seals for their help. There is no expense in getting the money to the hospital, the ladies who manage the campaign, the newspapers advertising the seals, the dealers who sell the seals all do their work absolutely free and more—most of them buy seals and thereby help with their means as well as their time and energies.

Mrs. R. M. Thompson has been appointed by Mrs. Colquitt to place these Red Cross seals on sale and superintend their distribution. They are on sale at the drug stores and other places where holiday goods are sold. If you can not buy but one you will help to that extent.

If you desire to insure several parcels for Xmas mailing we will supply the tags a few days before hand and assist you in filling them in, for it takes much more time for insured parcels than ordinary parcels.

Black against white is the best contrast for the eye to work by, then if you will bear this fact in mind while addressing the packages I am sure you will aid us no little, and every employee who handles them will be helped as well.

Do not seal parcels against inspection—that renders them first class. Tie them well, and do not inclose liquids, poisons or writing.

Do not try to address a parcel that is too small for the writing—a tag attached for the address and stamps is much better.

Last year several parcels came back to the sender, for the reason that "From" did not precede the name of the sender. That looks like a small matter, but it is one of the most important.

Some well addressed parcels MAY get lost. Numbers and numbers of poorly addressed parcels DO get lost each year. If your parcels are prepared as some samples you may see in the Post Office, there is no reasonable excuse for their being lost. We will appreciate any favor shown us towards perfecting the service and will gladly assist you to any information that will help you.

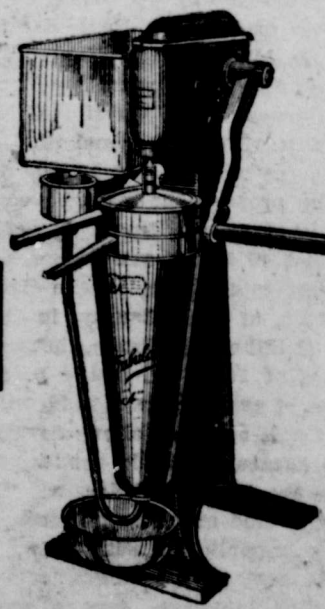

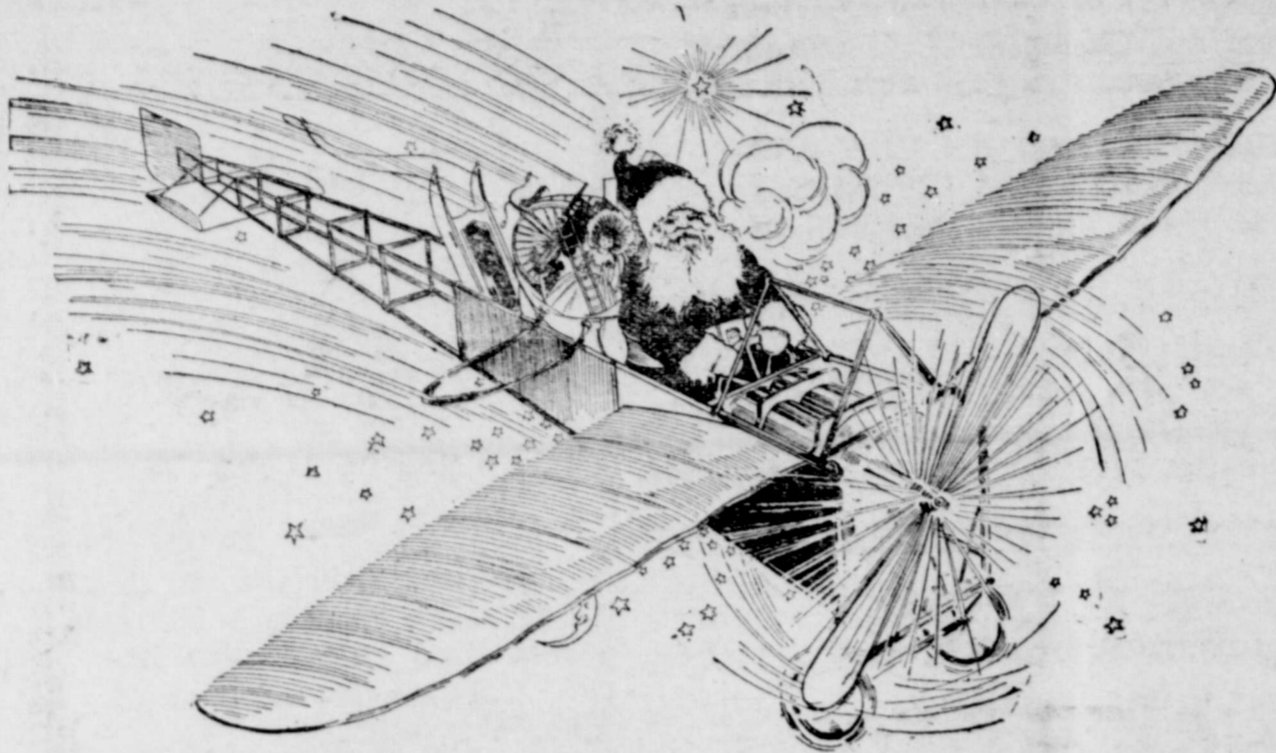
