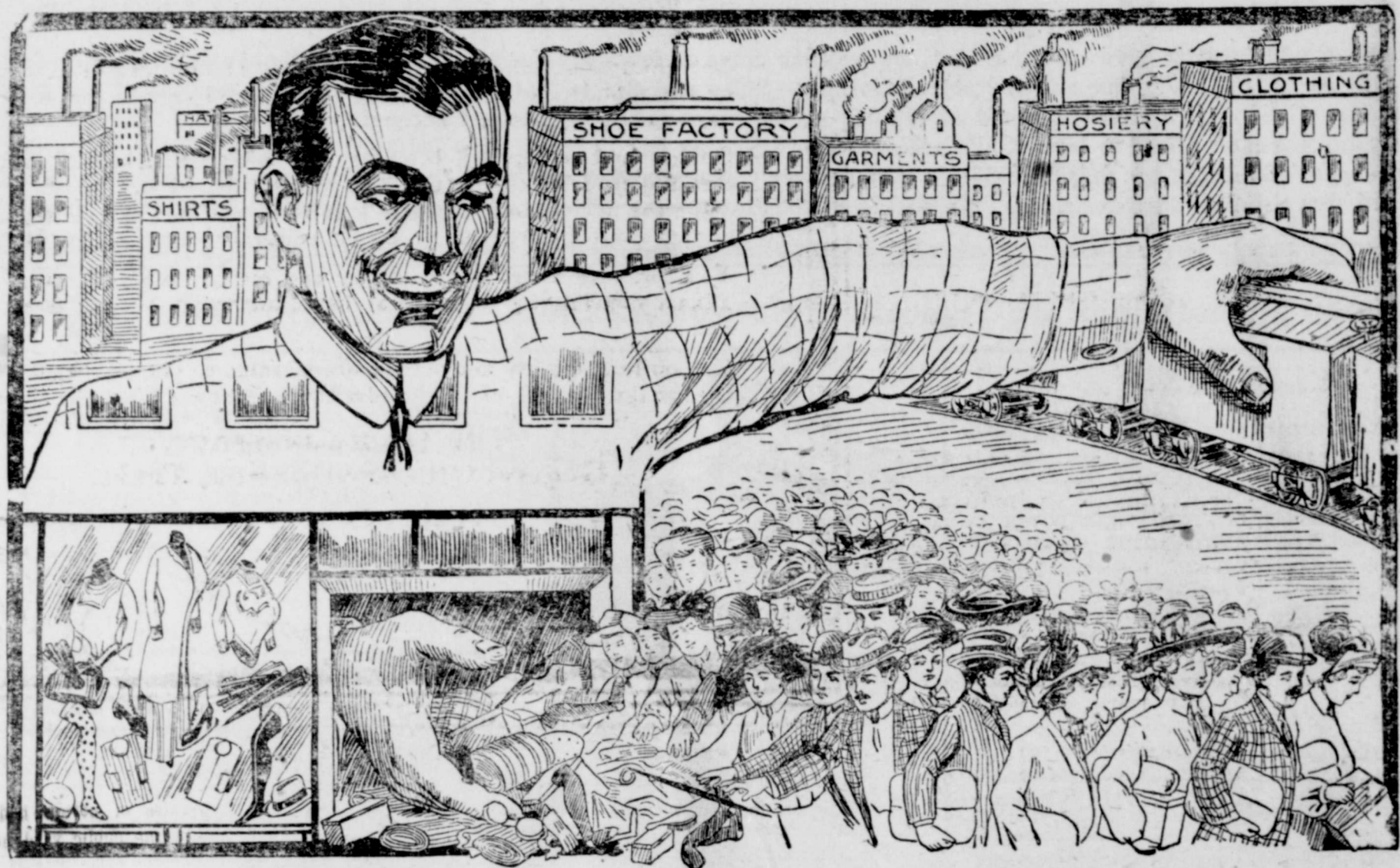

COMMISSIONERS COURT



In the appropriation bill for the postal department approved by congress there was no allowance made for mail service by airships. The recommendation of the postmaster general that the pay of carriers on rural routes be increased was approved.

A request has been made by Governor Goethals that two torpedo boat destroyers be stationed at the Panama canal to enforce the neutrality of the canal zone. This action was taken because of the activity of the vessels of the warring nations of Europe.

The new law in Arizona requiring that 80 per cent of the employes in all businesses where as many as five people are employed shall be citizens of the United States has become effective, notwithstanding a protest was made to the Washington government by some of the foreign governments claiming discrimination and violation of treaty obligations.

If more people would decide to live in the country and not seek to eke out an existence in the cities there would not be a constant cry of poverty especially in the winter season, when climatic conditions prevent to a more or less extent outdoor work. The trouble with the city man is that when he ceases labor his wages stop also. On the other hand, the farmer, when he takes a day off, or wet weather prevents him from working, has the satisfaction of knowing his crops are growing. More people in the country and less in the city would go a long way toward solving the livelihood problem.—Thurber Journal.

Selfish motives are involved in the consideration of the interstate mail-order business—whether it is better to patronize the foreign merchant and save a few dimes or patronize the home merchant and help build up the local enterprises. If you spend your money with the local merchant you might be able to get it back again, but if it is sent out of the state its influence is lost to you and your community. It is a matter of choosing between being selfish in a shortsighted or a longsighted way. Better choose the longsighted way that keeps the money at home where you can get your hands on it again.—Temple Telegram.

"Now is the winter of our discontent made glorious summer." We thought (or talked like we thought) the country was going to the bow-wows, and we were all going to suffer the pangs of extreme poverty because of the low price of cotton. But we had not reckoned upon the diversified resources of this great county of Mills. When a good many thousand dollars were distributed for poultry, thousands sent for the purchase of live stock, other thousands for pecans, oats, and other products, local dealers disbursed a large amount for country products of various kinds and we are on "easy street" and wondering where we got the notion that poverty and want would stalk hand in hand thru this great country. Verily, "everything is lovely and the goose hangs high."

Postmaster General Burlison declares in his annual report to the president that the postal department will show a surplus of three and a half million dollars for the fiscal year of 1914, which is the first time a surplus has been shown in that department since its organization, notwithstanding large expenditures have been necessary on account of the establishment of the parcel post system and the extension of the free delivery. He states that a saving of \$40,000,000 can be made per annum for the department by submitting the rural routes to competitive bids rather than employing carriers at fixed salaries. This suggestion is not popular with the carriers and many others would prefer that the system be continued on the present basis, but it is safe to predict that the postmaster general's suggestions will be given a try-out before his term of office expires.

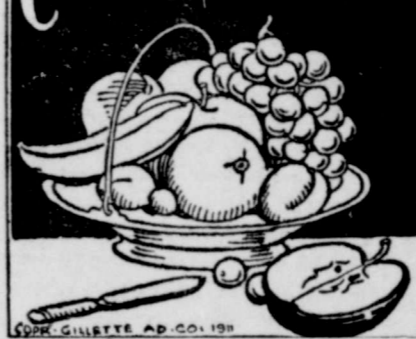

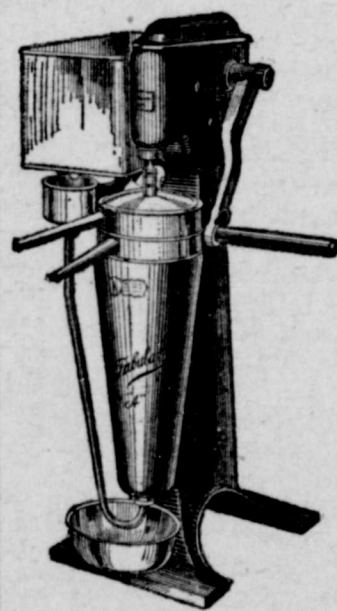
