CONTEST FOR PRIZES

Information has just been received from the Texas Industrial Congress that only one contestant from crop contests for the year 1915. The number is unusually small for an agricultural county of our importance, and should be greatly increased in view of the fact that there is no cost whatever attached to entering any of the contests, and not a cent of expense loaded onto the farmer by competing for the prizes, there is no reason whatever except lack of interest or knowledge of what the contests are to account for this small enrollment.

Ten thousand dollars in gold is to be given away to farmers of this state who raise the best crops, cost of production considered, during the year 1915. There are ten classes. The first class is four-acre model farms, which the contestants must grow one acre of kaffir, or milo or feterita, one acre of cotton, one acre of corn and one acre of cowpeas. The first prize in this class is \$500, second prize \$300 and third prize \$200; \$500 will be awarded other contestants making creditable showings.

Full information as to how to enter the contests may be secured from the Texas Industrial Congress, at Dallas by simply requesting application blanks. The contests are yet open and may be entered at any time before May 1. As has been said, there is no expense attached to entering the contest other than a one cent postage stamp to send for the application blank and a two cent stamp to return it to the Congress.

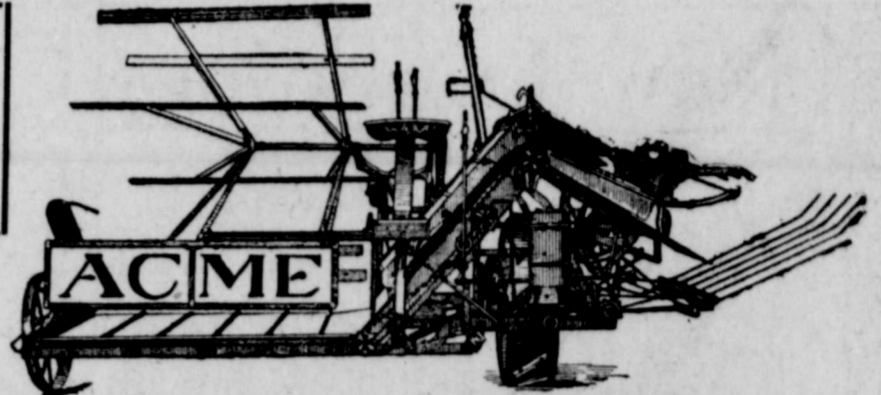

TEXAS FACTS

WHEAT.

Texas ranks seventeenth in wheat production, but compares more favorably in the prices paid and the yield per acre.

In Texas the yield from one acre of wheat is worth \$2.16 more than the average acre's yield of this cereal in the principal wheat states.

There are 7,000 wheat planters in Texas located principally in the Panhandle section of the state.

The average wheat production, per farm, in Texas is 1,545 bushels.

The wheat acreage of Texas is 780,000 acres, from which 13,650,000 bushels were produced in 1913 and sold for \$12,831,000.

Texas has 238 flour mills, which employ 2,000 persons.

During the past decade the population of Texas has increased 27 per cent, while the wheat production shows a gain of 30 per cent.

In 1913 the average acre yield of Texas wheat was 17.5 bushels and sold for 94 cents per bushel, netting the growers an average of \$16.45 per acre.

Texas produces 2.8 bushels of wheat per capita per annum and consumes 5.4 bushels.

The capital investment of the Texas flour mills is \$13,219,000. The annual capacity is 7,800,000 barrels.

HAY AND FORAGE.

The production of hay and forage is one of the chief agricultural industries of Texas.

Tame or cultivated hay is raised on 111,000 farms of Texas.

Texas hay and forage crops have an annual value of \$15,000,000.

The Texas range grows \$19,000,000 worth of wild grasses annually.

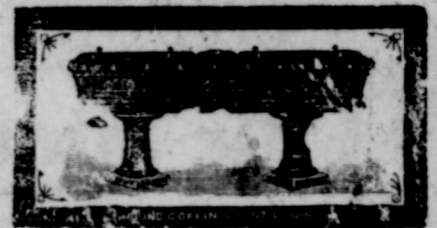

Another attempt to have Texas re-districted has failed and we will continue to elect two congressmen at large instead of having two more congressional districts in the state.

It is announced that Congressman Calaway of Comanche will make a tour of the state this summer discussing what he terms federal encroachment upon the prerogatives of the state. The banking act will be one of the texts for discussion.

The ladies of the Goldthwaite cemetery association are being frequently complimented for their faithful work in keeping the cemetery in such good condition. A gentleman who has traveled extensively stated a few days ago that Goldthwaite's cemetery was the best kept cemetery he had ever seen. "This was indeed a deserved compliment for the ladies who give of their time and energies in the good work.

An effort to have some of the factions in Mexico recognized as the governing force in that country by the United States government brought the declaration that President Wilson would not recognize the claims of any faction without a legal and orderly election in that country, which means that he will not recognize officially a government in the blood drenched republic for a long time to come.

President Wilson's announcement that he has no intention of calling a special session of congress to convene this summer and that he knows of no reason for the assembling of the national law makers before the regular session in December makes it appear certain that he does not expect complications to arise that will force this country into war, either with the European nations or with Mexico.

The European war seems no nearer an end than when it first commenced and the same claims are being made for prospects for victory from either side, or rather from every side. Some have gone so far as to outline the terms of peace that will ultimately be accepted by the nations involved, but these predictions must of necessity be predicated upon the desire of the prophet, for surely there is nothing to indicate that any of the parties to the terrible conflict even think of a time when peace will be declared.

A newspaper develops in the minds of those who read it either good or bad thoughts. If the tone and the intent of the paper is elevating, it will be uplifting to the readers but if it is sensational it will inculcate in its readers unconsciously a love of the sensational and the stories of miserable moral derelicts, it will be a bad influence upon its readers, and will fail to serve the purpose that it should serve. Most newspapers are better than some of the people who read them, and they are by what they teach inducing the people to live better lives and to strive for better things. Just as the world is advancing in Christian practices, the newspapers are also growing better, and are striving to reach higher ideals.—Cleburne Enterprise.

Texas has more farms than any state in the Union—417,770 in number.

The Texas farms produce \$662,598,000 annually.

Eighteen new farms are opened up in Texas every day.

The value of all Texas farm property is \$2,218,645,000.

NEOSHO RAPIDS, KANSAS

Editor Eagle:

Sunny Kansas has not been as sunny as it might have been during the past few weeks. The first sunshine we had here for twenty two consecutive days was the thirteenth and fourteenth inst. Two bright days then more cloudy weather with snow and rain and a little sunshine between, but we are consoling ourselves with the hope that the fruit will hold back late enough to escape freezing.

Oats growing and potato planting will be late this spring. It is too cold and wet to begin farming here yet.

Mills county certainly has a more pleasant climate than we have here. Our coldest day this winter was the twenty-eighth of December, the thermometer dropped to thirteen below zero.

This section of the state is adapted to a variety of crops. Alfalfa is the surest and most profitable crop grown here. Kansas ranks first among the states in alfalfa and about twenty six hundred acres are in this (Lyon) county. The big wheat crop of 1914 is wonderful to think of; 162 1-2 million bushels is the latest estimate I have found; twice that of any other state. I saw wheat here that made forty bushels per acre last year. This was on what is called second bottom or the land a little higher than land nearer the river. This piece of land had been in alfalfa ten years, was broke up and planted in corn two years, oats one and then the wheat.

The Neosho river bottom produced fine corn last year. I saw corn in the low bottom land that made eighty bushels per acre, though this was the first good crop in two years. The average crop is much less than the above, but it shows what can be done here if the season is favorable. Progress made in Kansas farming is due to improved and systematic methods.

A word about our school. We have fine schools. Kansas' recent law providing for the establishment of rural high schools (the people's College) bringing a practical education within reach of the many. A \$12,000 school building was erected in our little town last summer and is now occupied by the graded and high schools.

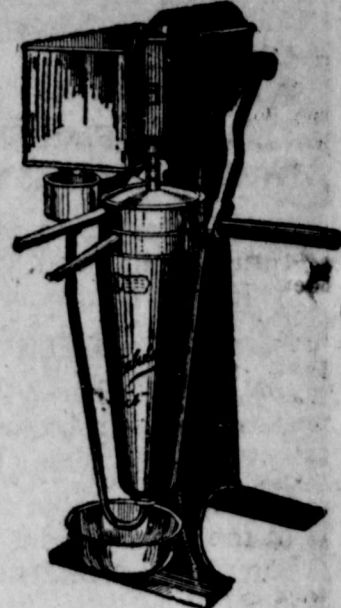

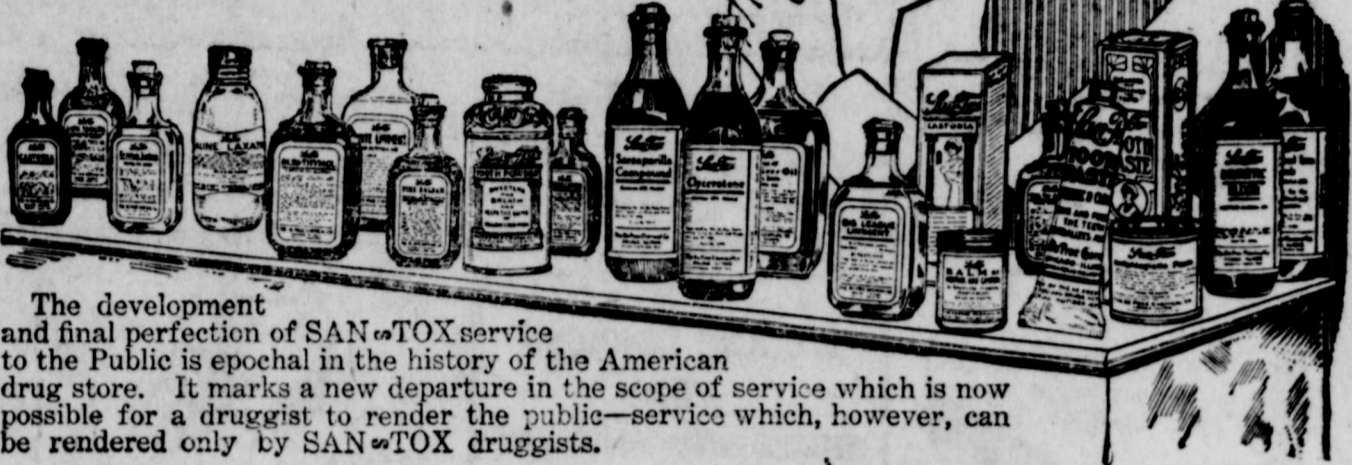
