MEETING CLOSED

Revival at Baptist Church a Great Success

The revival in the Baptist church which continued two weeks came to a close Sunday night. It was an interesting and successful meeting. The following report as given by Rev. A. B. Jenkins, who did the preaching, appeared in the Central Messenger at Brownwood:

Goldthwaite Meeting.

We have just closed a two weeks meeting with Pastor Newman and his noble church. It was a hard battle against sin and difficulties; but it pleased the Master to put His approval on the effort. Mr. Henry Morgan of Abilene led the singing. He is a young man of splendid gifts, a clean life, a noble purpose, and the qualities of success, for the field of evangelism. At the present he is a student in Simmons College. Pastor Newman and his wife are in the hearts of all the church as much as any pastor I have ever assisted. He has done a great work in this splendid town. There are more Christians and fewer unsaved people in Goldthwaite than in any town of its size within my knowledge.

The results of the meeting cannot be put on paper. There were several conversions, eleven additions, six by letter and five by baptism. Three of the number for baptism are mothers and one fine young lady. A B. Y. P. U. was organized for the young people and a Jr. B. Y. P. U. and a Sunbeam for the children. The pastor is to go to the S. B. C. at the expense of the church; the whole town has had a spiritual uplift; and the preacher and singer were well paid for their time. The last words of the last service were "Bless the Lord O my soul; and all that is within me bless his holy name."

OFFICERS ELECTED

Stockholders of the Farmers Union Warehouse company met in this city last Saturday and elected J. D. Ryan, president; Roy Simpson, secretary and treasurer; J. D. Ryan, J. W. McNeil, J. T. Ross, W. E. Gray, W. W. Berry and Roy Simpson directors.

CITY COUNCIL

The city council met in regular monthly session Monday night with all members present.

Accounts for current expenses were received, examined and allowed.

An order was adopted, closing Second street at the railroad crossing in order to allow the railroad company to extend the platform to the north of the freight depot when it is moved to the location now occupied by Mr. Randolph's old lumber sheds.

A standard width of 3 1/2 feet was adopted for cement sidewalks in the resident portion of the town.

A petition requesting that all officers be elected instead of appointed was rejected on statutory grounds and the city attorney's opinion on the question was ordered published.

A committee composed of Mesdames Will H. Trent, J. H. Randolph and R. M. Thompson from the Self Culture Club appeared before the council and requested that an ordinance be adopted forbidding spitting on the sidewalks. The council instructed the city attorney to frame such an ordinance and submit it to the next regular meeting of the council. It was ordered that all city ordinances be revised and codified.

CONFEDERATE MEETING

Jeff Davis Camp of Confederate veterans met in regular monthly session in the court house last Saturday afternoon with a good attendance and much interest manifested.

The report of the committee relative to the sale of privileges of the reunion grounds on July 21, 22, 23, was received and the committee was granted further time to make sales and conclude arrangements.

The committee on arrangements was given authority to negotiate with the Woodmen for that organization taking part in the reunion.

The suggestion by Rev. D. I. Haralson that the camp prepare a list of prizes for young men and young women who read papers at the reunion telling of the hardships and achievements of the men and women of the Confederacy, the young men to tell of the soldiers and the young women to tell of the Confederate women, the contest to be open to all sons and daughters of Confederate veterans. Rev. Haralson was instructed to have an outline of the plan published.

PROMOTION OF PUPILS

To the Patrons of Our School:

It is only a short time until school closes. The close of each year marks the promotion or retention of every student. Many students will be retained in their present grade. The grade is too difficult, there is a lack of application, or in some cases both causes contribute to failure. A failure to be promoted is generally a blessing to the one retained. The retention of a pupil does not injure his mental capacity, or take from his store of knowledge. Neither should the second year in a grade necessarily breed discouragement. Discouragement to a child in a classroom is due to his inability to measure up with his associates. His associates may possess more knowledge, a stronger mind, or there may be a noticeable difference in age. A difference in age is not so cutting as a lack of ability or learning. Mental development and common sense a clear understanding of a few of the simple facts of life—are the objects sought for in education. Education is not the act of passing to the next grade in order. "Passed" examples of those who have merely passed thru the public school are numerous. They speak for themselves.

Retention materially benefits deficient students. The individual is given a longer school career. Thus the standard of the school is raised, and the graduates meet expectation. They knew something. They may become university students immediately. Immediate entrance into a college or university means the saving of one or two years preparatory work away from home. A year in school away from home costs at least \$400. The sum of \$400 cannot be afforded by every student. One without the sum of \$400 needs the additional training much more than the one fortunate enough to go away to school.

Our high school turns out a number of boys and girls. Of this number only a very few receive the advantage of higher education. The training given at home must count. Consequently we should be very considerate in urging the particular children be passed at the close of school. Sincerely yours, ALBERT LONG.

House Joint Resolution No. 34.

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, Section 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the University of Texas and fixing its permanent location in Travis county, providing for the permanent location of the medical branch of the University of Texas in Galveston County; providing for the establishment and maintenance of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas as an independent college, and providing for its permanent location in Brazos county; providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the College of Industrial Arts and fixing its permanent location in Denton County; authorizing the establishment of junior agricultural colleges subsidiary to and under the government of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board; establishing the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, and declaring it a branch of Agricultural and Mechanical College, and fixing its permanent location at Prairie View, in Waller County; making an equitable division of the State permanent endowment fund between the University of Texas, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College; making an appropriation to defray the expenses of advertising the Governor's proclamation and submitting same to a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, Article 7, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 10. The University of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Travis County, and shall be a university of the first class. The Legislature shall provide for its organization and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement shall make by appropriation and otherwise such provision as may be necessary for the promotion of literature and the arts and sciences, pure and applied, in a university of the first class. The affairs of the University of Texas shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The location herein made of the University of Texas shall in no way affect the location of the medical branch thereof situated in Galveston County.

Section 11. All lands and other property granted by the Republic of Texas to the University of Texas, or the University of Texas and its branches, except the lands transferred by Section 13 of this Article to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, shall together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, constitute the permanent university fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund, and shall be applied to the support and development of the University of Texas and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of University lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund. The one-tenth of the alternate sections of lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State which was set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas by an act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled "An Act to establish the University of Texas" shall not be included in or constitute a part of the permanent university fund.

Section 12. The Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Brazos County and separated from the University of Texas and constituted an independent college. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of said college and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement, shall make by appropriation and otherwise such provision as may be necessary to accomplish the purpose of said institution, which, without excluding classical and cultural studies, shall be to teach and develop those branches of learn-

ing which relate to agriculture and the natural sciences connected therewith, the various branches of engineering, the mechanical arts and military sciences and tactics. The affairs of the Agricultural and Mechanical College shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College for Colored Youths is hereby established and its government and control shall continue under the governing board of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. Provided the Legislature may establish junior agricultural colleges subsidiary to the Agricultural and Mechanical College and under the control of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board.

Section 13. Of the land heretofore set apart to the University and to the University and its branches by the State of Texas, and remaining unsold, there are hereby transferred to and made a part of the permanent fund of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas six hundred thousand acres of land of average value; there are hereby transferred as a permanent fund to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College one hundred and fifty thousand acres of land of average value; and all of the remainder of the said land shall constitute a part of the permanent fund of the University of Texas. The Legislature shall provide for the division of the land as specified herein. The land herein set apart to the University, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College may be sold under such regulations, at such times and on such terms as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the prompt collection, at maturity of all debts due on account of the sale of said lands, and in no event shall any relief be granted to any purchaser.

Section 14. All lands and other property heretofore granted or herein granted to the Agricultural and Mechanical College, together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, shall constitute its permanent fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund and shall be applied to the support and development of the Agricultural and Mechanical College and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of the Agricultural and Mechanical College lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund.

Section 15. The College of Industrial Arts for White Girls located at Denton, in Denton County, Texas, is hereby established and recognized as an independent college, and the Legislature shall provide for its organization, maintenance, development and permanent improvement and shall make, by appropriation and otherwise, such provision in addition to that heretofore made as may be necessary for the establishment and maintenance of a first class college, for the education of white girls in the literary branches, the arts and sciences and the practical industries of the age. The college shall have its own governing board, which shall designate the officers of administration and instruction, and other employees, determine their salaries, establish departments, subdivisions, libraries and laboratories and other agencies of education consistent with the objects of the college and perform such other duties as the Legislature may prescribe.

Section 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and have same published as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and the expenses of submitting this resolution to a vote of the people.

Section 3. The foregoing amendment to Article 7, Sections 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for its adoption or rejection at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, A. D. 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of said month. All the voters voting on this proposed amendment at said elec-



House Joint Resolution No. 4.

A joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars of valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors voting at an election held for that purpose, and making an appropriation for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment, September 25, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further building and maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county or of any political subdivision or subdivisions of the county, or of any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within any county, who has been assessed a property tax and paid said tax for the next year prior to the time he offers to vote, voting at an election held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property subject to taxation in such county, political subdivision or subdivisions, or described or defined district. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state for adoption or rejection at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in the month of July, 1915. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose." Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise ap-

propriated to defray the expenses of publishing and proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

Bills have been introduced in the two houses of the legislature providing for state aid for small rural schools and appropriating a million dollars for carrying out the plan as outlined. It is proposed to aid only the small schools where the local tax and state apportionment will not make the school terms long enough. The plan is said to have the support of Governor Ferguson.

In many of the cities there are ordinances making it a finable offense to spit on the sidewalk or in public buildings. This law is in the interest of cleanliness and public health and every town large enough to be incorporated should adopt such a law. Better still, the legislature should make it a state statute that a person spitting on any sidewalk or on the floor in any store or other public building should be fined.

Improved business conditions are reported from almost every section. There are many causes for the improvements. The constant raise in the price of cotton is one cause, the good price paid for farm products is another and the good prospects for crops also have much to do with the improvements. No matter what the cause of the improvement, the statement of the pessimist that this would be "one of the hardest years the people ever saw" has been disproved.

An indictment has been returned against a Dallas physician charging that he procured drugs on prescriptions for fictitious persons in violation of the provisions of the Harrison anti-narcotic law. This law is being rigidly enforced all over the country and as a consequence there is much suffering among the habitual users of narcotics. The provisions of this law are far-reaching and its penalties severe and there are no provisions for the cure or treatment of persons afflicted with the terrible habit.

In a speech before the Total Abstinence league in New York a few days ago Hon. Wm. J. Bryan made some very strong and true statements relative to the use of alcohol, among them being the following: "There has been a growing disposition in this country and throughout the world to emphasize the evils of strong drink," he said, "but even the most enthusiastic advocates of temperance have been surprised at the ghastly light which the war in Europe has thrown upon the subject. It has been found that patriotism, that compelling force which throughout the ages has led men to offer their lives for their country, is no match for the appetite alcohol cultivates in its victim."

The sinking of vessels flying the American flag, the disregard of the rights of American shippers and many other happenings during the European war have been irritating to Americans, but we can endure a good many slights and overhanded acts rather than go to war. If the countries or governments guilty of overt acts or even acts that violate the laws of nations should commit such acts during a time of peace they should be held to strict account, but now when they are at war and every energy is exerted to the limit to prevent munitions of war and other supplies reaching the belligerent nations this great country can afford to overlook many acts that otherwise would not be tolerated.

CITY ORDINANCE CHAPTER

An ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, vacating a part of Second street in the City of Goldthwaite, and permitting the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company to use that part of the same vacated for freight depot and freight yard purposes.

Article 1: Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite:

That Second street from a point fifty (50) feet N 71 E of the South East corner of Block No. one (1) and North 71 East from the N E Corner of Block No. five (5) to a point fifty (50) feet South 71 West from the South West corner of Block No. forty-two (42) and fifty (50) feet S 71 W from the Northwest Corner of Block No. Thirty nine (39) respectively be and is hereby perpetually vacated.

Article 2: Be it further ordained by the said City Council of the City of Goldthwaite:

That the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company be permitted to use that part of the said Second Street herein vacated hereafter for the purpose of freight depot and freight yards.

This ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and publication as required by law.

Passed, approved and adopted on this the 3rd day of May, A. D. 1915, by the City Council at a regular meeting by unanimous vote and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously suspended, and this ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the Secretary, and if approved by the Mayor to be signed by him, and then to be kept on file as chapter-ordinances of the City of Goldthwaite.

House Joint Resolution No. 1,
A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision authorizing a qualified voter to vote for State Officers, or on any proposition submitted to the voters of this State in a precinct other than the precinct of his residence under certain conditions, and making an appropriation therefor. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, and every male person of foreign birth, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and providing further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State, and holds a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or, if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. If any qualified voter in this state shall have personally paid his poll tax in the county and precinct of his residence, or secured an exemption certificate showing that he is exempt from paying a poll tax, he shall be permitted to vote in the county in which he may be on election day on any proposition, which may have been submitted to the voters of the entire State, and for any office to be filled by the voters of the entire State; also for members of either branch of the Legislature and Congress and judicial officials; provided, no voter shall vote for members of either branch of the Legislature, Congress, or judicial officials outside of the legislature, congressional or judicial district of such voter's residence, and nothing hereinafter shall permit a voter to vote at any place other than his residence, if he be within the county of his residence on election day. Any person offering to vote in any county other than the county of his residence shall deliver to the election managers his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, who shall retain same until the following day and then mail same to the person depositing same to any address he may name; and in addition to depositing the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, such person so offering to vote shall make an affidavit:

(1) That he is absent from home, and it will be impossible for him to return to the precinct of his residence in time to vote; (2) that he has not voted at any other election precinct on that day, and will not offer to vote at any other precinct in this State; (3) that he personally paid his poll tax within the time provided by law, or personally secured the certificate of his exemption from the payment of a poll tax.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of July, 1915, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election,

and to have same published, as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions." Those opposing the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions."

Sec. 4. No legislation shall be necessary to put into effect this article of the Constitution, but when adopted same shall be self-enacting.

Sec. 5. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election. JOHN G. MCKAY,

Senate Joint Resolution No. 3
A proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution of said State, so as to provide that the Supreme Court of this State shall consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, describe their qualifications, tenure of office and compensation.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 3. The Supreme Court shall consist of Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three judges shall be necessary to the decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be at the time of his election a citizen of the United States, and of this State, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court, or such lawyer and judge together, at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified and shall each receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars until otherwise provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for said officers; and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified.
Immediately after the adoption of this amendment the Governor of this State shall call an election for the purpose of electing two Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, one of whom shall, when elected, hold said office for four years and one of whom, when elected, shall hold said office for six years, and the question of which of them shall hold for four years and which of them hold for six years shall be determined by lot, as now provided by law.
Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, ordering an election to determine whether or not said Constitution amendments will be adopted, and have the same published, as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. Said election shall be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as necessary, is hereby appropriated from any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED

It is my purpose to hereafter rigid-
ly enforce the city ordinances rela-
tive to turning out stock in the city,
no matter whether the animals are
allowed to drag a rope or are entire-
ly free—the ordinance is violated in
either case and I will see that the
law is obeyed even if it becomes
necessary to employ deputies to as-
sist me.

The ordinance relative to running
autos in the city limits with the ex-
haust or "cutout" open must be
obeyed in future and every person
violating this law can expect to be
fined for it.

It is not my desire to make com-
plaints in these matters and I hope
the ordinances will be obeyed, there-
by preventing such complaints, but
these laws were adopted by the coun-
cil to be enforced and it is my duty
to enforce them.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 18

A Joint Resolution proposing, and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for public improvements, and levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same, and for maintenance.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to, any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company, provided, however, that under legislative provision any county, any political subdivision or a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas and which may or may not include towns, villages, or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory; except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this constitution; and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation therefrom, or in aid of such purposes.


(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graded or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

Provided, however, that under legislative enactment any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, which may be formed for the purpose of reclaiming and improving overflowed and swamp lands in this State and maintaining the improvements thereof, may, upon vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory, in addition to all other debts, issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the real property in such district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a county, district or other political subdivision has issued bonds for improvements for the purposes named in this Section, the Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of taxes for the maintenance of such improvements, not to exceed fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation in any one year.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment of Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for its adoption or rejection, at a special election hereby ordered for the Fourth Saturday in July, A. D. 1915, the same being the 24th day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment of Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levee, drainage, road and other public improvements, and for taxes therefor," those voting against its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment of Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levee, drainage, road and other improvements, and for taxes therefor."

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the county judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of the voters in each county, on which he shall have printed the form of ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of voters.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation, and printing and distributing the necessary tickets and blanks for use in said election. CITY ATTORNEY'S OPINION

Mr. Will H. Trent, Mayor.

Honorable Sir:—In accordance with your request I am herewith handing you written opinion in regard electing City Marshal.

All officers of the city hold for the term of two years, or if appointed to fill a vacancy, for the unexpired term for which they were appointed, and until their successors are elected and qualified; with but one exception. Arts. 483a and 483b, provided that the City Council may dispense with the office of City Marshal and may provide by ordinance for the appointment, term of office and qualifications of such police officer, or officers as may by such council be deemed necessary. Quoting further "Such police officer or officers so appointed by such city council shall receive a salary or fees of office or both, as shall be fixed by the city council, and such council may, by ordinance, provide that such police officer or officers so appointed shall hold their office at the pleasure of the city council and for such term as the city council shall from time to time direct; etc. I find that these provisions of the statute have been carried forward into ordinances of the city. Ordinances page 44; therefore the office of City Marshal does not now exist as to the City of Goldthwaite, and in lieu thereof we have a police marshal, as provided in said ordinance, which office is made appointive, consequently before the office of City Marshal, which may be elective, can be restored the above and foregoing ordinance must be repealed.

I further find that the Statutes, Art. 388, Sluder on Municipal Corporations page 13, prescribe that the Mayor must name in his election proclamation the officers to be elected in any election of city officers, and that such election shall be held on the 1st. Tuesday in April of each year.

I further find that special elections are only authorized for election of Mayor or Alderman, and that when a vacancy occurs in any other office the same shall be filled by appointment by the Mayor with the concurrence of the City Council, Art. 396 R. S. Sluder on Municipal Corporations page 18-19.

I further find that the Statutes provide the circumstances under which an officer may be removed, Art. 564, Sluder, page 124, which I quote, "The City council shall have power to remove any officer for incompetency, corruption, misconduct, or malfeasance in office, after due notice, and an opportunity to be heard in his defense. In addition to the foregoing power of removal the city council shall have the power at any time to remove any officer of the corporation elected by them, by resolution declaratory of its want of confidence

in said officer, provided that two-thirds of the aldermen elected vote in favor of said resolution.

Summing Up—

1. All officers hold their offices, as a matter of right for the term of two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified, and if by appointment until the end of the term which they were appointed to fill. Exception, Police Marshal.
2. An ordinance will be necessary to restore the office of City Marshal.
3. In order that an officer be legally elected the election notice must state that he is one of the officers to be elected, which is required to be published under the hand of the Mayor.
4. That such ordinance cannot be passed, and such proclamation issued in time to elect a City Marshal at the April election of 1915.
5. That a special election for such purpose would not be lawful; and if the office of police marshal is abolished by ordinance, and the present incumbent in said office discharged, the council will have to fill such vacancy by appointment.
6. That officers, except the Police Marshal, shall not be removed except for incompetency, corruption, misconduct, or malfeasance, or lack of confidence in said officer by two-thirds of the council, and then only after being given opportunity to be heard in their own defense.



SCALP BOUNTY

In regard to the New Bounty Law, now in force in Mills county Texas:

The bounty law now in force provides for the payment of a bounty of \$2.00 on each wolf, \$1.00 on each wild cat, and 5 cents on each jack rabbit, killed in Mills county. The scalp must include both ears of such animal and be presented to the Commissioners' Court by the person or persons having killed said animal in person, who will be required to make an affidavit stating when and where he killed such animal or animals, the kind, and that affiant himself killed said animal. A single affidavit may be made for a number of animals of the same or different kinds. The Commissioners' Court will only receive such scalps at the regular terms which convene on the second Monday in February, May, August and November, of each year. W. B. House Joint Resolution No. 9.

A joint resolution to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation of a student's loan fund in each county in connection with the public schools thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3b, which shall read and be as follows, to-wit:

Sec. 3b. The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund to be known as a "Students' Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and administered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by law.

Sec. 2. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in each county; provided, that a majority of the qualified tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. Provided, that if the tax is adopted, after it has been enforced for two years, an election may be held, on the order of the commissioners' court to determine whether or not said tax shall be repealed; and provided, further, that it shall be the duty of the Commissioners' Court to order such election upon a petition so to do by twenty-five per cent of the qualified tax paying voters of the county.

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall pass the necessary laws carrying into effect this provision of the Constitution

Sec. 4. That the above and foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before a special election to be held for the purpose of voting upon such proposed amendment, on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, in one weekly newspaper of each county in the State of Texas, in which such newspaper may be published. And the Governor shall, and he is hereby directed, to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature. At such election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund." and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund."

Sec. 5. That \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of advertising and holding the election provided for above.




